Officially created by recently signed Executive Order No. 624, and tasked with implementing a whole-of-government to compete for federal funding by:



Identifying key federal funding opportunities that advance Healey-Driscoll Administrations priorities including infrastructure, equity, job creation, economic competitiveness, climate resiliency and decarbonization, workforce development, and more



Leading bi-weekly meetings of the **Advisory Council on Federal Funds and Infrastructure,** to facilitate inter-agency coordination and promote government-wide strategies for maximizing federal funding



SUPPORT FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

- Monthly Massachusetts Federal Funds Partnership meetings to update municipal, regional, tribal and community leaders with targeted information on recently announced grant programs where you are the eligible applicant

STATE MATCHING FUNDS / TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE LEGISLATION

- Proposal to create PAYGO Capital Investment and Debt Reduction Fund
 - Fund will leverage interest earnings on the state's Stabilization
 Fund to establish a permanent pay-as-you-go capital fund
 - Over the next three years, fund will unlock an estimated \$750
 million in resources to pursue federal funding opportunities
 - Includes \$50 million for municipal matching grants and a local infrastructure bank
 - Includes \$12 million towards local government technical assistance
- Adds to the over \$2 billion in existing resources
 Massachusetts has made available for state match
 - Current estimates show a potential need for \sim \$3 billion in state match to compete for \$17.5 billion in federal grants
 - This ready pool of funding will give Massachusetts a competitive edge in the pursuit of historic federal grant opportunities
- Legislation filed alongside signing of Executive Order on October 19th

BROWNFIELD PROJECTS

- Eligibility: Municipal & Tribal Governments
- About Brownfield:
 - A brownfield is a property where development may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant
 - EPA administered program seeking to sustainably reuse brownfields by funding environmental assessment, cleanup, and job training activities
 - EPA also provides technical assistance to brownfield communities through regional hubs to help address their brownfield sites
 - Massachusetts is located in EPA Region 1, making our regional partner the University of Connecticut

CLIMATE READY WORKFORCE

- Eligibility: Municipal & Tribal Governments
- About Climate Ready Workforce:
 - Aims to assist communities in forming partnerships that train workers and place them into jobs that enhance climate change resilience, especially to benefit underserved communities
 - Approx. \$60M in funding available
 - Expectation of providing between 10-20 awards ranging from \$500,000 to \$10M each
 - Applicants <u>required to submit a Letter of Intent</u> before submitting a full proposal for this opportunity

BUILDING RESILIENT INFRASTRUCTURE COMMUNITIES (BRIC)

- Eligibility: Municipal & Tribal Governments
- About BRIC:
 - Supports states, local communities, tribes and territories as they undertake hazard mitigation projects, reducing the risks they face from disasters and natural hazards
 - BRIC also offers direct technical assistance that can provide holistic hazard mitigation planning and project support to communities – which can be directly applied to though the FEMA website
 - Massachusetts' municipal governments must apply as a subapplicant to the BRIC program – with MEMA as the main applicant – to be eligible for funding
- There is a <u>MEMA BRIC NOFO</u> that will be published on their website
- Federally recognized tribal governments can apply as the lead applicant or as a sub-applicant


THRIVING COMMUNITIES PROGRAM

- About TCP:
 - Offers:
 - technical assistance, capacity building, and peer learning over the course of 3 years.
 - deep-dive support based on community needs and facilitated peer learning and networking activities
 - Municipalities can apply to both the National and Regional programs
 - Priority given to disadvantaged communities and organizations with limited prior experience with Federal transportation funding
 - Letter of Interest for National Program can be submitted via the DOT webform
 - Letters of Commitment are submitted with the lead applicant's final application packet
- Deadline: 4/1/2024 (General) , 5/1/2024 (Tribes)
- Contact: US DOT

NATIONAL ELECTRIC VEHICLE INFRASTRUCTURE (NEVI)

- Eligibility: Municipal Governments
- About NEVI:
 - Designed to repair and replace existing, but nonoperational, electric vehicle charging infrastructure
 - 80% Federal Share, 20% cost match
 - Check out the <u>map on the next slide</u> to see if there are any EV charging stations with issues located in your area and reach out to MassDOT to apply jointly to this program

EPA Clean School Bus Program

Overview and Past Funding Opportunities

- \$5 billion over five years (FY22 FY26)
 - EPA defined priority districts receive higher % of funding
 - 16 priority districts in MA
- FY22 Rebate (closed)
 - \$4 billion in applications
 - >12,000 buses; >90% electric
 - \$965 million awarded
- FY23 grant funding (closed)
 - Targeted larger bus fleets
 - Expect award announcement January 2024
- Expect future rebate and grant rounds for next 3 years






2023 EPA Clean School Bus Rebate



- **Due January 31, 2024**
- >\$500M in funding available
- Max of **25 buses**, no minimum
- **Eligible Applicants**: Private transportation providers and public-school districts
- Can replace diesel/gas buses with electric, propane, or CNG buses
- Minimum of 1 award per state (60% of awards for priority districts, 40% towards nonpriority districts)

ACT School Bus – MA State Program



Ensures successful electric school bus deployment projects, fill in funding and technical assistance gaps

- \$12M already awarded to support electric school bus deployment in MA
- \$2.5M award cap for school districts and transportation providers in upcoming round

Advisory Services Program

- MassCEC is currently enrolling up to 25 fleets to provide no-cost, full fleet electrification planning for school districts
- Prepares schools for electric school bus purchase and charging station installation
- ➤ Currently in the early stages of enrollment
 - Cohort includes Boston, Springfield, Mashpee, and Worcester

