### THE NEXT FEW MONTHS

As this fiscal year comes to a close, we are trying hard to offer more training opportunities for new and existing instructors. We will focus on adding more folks to our volunteer corps and will routinely offer "new volunteer instructor" workshops—about 3-5 each year. Also, since different teaching teams are asking for different options, we are offering the opportunity to include existing volunteers / Team Leaders who were rebuilding or restabling their teams at these events so training could be experienced as a group. Please let us know if you have any interest in this offer.

We are also starting to train existing instructors in other disciplines. A Bowhunter Ed workshop is scheduled for May 31, 2025 and we invited existing program volunteers who had expressed an interest in becoming a Bowhunter Education Instructor to attend. There are two prerequisites for in-

structors who wish to teach Bowhunter Education. All should successfully graduate from the course, and all should be trained to teach the course. While we relaxed these conditions during the pandemic, we are ready to get back on track to ensure all members in our teaching teams are well prepared to offer these courses. This event at Westboro FHQ on May 31<sup>st</sup> will cover both conditions.

Additional changes in personnel are ongoing. Steve Foster started his well-deserved retirement, and Cynthia Pratt was promoted to administrative Supervisor. Both of these positions will be filled soon in the coming months. #### REMEMBERING ED BARRETT



The MassWildlife Hunter Ed program received word from the Worthington Rod & Gun teaching team and from Mark Tisa, MDFW Director of the passing of Edward Barrett, Jr., a fellow hunter education instructor and member of the Worthington Rod & Gun teaching team. Ed was an avid outdoorsman, and his family and friends are honoring Ed's memory by encouraging family and friends to donate funds to the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife's (MassWildlife) Wildlands Fund in his memory.

Director Tisa noted that monies donated to MassWildlife's Wildlands Fund are restricted by state and federal statutes to be used solely for the conservation of fisheries and wildlife habitat lands and cannot be diverted for any other purpose. Tisa said, "we are honored that his family, friends, and community chose to remember Ed with gifts to MassWildlife contributing to our work to protect and conserve wildlife habitat across Massachusetts."

### FALCON NEST WATCH

Peregrine falcons often nest on manmade structures such as bridges and tall buildings—some even have cameras that let you peek inside their nests to witness falcons during breeding season. Program Staff conducted another New Volunteer Instructor Introductory Workshop in January 2025 at the MassWildlife Field Headquarters in Westborough and we took the opportunity to include existing volunteers / Team Leaders who were rebuilding or restabling their teams so training could be experienced as a group. Participants learn about program information and policies, curriculum requirements and how to use the instructor manual which includes a review of the lesson plan format. June 7: Spring Migratory Bird Walk, Cheshire – With open shrublands, grasslands, forests, and wetlands, Stafford Hill WMA is a great place to see a diversity of migratory birds. Join MassWildlife experts for a 1-mile guided walk to learn about birds and the habitats they need for courtship, nesting, and raising their young. The walk will take place from 8 – 10 a.m. (weather permitting). Birders of all experience levels are welcome. Registration is required.

June 7: Evening Whip-poor-will Walk, Hardwick – Muddy Brook WMA is home to one of the largest inland congregations of whip-poor-will in the state. Join experts from MassWildlife and East Quabbin Land Trust from 7 – 9 p.m. to experience the iconic whip-poor-will song on this 1.5-mile moonlit walk (weather permitting). Birders of all experience levels are welcome. Registration is required.

June 14: Birds, Bees, and Wildflowers Walk, East Falmouth – Get fired up and ready to grow! Join MassWildlife for a 1.5-mile guided walk through the Frances Crane WMA and learn about the many fire-adapted birds, native pollinators, wildlife, and wildflowers that make their home in this amazing grassland. The walk will take place from 9-11 a.m. (weather permitting). Birders of all experience levels are welcome. Registration is required.
