When there is an oil spill or release of hazardous materials, cleanup and assessment occur





Cleanup

- Assess contamination & control source
- Reduce risk to human health & environment

Natural Resource Damages Assessment & Restoration

- Assess extent and duration of natural resource injuries
- Collect monetary damages
- Restore the injured resources & compensate public for losses



Natural Resources Held in Trust for the Public by the Commonwealth

Natural Resources:

- Biota (fish and wildlife)
- Surface Water
- Groundwater
- Air
- Soils, Sediments

Natural Resource Services:

- Fishing, hunting, and shellfishing
- Habitat for wildlife
- Recreation
- Spiritual or cultural use
- Water Supply

Colrain Acid Spill (1999)

- 2003 settlement for 1999 acid spill
- Grant solicitation and award in 2017
 - Franklin Land Trust:
 North River Baseline
 Assessment/Large
 Woody Debris
 Demonstration Project







Example of Natural Resource Injury and Restoration: Blackburn & Union Superfund Site

- Hazardous substances released from the Site injured ecological resources in Walpole, MA
- Trustees funded:
 - Removal of Mill Pond dam on Traphole Brook
 - Design and permitting to upgrade 2 culverts to meet stream crossing standards
 - Freshwater wetland restoration near Memorial Pond





Barnhardt Acid Spill-Settlement and Trustees

Barnhardt Manufacturing Company & North River LLC Settlement

- 2021 settlement with responsible parties
- ~\$1.5 Million for violating Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, Endangered Species Act, Clean Waters Act, Hazardous Waste Management Act, Oil and Hazardous Material Release Prevention and Response Act, and Inland Fisheries Statute.
- \$225,000 for Natural Resource Damages restoration projects

NRD Trustee

 Commonwealth of Massachusetts, acting through the Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs (EEA) represented by MassDEP



Barnhardt Acid Spill Restoration


\$225,000 in available funding for projects that:

- Restore, replace, and/or acquire the equivalent of natural resources or natural resource services relating to natural resources and resource services that were injured as a result of releases from the Site.
- Natural resources that were injured included cold water fisheries, aquatic life, riverine and wetland resources, sediment, and sediment-dwelling organisms.
- Are in the Deerfield River watershed in Colrain with a focus on the North River subwatershed



Eligible Geographic Focus Areas

Projects must be in the Deerfield River Watershed in Colrain with a focus on projects in and around the North River subwatershed





Who Can Apply?

Public entities

 State or local government including a county, municipality, local public authority, school district, special district, district commission, regional government, any agency or instrumentality of government, and state authorities

Non-public entities

- Individuals, partnerships, and corporations (private, non-profit, quasi-public, or corporate body politic)
- ➤ Organizations based outside the eligible geographic focus area are eligible to apply so long as the proposed restoration project takes place within the eligible project area.
- ➤ Partnerships and collaborative efforts between organizations are encouraged.
- ➤ Eligible applicants <u>may</u> submit more than one application for distinct restoration projects.

North River Restoration Projects: Application Tips and Requirements

Application

- Section 1: Applicant Information
- Section 2: Project Information (include location, latitude/longitude, type of restoration project
- Section 3: Project questions
- Section 4: Community information
- Section 5: Site Photos
- Section 6: Project Summary: current conditions, project goals and natural resource benefits to be gained
- Section 7: Project Background current habit condition, etc.
- Section 8: Project Description how will it be designed, permitted, built, and implemented; operation/maintenance components; community outreach, etc. Includes Project Cost
- Section 9: Project Benefits
- Section 10: Signatures



How will Applications be reviewed?

- Eligibility Criteria
 - Mandatory
- Evaluation Criteria
 - Used to prioritize eligible projects
 - Include Focus, Benefit, and Implementation Categories
- Grant Review Team (includes MassDEP and other agencies)



Restoration Projects

Eligible Projects Must:

- Have a strong link to natural resources and the services they provide that were injured by the releases
- Be a tangible on-the-ground restoration project, including all required components; components may include data collection, feasibility evaluation, design, permitting, construction, maintenance, monitoring, and community involvement.
- Restore natural resources in the geographic focus area.
- Be consistent with federal, state, or local law, regulation, or policies.



Restoration Projects

Eligible Projects Must Not:

- Focus on resources that were not injured from releases from the Site
- Restore natural resources solely outside of the geographic focus area;
- Be subject to an independent, prior legal obligation to perform the project;
- Be a proposal to conduct a monitoring or research study not connected to a restoration project;
- Be located on a site so contaminated or degraded as to absorb greater funding to cleanup relative to restoration;
- Use funds for continued operation, maintenance or support of an existing restoration project or natural resource.



Evaluation Criteria

Nexus:

- Proximity to Injured Resources
- Relationship to Injured Resources

Benefit:

- Magnitude of Benefits
- Multiple Benefits
- Sustainability of Benefits
- Consistency with State, regional or local policies and plans
- Community Goals
- Stewardship
- Avoidance of Adverse Impacts
- EJ Community Benefits

Implementation:

- Administrative and Management Capability
- Site Ownership
- Soundness of Approach
- Level of Funding and Resources Needed for Project Implementation
- Measurable Results
- Reasonableness of Costs
- Implementation-oriented
- Project implementation readiness
- Operation and Maintenance Needs
- Leveraging of Additional Resources
- Level of Difficulty



Examples of Appropriate Restoration Projects

Projects that restore the same or similar natural resources that were injured such as:

- Increasing or improving coldwater fish habitat
- Improving stream connectivity through dam removal or culvert replacement
- Improving stream bed and bank conditions for resident fish
- Acquiring quality habitat for fisheries and wildlife



Examples of Inappropriate Restoration Projects

Projects that are otherwise required by law or permit such as:

Constructing a mitigation wetland, site cleanup, required stormwater improvements

Projects that do not restore the same or similar resources as those that were injured such as:

 Creating recreational paths, playgrounds, community gardens, recycling programs



Submitting Applications

- Application (Attachment A)
 - Includes Applicant and Project Information
- Detailed Application Requirements (Attachment B)
 - Provides details for Application, including Section 8ii Project Cost and Resumes
- Supplemental Terms and Conditions (Attachment C)
 - Applies to the grant contracts that are issued/awarded
 - Details requirements for invoicing regarding compensation and payment
 - Details conflict of interest and other obligations
- Conflict of Interest Certification Statement (Attachment D)
 - Applies to awardees and subcontractors/consultant

Application Deadline (estimated):

- The Application and all supporting documents must be delivered electronically to MassDEP by 5:00 PM on Friday, November 15, 2024.

NRD Grant Awards

Grant Awards

- Single or Multiple Awards as Contract
- Grant Awards will have maximum \$
- Duration:
 - 3 years from date of execution
 - Contract extension is at MassDEP discretion

Contracts

- Commonwealth Standard Contract and Commonwealth Terms and Conditions
- Supplemental Terms and Conditions
- Payment
 - Grantees <u>reimbursed</u> for costs/expenses
