Honorable Chairs and Ranking Minority Members of the Committees on Ways and Means:

Pursuant to Section 6 of Chapter 14 of the General Laws¹, the Department of Revenue (DOR) hereby submits its mid-month tax revenue report for the month of May 2023, the tenth month of fiscal year 2023. The attached table shows May 2023 month-to-date tax revenue collections through May 15, 2023, along with changes from the equivalent period in May 2022.

Revenue collections are uneven and usually weighted toward month-end. The brief period covered in the mid-month report does not provide sufficient data for comparison to prior years. Therefore, mid-month figures should not be used to assess trends or project future revenues.

Context for May Revenues

Historically, May is a mid-size month for collections, ranking seventh of 12 months in seven of the last 10 years. Net revenue collections in May are influenced by the individual tax filing season, which generates both inflows and refund outflows during the month. In addition, estimated payments from individuals and businesses are not significant in May.

Highlights

Total Tax collections for the month-to-date period were \$1.345 billion, \$141 million or 11.7% more than the collections during the same period in May 2022. The month-to-date increases in withholding and non-withholding income tax, sales tax, and corporate and business tax were partially offset by a decrease in "all other" tax.

- **Income Taxes** totaled \$1.029 billion, up \$117 million or 12.8% versus the same period in May 2022.
- Sales & Use Taxes totaled \$180 million, up \$11 million or 6.2% versus the same period in May 2022.
- Corporate & Business Taxes totaled \$60 million, up \$41 million or 212.3% versus the same period in May 2022.
- Other Taxes totaled \$76 million, down \$28 million or 26.8% versus the same period in May 2022.

Details

Total Income Tax of \$1.029 billion for mid-month May is comprised of the following:

- Withholding of \$845 million, up \$38 million versus the same period in May 2022.
- **Estimated Payments** of \$51 million, up \$34 million versus the same period in May 2022.
- **Returns/Bills** of \$231 million, up \$80 million versus the same period in May 2022.
- **Refunds** of \$98 million, up \$35 million (unfavorable) versus the same period in May 2022.

Sales & Use Tax of \$180 million, up \$11 million versus the same period in May 2022. Typically, only a small proportion of expected regular sales and meals tax remittances is received by the mid-month date. The month-to-date sales and use tax of \$180 million is comprised of the following:

- **Regular sales** tax of \$84 million, virtually equal to the same period in May 2022.
- **Meals** tax of \$38 million, up \$5 million versus the same period in May 2022.

• **Motor vehicle** sales tax of \$59 million, up \$6 million versus the same period in May 2022.

Corporate & Business Tax of \$60 million, up \$41 million versus the same period in May 2022. The month-to-date increase is mostly due to increases in corporate and business estimated payments and a decrease in refunds.

Other Taxes of \$76 million, down \$28 million versus the same period in May 2022, includes a number of tax categories such as motor fuels, cigarette, estate tax, room occupancy, and deeds.

DOR advises against using this data to predict trends. At the time of the mid-month report, there is insufficient tax collection data to provide a reliable estimate of full-month results.
