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Dear Director Kim,

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed amendments to 310 CMR 11.00.

We have the following concerns:

1. There is no distinction that the "housing" must be long-term housing. This allows for streamlined permitting for massive short-term rental units which produce dramatically more pollution, trash, noise, vehicle trips, and demand on public resources and infrastructure.
2. Streamlining high density housing in areas without the infrastructure, water resources, or public transit to support it will overburden rural areas, particularly in places with private drinking water wells and septic tanks.
3. We do not feel that this streamlining protects current and future residents from the effects of legacy contamination or the compounded effects of the legacy pollution with the additional burdens brought on by high density development and insufficient public services.
4. "Streamlining" the regulatory requirements for high density housing while simultaneously "streamlining" the regulations regarding energy facilities siting feels like residents will suffer continuing environmental and public health disasters of "unintended consequences". You won't sequester carbon and reverse global warming by clearcutting forests, and it won't matter if you house people if you destroy the water they can't live without.

Who among you are looking at all these moving parts as one dynamic system?

How are residents of EJ communities supposed to see the picture as a whole if none of you are discussing it?

Why do SOME EJ communities matter more than others?

If these regulations were for permanent affordable housing, we could feel like this is about the housing crisis, but it isn't, so we can't.

Please do better. Tighten this up and take the big picture into consideration.

Rural communities will welcome more residents with careful siting for resource protection and support for increasing public services.

We resent "streamlining" environmental protection and pollution prevention regulations for developments with "short-term rental" units included as residential space.
