Context

Farming in Massachusetts today

According to the 2022 Census of Agriculture, Massachusetts has:

\$607 13,896 producers* and 7,083 farms on 464,451 acres 14,032 hired farm workers of farmland (about 9% of MA land) with with a payroll of \$204 million land and buildings worth \$6.4 billion

million of agricultural products sold

^{*} A "producer" is a person who is involved in making decisions for the farm operation

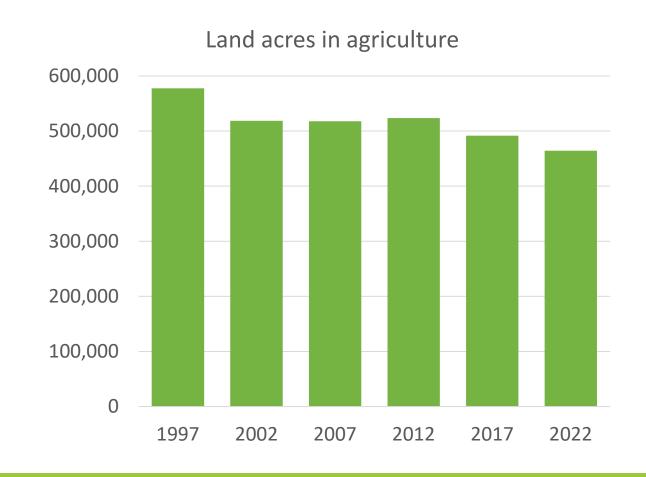


Why is the Farmland Action Plan important?

We are losing agricultural land fast!

Between 1997 and 2022 Massachusetts lost 113,000 acres

- 3.7 times the size of the land area of Boston
- 1.8 times the size of Martha's Vineyard
- 12.4 acres per day



Farms Under Threat


American Farmland Trust's "Farms Under Threat 2040" Report, between 2016 and 2040 Massachusetts, without additional investment and policy changes, is projected to lose

1200 50,000 – 89,000 with a loss of \$91 million 4,900 acres of farmland lost (that's about 1.6 – 2.9 times the size of Boston's land area!)

What is the Farmland Action Plan?


- State funded

Who will implement the Plan?

This is a plan for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

MDAR is promoting, monitoring and facilitating implementation of the Plan, building momentum from existing programs and initiatives.



How is it organized?

Plan is organized into:

- Goals
- Strategies
- Actions
- Tasks

For each task we are looking for a lead implementer and other potential implementers. When work starts on a task, that group will then reach out to other interested individuals.



Implementing for all farmers

- All stages of farmer beginning through retiring
- All areas of the state
- Variety of farm types dairy, fruit, vegetables, nurseries, maple, etc.
- Urban and rural farming
- Historically Underserved Farmers (see graphic)
- Many other characteristics



Implementation

Key features for implementation

Already started

- Regular communication via newsletter and meetings
- Foster partnerships and collaboration
- Learn from feedback on previous processes, including plan creation
- Encourage wider engagement and implementation
- Refine the implementation matrix

Going forwards

- Focus on topics or specific tasks not the entire plan
- Better understanding of equitable engagement and feedback mechanisms
- Build trusted relationships
- Capacity building, including funding for partners to help with implementation

Refining the implementation matrix


The matrix is a living document that tracks

Implementation with Ag Comms

Ag Comms as "Other potential implementers"

- Current version (2/5/2025) has 6 tasks. For now, look for "Ag comm" and "muni" as a good place to start.
- Next version (Fall 2025) will likely have around 30
- Suggest places to add "Ag Comms" using the matrix portal!

Sampling of tasks from the matrix

- 1059 Create watchlists of important farmland properties that are not yet protected and prioritize them in terms of threat of loss and importance, and support municipalities and land trusts in doing the same.
- Develop and implement a program to train municipalities on the economic, food security, and other benefits of farmland, to help them understand the details of Chapter 61A Right of First Refusal (ROFR), and to encourage them to exercise their rights or assign them to nonprofits.
- 1066 For properties at risk of turnover or conversion, educate owners about APR opportunities.
- 1104 Explore mechanisms that would require towns with municipal agricultural commissions have those bodies review and provide a recommendation on ROFRs under Chapter 61A. Provide commissions with education to enable them to do so effectively.
- Encourage all municipalities to adopt the CPA, create conservation commission funds, and fund them for agricultural land protection projects as consistent with the CPA statute.
- 1458 Work with municipalities to identify and publicly list all publicly owned land that is either in current agricultural production or suitable for agricultural production. Consider each parcel for inclusion in the farmland licensing program.
- Support municipalities in developing their own farmland licensing agreements and plans.
- 1256 Provide a clearinghouse of all the Right to Farm bylaws municipalities have passed, along with the model the state created.
- 1442 Promote ag mediation services available to help when there are disputes between farmers and those they interact with.
