

Massachusetts Developmental Disabilities Council (MDDC) FY2023 Impact Report

Our Mission

At the MDDC, our mission is to provide opportunities for people with developmental disabilities (PWDD) and families to enhance independence, productivity and inclusion.

Goal Oriented Approach

Goal 1: Advocacy and Leadership

The MDDC supported self-advocacy, self-determination, and leadership through trainings with Massachusetts Advocates Standing Strong (MASS). It partnered with disability organizations to train older youth in leadership and supported decision-making. It collaborated with family-led advocacy groups and cultural brokers from underserved communities. The MDDC continued supporting the Gopen and Crocker Fellowships. It supported self-advocates as Charting the LifeCourse Ambassadors and provided technical assistance to improve model accessibility.

Goal 2: Systems Change

The Council educated policymakers and worked with coalitions to advance disability-related policies. A decade-long legislative effort led to the nation's first law expanding higher education for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Advocacy secured a \$10 million increase in in-home skilled nursing rates and policy changes allowing MassHealth coverage for specialized formula. The Council led or joined efforts on self-determination, skilled nursing, supported decision-making, disability rights, employment, and accessibility. Its recommendation led to a plain-language proclamation of DD Awareness Month with multilingual access.

Goal 3: Information, Education, and Awareness

Staff and partners educated hundreds on community living, decision-making, voting, employment, relationships, and transition. Communications efforts expanded to include underserved communities. The MDDC remained a leader in promoting supported decision-making as an alternative to guardianship. Ongoing public health risks and workforce shortages limited in-person participation. However, there was increased reach in virtual training across Massachusetts.

FY2023 by Numbers

1,058 PWDD educated about self-direction and leadership.

415 family members educated about advocacy and leadership.

530 other community members participated in activities to increase their knowledge.

257 PWDD increased advocacy.*

31 family members increased advocacy.*

Partnered with 16 stakeholder groups promoting policies that make it easier for PWDD to live in the community.
