1. Welcome and Overview of Meeting Logistics

María Belén Power welcomed all attendees.

Sophia Spungin provided an overview of the meeting logistics, including the use of the question and answer (Q&A) box and the availability of interpreters.

2. Agenda Overview

María Belén Power reviewed the meeting agenda.

3. Roll Call/Approval of Prior Meeting Minutes

María Belén conducted a roll call of the EJC members. At the start of the meeting, the following council members were present: Marcos Luna, Cheryll Holley, Caroline Hon, Kalila Barnett, Madeline Fraser Cook, Miles Gresham, Jen Salinetti

María Belén opened the floor for a motion to approve the minutes from the June 12, 2025 EJC Meeting #20. **Cheryll Holley** motioned to approve. **Caroline Hon** seconded the motion. All present council members accepted the minutes. **Kalia Barnett abstained. (7 approved and 1 abstained)**

María Belén opened the floor for a motion to approve the minutes from the August 21, 2025 EJC Meeting #21. **Cheryll Holley** motioned to approve. **Jen Salinetti** seconded the motion. All present council members accepted the minutes. **Kalia Barnett and Caroline Hon abstained. (6 approved and 2 abstained)**

4. First Public Question and Answer Session

Virtual public participants provided comments and inquiries:

- A participant requested a contact for directing people to learn more about EJ and what resources are available.
- A participant expressed concern over their community losing their EJ designation. A councilmember replied with methods for next steps on how a community can reinstate their designation.

5. Presentation on the MassEnviroScreen

Speakers **Undersecretary of Environmental Justice and Equity María Belén Power** and **Environmental Justice Liaison Syenna Mashmasarmi**, from the **Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs**, provided an overview of the MassEnviroScreen. The MassEnviroScreen tool is a tool designed to assign a cumulative burden score to every census block group in Massachusetts, designed to be equitable, transparent, and collaborative. The MassEnviroScreen tool will provide a single, publicly-accessible tool which showcases the existence of cumulative burdens. MassEnviroScreen is being developed by OEJE with input from state agencies GIS teams, academic and public health experts, CBOs and EJ advocates, and Indigenous representatives.

Next steps in the dissemination of information regarding MassEnviroScreen include a Thursday, November 6th webinar, participation in public meetings and feedback sessions, and the availability of providing written comments on the online web application.

Councilmembers inquired about the weight of the scores, missing data and taking into account lived experience, and suggested it would be helpful if guidance was provided on making the tool more actionable, including additional community engagement and accessible trainings.

Virtual participants inquired about taking into account topography to improve the accuracy of exposure to air pollutants and communities that were undesignated as EJ communities.

6. Presentation on Mass Save

Guest speakers from the **Department of Energy Resources**, the **Energy Efficiency Director Jo Ann Bodemer**, and the **Environmental Justice Senior Lead Elischia Fludd**, provided an overview of the Mass Save program. Mass Save is a program that helps residents and businesses save money on energy bills. Jo Ann and Elischia reviewed the eligibility of the residential sector, the income eligible sector, and the commercial and industrial sector. The Mass Save program considers equity a key factor, language access, and guidance for residential and small business customers. As part of this initiative, a heat pump hot water heater online marketplace and decarbonization consultations are made available with translation services.

Councilmembers inquired about providing all datasets (i.e. renters and limited English-speaking households) and are interested in seeing percentages over time as a measure of progress.