Fleet Deployment Program

- ► MA schools have leveraged nearly \$50M, in funding for 96 buses
 - Clean School Bus, ACT School Bus, DERA, and vendor/district cost share)
- ➤ 6 MA public school districts supported in first Deployment round (including all 5 EPA Clean School Bus awardees and 1 DERA awardee)
- ➤ RFP of second Deployment round expected November

Broadband Infrastructure Gap Networks Grant Program

Mass Broadband Institute launches new broadband grant program

Overview

- \$145 million program funded through ARPA Capital Projects Fund
- First source of federal broadband infrastructure funds to be deployed in MA
- Primary objective is to increase availability of broadband by "connecting the unconnected"

Eligible Locations


Homes, businesses and community anchor institutions that do not have access to broadband service
of at 100 Mbps download speeds and 20 Mbps upload speeds

Eligible Applicants

- Private entities and Public Private Partnerships
- Local governmental entities, including MLPs
- Co-operatives, electric co-operatives and utilities

Schedule

- Program launches week of October 23
- Two competitive grant solicitation rounds (1^{st} round deadline 12/13/23; 2^{nd} round









Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD)





BEAD projects are designed to provide fiber connectivity directly to the end user (last mile), including unserved, underserved, and CAIs.

Broadband Deployment



Unserved Locations

MBI awards funding in a manner that prioritizes Unserved Service Projects.



Underserved Locations

Once MBI certifies that it will ensure coverage of all unserved locations, it may then prioritize Underserved Service Projects.



Community Anchor Institutions (CAIs)

NTIA Strongly urges that MBI serves eligible Community Anchor Institutions next

- Ensure deployment of gigabit connections to community anchor institutions such as libraries and community centers that lack such connectivity.
- Eligible Community Anchor: entity (e.g., school, library, hospital) that facilitates greater use of high-speed Internet service by vulnerable populations and have download speed <1 Gbps.

Non-Deployment Uses



Access, Adoption, and Equity

MBI can apply any remaining funding to pursue eligible access-, adoption-, and equity-related uses, as well as any other uses approved by the Assistant Secretary that support the Program's goals.

Why is the BEAD Challenge Process Important?



The BEAD Challenge Process is vital because it determines the **locations and community anchor institutions** within each jurisdiction that are **eligible for BEAD funding**.



Key step toward achieving BEAD goals

Before the BEAD program can meet the goal of providing accessible and affordable broadband, all unserved locations, underserved locations, and eligible Community Anchor Institutions must be identified.



Helps ensure accurate results

An evidence-based, fair, transparent, and expeditious BEAD Challenge Process, as outlined in the NOFO and Challenge Process Policy Notice, helps ensure accurate results, an efficient process, and a precise allocation of resources.



Gathers information needed before running the subgrantee selection

The subgrantee selection process cannot be run without first having an accurate and comprehensive list of eligible locations and CAIs.





BEAD Challenge Process

BEAD CHALLENGE PROCESS DESIGN REQUIREMENTS

1

Publication of Eligible Locations

- The Eligible Entity publishes the set of locations eligible for BEAD funding which includes the full universe of locations potentially eligible for BEAD funding minus those removed in the modifications to location classifications process.
- This set also includes locations considered served.

2

Challenge

- The Eligible Entity defines the level of evidence needed for a challenge.
- A permissible challenger submits a challenge to the EE's online portal ("challenge portal") and the location becomes challenged.
- These challenges must be visible to the relevant ISP

3

Rebuttal

- A rebuttal of a challenger makes the location or locations disputed.
- A challenge that is not rebutted within the rebuttal period is sustained.
- A provider may agree with the challenge, making the location(s) sustained.

Final Determination

 The Eligible Entity either sustains the disputed locations, or rejects the dispute.



Municipal Digital Equity Planning Program



Pairing municipalities with a prequalified consultant to undergo a digital equity planning process **at no cost** to the city or town. Regional applications are encouraged!

Program Goals:

- Guide municipal decision-making related to services and infrastructure that will increase access, adoption and usage of the internet.
- Prepare municipalities to **submit grant proposals** to existing or
 forthcoming state or federal
 programs to support digital inclusion
 activities.

BROADBAND INSTITUTE

Free Wi-Fi in Affordable Housing

Massachusetts Apartment Wi-Fi Initiative

- One of six initiatives launched under Massachusetts Digital Equity Partnerships Program.
- Partner Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC)
- Support to establish residential Wi-Fi networks at multi-unit housing sites operated by public and non-profit affordable housing providers.
- MBI covers all capital costs associated with network design, construction, and equipment, and the first year of ongoing operating expenses.

Projects result in **free**, in-unit high speed internet access without the need for a broadband subscription. Addresses affordability barrier to broadband adoption for low-income households.

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a new **federal government program** that helps families pay for home Internet and connected devices. The ACP benefit provides:

Affordable Connectivity Program



AFFORDABLE CONNECTIVITY PROGRAM

WHAT IS IT?

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC program that helps connect families and households struggling to afford internet service.

The benefit provides:

- Up to \$30/month discount for internet service;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands; and
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet purchased through a participating provider.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Participates in any of the following assistance programs: SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, Veterans Pension or Survivor Benefits, SSI, WIC, or Lifeline;
- Participates in any of the following Tribal specific programs: Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribal TANF, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, or Tribal Head Start (income based);
- Participates in the Free and Reduced-Price School Lunch Program or the School Breakfast Program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating broadband provider's existing low-income internet program.

TWO STEPS TO ENROLL

1

Go to AffordableConnectivity.gov to submit an application or print a mail-in application

2

Contact your preferred participating provider to select an eligible plan and have the discount applied to your bill.

Some providers may have an alternative application that they will ask you to complete.

Eligible households must <u>both</u> apply for the program <u>and</u> contact a participating provider to select a service plan.






