Welcome to the fourteenth quarterly issue of the Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) Program Newsletter. The MVP grant program provides support for communities in Massachusetts to begin the process of planning for climate change resiliency and implementing priority projects. The Commonwealth awards communities with funding to complete vulnerability assessments and develop action-oriented resiliency plans. Communities who complete the MVP Planning Grant program become certified as an MVP community and are eligible for MVP Action Grant funding and other opportunities.


Announcements

GEAR Release: Guides for Equitable & Actionable Resilience

The MVP team is excited to announce the launch of a new planning resource, **GEAR:** Guides for Equitable and Actionable Resilience. GEAR was developed as a component of MVP 2.0 but is publicly accessible to all. It provides communities with access to climate data and guidance to assess local climate change impacts, as well as suggested actions and case studies for building community resilience. GEAR allows users to investigate the ways in which community systems (such as

housing, infrastructure, or health) interact with a specific climate hazard (such as heat, drought, or coastal flooding). There are 18 unique guides that feature background information and data from the Massachusetts Climate Change Assessment, guided explorations utilizing GIS maps, actions to consider, and MVP case study examples. MVP Project Highlights

Mashpee: Increasing Resilience to Harmful Algal Blooms in Santuit Pond (FY23)

Mashpee <u>recently voted by a majority</u> to expand their current wetland buffer zones from 100 feet to 150 feet and to increase the current 50-foot requirements for natural vegetative buffer strips to 75 feet. Residents also

voted to restrict horsepower on Santuit Pond. These bylaws and corresponding education and outreach were developed through Mashpee's FY23 Action Grant.



Ayer-Devens Main Streets Pocket Forests Pilot (FY23)

Ayer & Devens recently hosted a Pocket Forest Planting Day on East Main Street. An area of 2000 square-feet was planted on a 0.44-acre town-owned parcel by over 100 attendees. Over 300 plants were planted, and fences and drip irrigation were installed. Pocket forests, or community forests, can help increase biodiversity and habit, improve air and water quality, provide shade and cooling, and enhance public health and community resilience.

Grant Opportunities

Parks and Conservation Grants:

- The EEA Division of Conservation Services (DCS) is seeking applications for the FY 2024 <u>Parkland Acquisitions and Renovations for Communities</u> (PARC) grant. PARC grants help communities acquire parkland, develop new parks, and renovate existing parks.
- PARC grant applications are due by 3:00 p.m. on July 13.

 The EEA Division of Conservation Services (DCS) is seeking applications for the FY 2024

 <u>Local Acquisitions for Natural Diversity</u> (LAND) grants. LAND grants provide funds to municipal conservation commissions to purchase conservation land. LAND grant applications are due by 3:00 p.m. on July 13.
- The EEA Division of Conservation Services (DCS) is seeking applications for the FY 2024 <u>Conservation Partnership</u> grants. Conservation Partnership grants provide funds to non-profit organizations for land acquisitions. Conservation Partnership applications are due by 3:00 p.m. on July 17.

- MA Office of Coastal Zone Management (CZM):

 Coastal Habitat & Water Quality Grants CZM is seeking proposals for projects that assess and treat stormwater impacts and support comprehensive habitat restoration planning activities. Projects must address nonpoint source (NPS) pollution from paved or unpaved surfaces; build capacity for future implementation of stormwater green infrastructure; or assess aquatic and coastal habitat within the coastal watershed for the purposes of restoration plan development. Municipalities within the Massachusetts coastal watershed are eligible to apply, along with certified 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, regional planning agencies, and stormwater collaboratives in partnership with municipalities. See the RFR on the COMMBUYS website for eligibility requirements, project categories, and evaluation criteria. Proposals are due by 5:00 pm on June 16.
 - <u>Coastal Resilience Grants</u> CZM is seeking proposals for innovative and transferable local and regional projects to address coastal flooding, erosion, and sea level rise impacts.

For FY 24, CZM will provide funding and technical assistance to coastal communities, certified 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations that own vulnerable coastal property that is open and accessible to the public, and federally recognized and state-acknowledged Massachusetts Tribes. Eligible project types include evaluating vulnerabilities and risks, public outreach, and redesigning and retrofitting vulnerable municipally owned facilities and infrastructure, shoreline restoration, and proactive planning projects. Applicants may request up to \$2 million in funding per project. Projects must be completed by June 30, 2024 - or projects may be selected for extended contract end date up to June 30, 2025 (FY25), depending on the proposal and EEA funding decisions. See the RFR on the <u>COMMBUYS website</u> for eligibility requirements, project categories, and evaluation criteria. Proposals are due by 4:00 pm on July 11. The question and answer period for the RFR is open until 4:00 pm on June 13. Please submit questions to patricia.bowie@mass.gov.
