A Virtual Design Public Hearing will be published on the MassDOT website below to present the design for the proposed reconstruction & related work along Winthrop Street & Revere Street corridor project in Winthrop, MA.

WHEN: Thursday, April 22, 2021

PURPOSE: The purpose of this hearing is to provide the public with the opportunity to become fully acquainted with the proposed reconstruction & related work along Winthrop Street & Revere Street corridor project. All views and comments submitted in response to the hearing will be reviewed and considered to the maximum extent possible.

PROPOSAL: The proposed project consists of reconstruction & related work along Winthrop Street & Revere Street corridor. Shared use accommodations consisting of a wide outside travel lane with shared lane markings have been provided in accordance with applicable design guides.

A secure right-of-way is necessary for this project. Acquisitions in fee and permanent or temporary easements may be required. The city is responsible for acquiring all needed rights in private or public lands. MassDOT's policy concerning land acquisitions will be presented in the hearing.

WHAT IS A PUBLIC HEARING?

WHY A PUBLIC HEARING?

To provide an assured method whereby the Commonwealth of Massachusetts can furnish to the public information concerning the State's highway construction proposals, and to afford every interested resident of the area an opportunity to be heard on any proposed project. At the same time, the hearings afford the Commonwealth an additional opportunity to receive information from local sources which would be of value to the State in making its final decisions to what design should be advanced for development.

WHY NOT A VOTE ON HIGHWAY PLANS?

The hearings are not intended to be a popular referendum for the purpose of determining the nature of a proposed improvement by a majority of those present. They do not relieve the duly constituted officials of a State highway department of the necessity for making decisions in State highway matters for which they are charged with full responsibility.

WHAT DOES A PUBLIC HEARING ACCOMPLISH?

It is designed to ensure the opportunity for, or the availability of, a forum to provide factual information which is pertinent to the determination of the final alternative considered by the state to best serve the public interest, and on which improvement projects are proposed to be undertaken.

It is important that the people of the area express their views in regard to the proposal being presented, so that views can be properly recorded in the minutes of the meeting. These minutes will be carefully studied and taken into consideration in the determination of the final design.

RIGHT OF WAY CONCERNS

Your Municipality is responsible for securing the right of way for this project. If your property, or a portion of it, must be acquired by the Municipality for highway purposes in the interest of all people of the Commonwealth, your rights are fully protected under the law. Briefly, here are some of the answers to questions you might ask.

1. REASON FOR PROJECT

The completion of this project will serve local needs. The proposed enhancement will also be in the interest of others in the greater community, and provide for the public good.

2. WHO CONTACTS ME?

Representatives of the municipality have already contacted or will contact you. They will explain the procedures used in acquiring any necessary rights in land.

3. WHAT ABOUT DONATIONS? WHAT IS A RIGHT OF ENTRY?

Town officials will often seek donations, of parcels, where permanent rights are required. This procedure will minimize the acquisition cost for your community.


A Right of Entry is a document that is signed by the owner. It allows the Contractor to perform certain types of work on the owner's land. The work is usually minor in nature and frequently consists of loaming/seeding behind sidewalks, new driveway apron work, grading/sloping, and wetland protection, etc. The rights granted are temporary in nature.

4. WHAT IS A FAIR PRICE FOR THE ACQUIRED PARCELS?

In the event that donations are not considered, or completed, every effort will be made to ensure that an equitable value is awarded. Municipal and/or outside appraisers will complete an appraisal. Consideration is given to the type of rights needed, whether in fee, permanent or temporary easements. The appraisal will be the basis for arriving at a fair price (for damages that result).

5. MUST I ACCEPT THE MUNICIPALITY OFFER?

No, if the owner feels that the offer is not fair the owner may petition the courts. This action does not stop or delay the acquisition. The action must occur within 3 years. The owner(s) may be paid pro tanto (for the time being). The pro tanto payment will not prejudice the court's final decision.




Figure 1. Locus Map



Corridor Improvements on Revere Street Winthrop, Massachusetts

The Revere Street project in Winthrop, MA is a 0.6 mile corridor improvement project. Intersection improvements, sidewalk and pavement reconstruction, and safety improvements are proposed on Revere Street from Main Street to Crest Avenue to replace deteriorating infrastructure, provide improved accessibility, and to enhance safety for all roadway users.

Proposed Improvements

Roadway Cross Section

Pavement reconstruction is proposed throughout the project. Existing sidewalks will be reconstructed and designed to provide proper curb reveal. Road widening is restricted by the limited public Right-of-Way and the fact that many abutting buildings are located directly adjacent to property lines.

Safety Improvements

Safety improvements are proposed throughout the project. Lane and shoulder widths are proposed to meet MassDOT minimum requirements for minor arterials, which will improve safety for vehicles and bicyclists while maintaining the existing on street parking that is essential for abutting residences and businesses. Signage and pavement markings will be provided to alert motorists of the potential presence of bicyclists sharing the travel lane. Sight distance improvements at intersections are proposed.

Existing traffic signs that are in poor condition, or that are not warranted, will be removed. New regulatory and warning signs, conforming to the provisions of the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) and MassDOT, will be installed. New pavement markings are proposed to delineate the traveled ways, shoulders, stop lines, parking spots, and crosswalks. It is proposed to maintain the existing on street parking in areas deemed as safe for all roadway users while making improvements to clearly delineate parking spots from the travel lanes.

Intersection Improvements

Intersection improvements will be made to the major intersections at Magee's Corner and Revere Street at Crest Avenue and Highland Avenue. Improvements include new traffic control signals meeting current MassDOT and MUTCD standards, alterations to intersection geometry to improve traffic flow and safety for vehicles, pedestrians and bicycles, and updating signage and pavement markings. Geometric modifications are proposed to reduce pedestrian crossing distances at the intersection of Shirley Street.

Bicycle, Pedestrian & Transit Accommodations

It is proposed to reconstruct the sidewalks on both sides of Revere Street, improve crosswalk and bus stop locations along the corridor, provide ADA/AAB compliant wheelchair ramps, and

incorporate pedestrian signage. Pavement markings and signage will be introduced to delineate bicycle travel ways. Bike and pedestrian accommodations at traffic signals will also be upgraded.

Traffic Management

During construction operations, roadways within the project area will remain open to vehicular traffic to the extent practical. Occasional short traffic disruptions and travel lane/shoulder closures may occur, but every effort will be made to minimize inconvenience to the travelling public and abutting residents and businesses during construction. Pedestrian and vehicular access to abutting properties will be maintained throughout construction.

Right of Way Impacts

Temporary construction easements will be required for grading impacts to lawns, driveways, and walkways and to restore impacts to adjacent properties. Permanent easements will be required for utility pole relocations and overhead utility wires. The permanent easements will also be required for construction of sidewalks. Fee takings will also be required for roadway construction and signal installation. The Right of Way Bureau is responsible for acquiring all of the necessary rights in private and public lands for the design, construction, and implementation of this project. MassDOT's policy concerning land acquisition will be discussed at this hearing.

Project Cost

The current estimate of the total construction cost of this project is approximately \$5.3 Million

Project Schedule

The project being presented is at the 25% design stage. Design, permitting, and right of way acquisition is anticipated to complete by the Spring of 2023. Construction is anticipated to begin is in the Summer of 2023.
