NOTICE OF A PUBLIC HEARING

A Design Public Hearing will be held by MassDOT to discuss the proposed Intersection Reconstruction on Route 108 (Newton Road) at Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) project in Haverhill, MA.

PURPOSE: The purpose of this hearing is to provide the public with the opportunity to become fully acquainted with the proposed Intersection Reconstruction on Route 108 (Newton Road) at Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) project. All views and comments made at the hearing will be reviewed and considered to the maximum extent possible.

PROPOSAL: The proposed project consists of realigning the existing intersection to form a more perpendicular configuration to improve safety. The intersection geometry will also be revised to improve the turning movements for trucks. Along Route 110 eastbound, both an exclusive left-turn lane and through lane will be provided. Sidewalks and dedicated bicycle lanes are proposed as part of the project which also includes a sidewalk connection to Winnekenni Park. Surplus pavement area at the intersection will be converted to grass area.

A secure right-of-way is necessary for this project. Acquisitions in fee and permanent or temporary easements may be required. The City of Haverhill is responsible for acquiring all needed rights in private or public lands. MassDOT's policy concerning land acquisitions will be discussed at this hearing.

Written views received by MassDOT subsequent to the date of this notice and up to five (5) days prior to the date of the hearing shall be displayed for public inspection and copying at the time and date listed above. Plans will be on display one-half hour before the hearing begins, with an engineer in attendance to answer questions regarding this project. A project handout will be made available on the MassDOT website listed below.

Written statements and other exhibits in place of, or in addition to, oral statements made at the Public Hearing regarding the proposed undertaking are to be submitted to Patricia A. Leavenworth, P.E., Chief Engineer, MassDOT, 10 Park Plaza, Boston, MA 02116, Attention: Roadway Project Management, Project File No. 608761. Such submissions will also be accepted at the hearing. Mailed statements and exhibits intended for inclusion in the public hearing transcript must be postmarked no later than ten (10) business days after this Public Hearing. WHAT IS A PUBLIC HEARING?

WHY A PUBLIC HEARING?

To provide an assured method whereby the Commonwealth of Massachusetts can furnish to the public information concerning the State's highway construction proposals, and to afford every interested resident of the area an opportunity to be heard on any proposed project. At the same time, the hearings afford the Commonwealth an additional opportunity to receive information from local sources which would be of value to the State in making its final decisions to what design should be advanced for development.

WHY NOT A VOTE ON HIGHWAY PLANS?

The hearings are not intended to be a popular referendum for the purpose of determining the nature of a proposed improvement by a majority of those present. They do not relieve the duly constituted officials of a State highway department of the necessity for making decisions in State highway matters for which they are charged with full responsibility.

WHAT DOES A PUBLIC HEARING ACCOMPLISH?

It is designed to ensure the opportunity for, or the availability of, a forum to provide factual information which is pertinent to the determination of the final alternative considered by the state to best serve the public interest, and on which improvement projects are proposed to be undertaken.

It is important that the people of the area express their views in regard to the proposal being presented, so that views can be properly recorded in the minutes of the meeting. These minutes will be carefully studied and taken into consideration in the determination of the final design.

RIGHT OF WAY ISSUES

A secure right of way is necessary for this project. Temporary construction easements may be required. Your municipality is responsible for acquiring all necessary rights in private or public lands. If your property is affected, your rights are fully protected under law.

1. REASON FOR PROJECT

The completion of this project will serve local needs. The proposed enhancement will also be in the interest of others in the greater community and provide for the public good.

2. WHO CONTACTS ME?

Representatives of the municipality have already contacted or will contact you. They will explain the procedures used in acquiring any necessary rights in land.

3. WHAT ABOUT DONATIONS? WHAT IS A RIGHT OF ENTRY?

Town officials will often seek donations, of parcels, where permanent rights are required. This procedure will minimize the acquisition cost for your community.

