Honorable Chairs and Ranking Minority Members of the Committees on Ways and Means:

Pursuant to Section 6 of Chapter 14 of the General Laws<sup>1</sup>, the Department of Revenue (DOR) hereby submits its mid-month tax revenue report for the month of October 2017. The attached table shows October month-to-date tax revenue collections through October 13, 2017, along with changes from the equivalent period in October 2016.

Revenue collections are uneven and weighted toward month-end, and the brief period covered in the midmonth does not provide sufficient data for comparison to prior years. **Therefore, the Department strongly urges that mid-month figures should not be used to assess trends or project future revenues.** 

## **Context for October estimates**

October is among the lower months for revenue collection; no significant quarterly payments are expected from individuals or businesses. On average for the past several years, roughly 6.5% of annual revenue has been received during October. Only February has materially lower revenue in most years.

- **Total Tax** collections for the month-to-date period were \$680 million, up \$6 million or 0.8% versus the same period last year.
- **Income Taxes** totaled \$466 million, down \$42 million or 8.2% from the equivalent period in October 2016.
- Sales & Use Tax collections were \$77 million at mid-month, which is \$3 million or 3.2% less than the 2016 figure. Regular Sales and Meals Tax revenues are heavily weighted toward the second part of the month, so the mid-month revenue figure is not predictive.
- **Corporate & Business Taxes** were \$68 million for the October month-to-date period, which is \$39 million or 134.6% more than the last year. Because October is not a major month for business tax collections, a moderate lift in revenues results in a large percentage increase.
- **Other Taxes** totaled \$68 million at October mid-month, which is \$11 million or 19.5% more than the 2016 figure.

## Detail

**Total Income Tax** of \$466 million for mid-month October comprises the following:

- Withholding of \$449 million, down \$43 million from mid-month October 2016.
- Estimated Payments of \$19 million, down \$3 million versus the same period last year.
- **Returns/Bills** of \$22 million, which is \$2 million more than the same period last year.
- **Refunds** for the October 2017 month-to-date period were \$23 million, which is \$3 million less than the same period last year (favorable variance).

**Sales & Use Tax** collections of \$77 million for the October month-to-date period are \$3 million or 3.2% less than the equivalent period last year. Only a small proportion of expected Regular Sales and Meals remittances are received by the mid-month date.

- The \$29 million in Regular Sales Tax collections is \$9 million less than the same month-to-date period in 2016.
- Meals Tax revenues of \$13 million month-to-date are \$3 million more than the October month-todate period last year.
- Vehicle Tax revenues of \$35 million for the month-to-date period are \$3 million above the equivalent 2016 figure.

**Corporate & Business** revenues were \$68 million for the month-to-date period, which is \$39 million or 134.6% more than the same period in October 2016.

All Other includes a number of tax categories including motor fuels, cigarettes, estate taxes, and deeds. Revenues of \$68 million for the month-to-date period were \$11 million more than mid-month October 2016.

Because collections are weighted to the end of the month, we do not use the mid-month figures to project full-month revenue. Comparisons to prior-year periods are unreliable because of normal fluctuations and calendar differences in the short 15-day window of incremental data.
