Katharine's current focus for engagement is with potential partners for implementation of the plan. There are a lot of potential partners!

Land Trusts as potential partners – On September 18th, MDAR and the Massachusetts Land Trust Coalition hosted a discussion with land trusts about how they could get involved with implementing the plan. There are many opportunities that can suit the wide range of focuses and specialties of land trusts across the Commonwealth. Do you work for a land trust? Plan Spotlight – How can I farm on public lands? What is land licensing?

There are several parts of the Farmland Action Plan which talk about how public lands owned by the state or municipalities can be used by farmers for agriculture.

MDAR's State-owned Farmland Licensing Program seeks to preserve publicly held agricultural land in the state by licensing state-owned or municipally-owned properties to farmers. MDAR has care and control of 1,058 acres of agricultural land throughout the state, placing permanent Article 97 protection on these properties. MDAR also licenses 164 acres of agricultural land on the behalf of other state agencies, ensuring their continued agricultural use.

The Farmland Licensing Program is regularly seeking new opportunities to preserve public agricultural land and connect it with farmers. The Department can enter into agreements with willing state agencies or municipalities to facilitate the licensing of their agricultural land or provide technical assistance to public entities looking to do this themselves.

MDAR licenses property for an initial period of up to 5 years with the option to renew for an additional 5-year period. As identified in the Massachusetts Farmland Action plan, there is priority for <u>historically underserved farmers</u> (beginning, socially disadvantaged, veteran and limited

resource farmers) for the licensing of these properties. Tenants have the ability to install temporary structures such as high tunnels, sheds, fences, and irrigation systems on a case-by-case basis.

Properties are currently available in in Agawam, Lakeville, and Middleborough, MA totaling 35.4 +/-acres. Proposals for use of the agricultural land are due before November 22nd at 2pm.