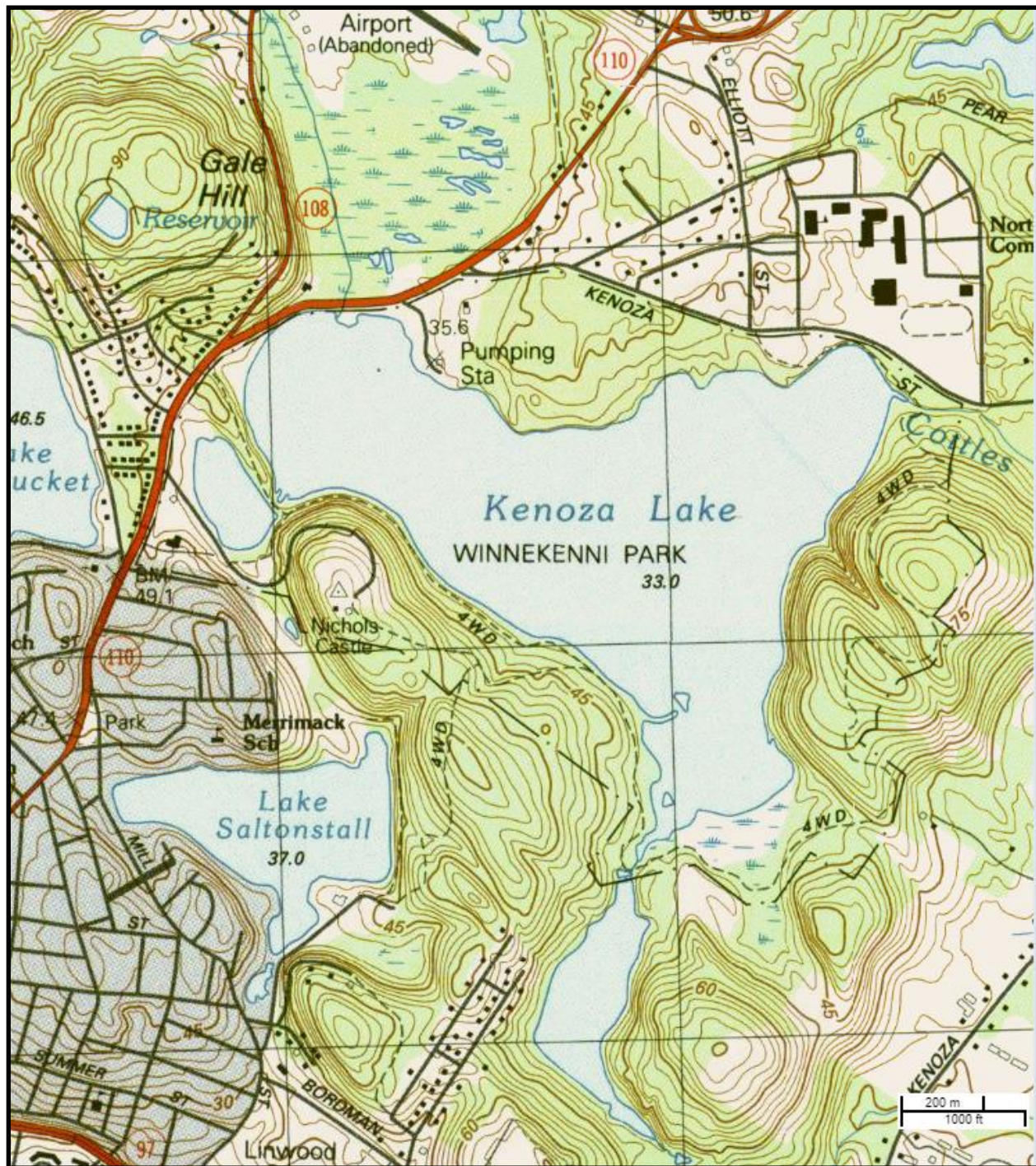
A Right of Entry is a document that is signed by the owner. It allows the Contractor to perform certain types of work on the owner's land. The work is usually minor in nature and frequently consists of loaming/seeding behind sidewalks, new driveway apron work, grading/sloping, and wetland protection, etc. The rights granted are temporary in nature.

4. WHAT IS A FAIR PRICE FOR THE ACQUIRED PARCELS?

In the event that donations are not considered, or completed, every effort will be made to ensure that an equitable value is awarded. Municipal and/or outside appraisers will complete an appraisal. Consideration is given to the type of rights needed, whether in fee, permanent or temporary easements. The appraisal will be the basis for arriving at a fair price (for damages that result).

5. MUST I ACCEPT THE MUNICIPALITY OFFER?

No, if the owner feels that the offer is not fair the owner may petition the courts. This action does not stop or delay the acquisition. The action must occur within 3 years. The owner(s) may be paid pro tanto (for the time being). The pro tanto payment will not prejudice the court's final decision.

Intersection Reconstruction on Route 108 (Newton Road) and Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) Haverhill, MA

PROJECT LOCATION

The project includes safety and operational improvements to the intersection of Route 108 (Newton Road) and Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road). The project limits on Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) extend from just west of Longview Street to approximately 300 feet east of the intersection with Route 108 (Newton Road) for a total distance of 0.23 miles (1,200 feet). The project limits also extend approximately 325 feet along Route 108 (Newton Road) and 150 feet along Humphrey Street. The attached Locus Map shows the intersection location.

PROJECT PURPOSE

The purpose of this project is to increase safety for all modes of transportation, improve operations at the intersection of Route 108 (Newton Road) at Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) and to provide bicycle accommodations while also enhancing pedestrian accommodations. The project includes roadway reconstruction and geometric improvements at the intersection, as well as the provision for both pedestrian and bicycle enhancements along Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) and pedestrian enhancements along Route 108 (Newton Road) within the project area.

PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

The proposed project improvements include the following:

- Realign the intersection to form a more perpendicular configuration of Route 108 (Newton Road) to improve visibility for turning vehicles and to accommodate the turning radii for larger vehicles navigating the intersection;
- Provide a dedicated left turn lane and through lane along Route 110 (Kenoza Avenue and Amesbury Road) northbound and dedicated left and right turn lanes along Route 108 (Newton Road) to improve traffic operations;
- Resurface the roadway, reset curb lines and modify drainage infrastructure within the project limits;
- Reconstruct existing sidewalk and install new sidewalk to enhance pedestrian accommodations throughout the corridor and specifically adjacent to Winnekenni Park;
- Construct Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) / Architectural Access Board (AAB) compliant accessible curb ramps within the project limits;

- Stripe dedicated bicycle lanes to accommodate bicyclists;
- Stripe new thermoplastic crosswalks, STOP lines, centerlines, lane lines, medians, parking lanes, and shoulder lines within the project limits.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

During typical construction operations, all roadways in the project area will remain open to residents and other traffic. Occasional short traffic disruptions and travel lane/shoulder/parking lane closures may occur, but every effort will be made to minimize inconvenience to the travelling public and abutting residents and businesses. Pedestrian and vehicular access to abutting properties will be maintained throughout construction.

RIGHT OF WAY IMPACTS

Temporary construction easements will be required due to grading impacts to lawns, driveways, and walkways and to restore those associated impacts to adjacent properties. Permanent easements will also be required to reset utility poles at the re-aligned intersection. The City of Haverhill will be responsible for securing all necessary easements. The City's policy concerning land acquisition will be discussed at this hearing.

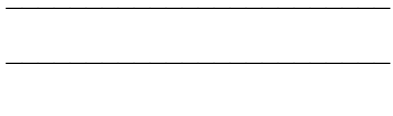
PROJECT COST

The current estimate of the total construction cost of this project is approximately \$2,100,000.

PROJECT SCHEDULE

The design plans presented this evening are at the 25% design stage. The project is currently programmed for the FY 2022 TIP. Design, permitting and right of way acquisition is anticipated to be complete in early 2022. Construction is anticipated to begin in 2022.
