the acquisition of one MRI, magnetic resonance imaging unit, and one computed tomography unit, which is a CT unit. The total cost of purchasing this equipment is \$9,476,208.

Before we open the hearing tonight, I would like to note that this is a public hearing and written testimony -- people often voice concerns about the likely effects of the proposed project, not only on people's health, but on the community. To the extent possible, I want you to know that DoN, my staff and I, will take each of your concerns into consideration while reviewing the DoN application.

All persons who wish to speak will be heard. This is not an adjudication, but it shall be in the nature of public forum. No questions will be permitted. The DoN staff, me and my staff, will take all relevant information into account in preparing a recommendation to the Massachusetts Public Health Council, whose decision on whether to approve this DoN application will be made at one of its upcoming monthly public meetings in Boston.

Again, just to reiterate, at the entrance of the room, we have signup sheets for anyone wishing to speak. I will be using those. Any

public official wishing to speak will be taken out of turn, as is our customary practice. We will call up each speaker individually; and to conserve time, we'll also call the name of the speaker next in order and invite them to come sit in the front row here.

We're going to ask each speaker to begin by stating their name, affiliation or town or residence. We ask speakers to speak clearly, so that our note-taker can take notes, and to limit your presentations to 3 minutes or less. And we will be timing people, so that everyone wishing to speak will be able to do so.

The Applicant will be allotted 15 minutes to present information about the proposed project. And they will go first.

If you brought a written copy of your remarks, it would be helpful if you would leave a copy here with our court reporter on the right. You can be assured that, again, the Department will consider all comments, whether presented orally or in writing. It's not necessary to speak at this hearing to have your testimony considered and included in the meeting record.

Again, in the interest of time, if your 1 2 oral testimony is lengthy, we suggest you present a summary of those remarks, because, again, each 3 person will only receive 3 minutes, and submit a 4 full text of your comments in writing. Whether you 5 comment or not, please know that we, the Department, 6 7 greatly value and appreciate your participation in 8 the DoN process. 9 The deadline for receiving comments is October 7th, at the end of the day. Our mailing 10 address is Massachusetts Department of Public 11 Health, 250 Washington Street, Boston, Massachusetts 12 13 02111. You also may email us at 14 dph.don@state.ma.us. You don't need to write this 15 down, because all of this information is out on the 16 table in the front on slips of paper. 17 So now without further ado, I'm going to ask Dr. Smith to come up -- he is part of the 18 Applicant -- to talk about the project. After he is 19 20 done, I will call the first person on the list. 21 And the first person is Lisa Phelps, and 22 the second person is Joseph Casey. So I'll ask Dr. 23 Smith to come up. Thank you. 24 MR. SMITH: Thank you very much for having

me and allowing me to speak this evening. I know we have many speakers, so I will certainly be under the 15-minute allotment.

My name is Allen Smith. I live in
Topsfield, Massachusetts, and I am President of the
Brigham & Women's Physicians Organization or BWPO,
which is a faculty practice plan for more than 1,750
physicians. I have been in this role since 2007 and
am involved in clinical strategic planning at
Brigham & Women's Hospital, as well as at Partners
HealthCare, and that includes physician leadership
development, community health, contracting strategy,
population health management, and health care
policy.

I have a Masters in Science in Health

Administration and Population Health, and I'm an

Assistant Professor in Medicine at Harvard Medical

School.

I'm here this evening to present Partners
HealthCare System's application for the expansion of
imaging services at the Brigham & Women's Hospital's
outpatient satellite in the Brigham & Women's -technical difficulties here. I'm here this evening
for Partners HealthCare's application for the

expansion of imaging services at Brigham & Women's Hospital's outpatient satellite in the Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center at 20 Patriot Place, Foxborough. We are seeking the Department of Public Health's approval for the acquisition of one magnetic resonance imaging or MRI unit and one computed tomography or CT unit at the Foxborough Center.

Currently, the Foxborough Center's imaging services include one CT unit and one MRI unit.

These single MRI and CT units currently support the needs of patients seen for health care services at the Foxborough Center and provide access to local diagnostic imaging for residents in Southeastern Massachusetts who receive specialty care at Partners HealthCare's Boston locations.

The Foxborough Center and the physician practices located in Foxborough together provide comprehensive care for the residents of Foxborough and surrounding towns, including primary care, specialty services, ambulatory surgery, urgent care and onsite laboratory and imaging services. With the expansion, we will be adding psychiatric services as well. It is important to understand

that our goal is to work with our integrated physicians to support access to a robust network of outpatient primary, specialty and urgent care services, and to support and fill patients needs for imaging services.

effort to meet the health care needs of the residents of Foxborough and surrounding communities at a convenient location. As detailed in the application, this effort will help to address severe primary care shortages in Bristol County, which has among the fewest primary care physician-to-residents ratio in Massachusetts. So we have a real shortage of primary care in that area and in that county. By adding additional primary care capacity here in Foxborough and coupling those primary care services with specialists, laboratory and imaging capacity, the Applicant can meet the health care needs of many of the region's residents without requiring them to travel outside of their community.

The need for additional MRI and CT capacity at the Foxborough Center is based on several factors. First, as detailed in the application, even with expanded hours, the current MRI and CT

1 units are already operating at capacity serving current patient needs. The expansion of primary 2 care and specialty care physician office services to 3 increase patient access in Foxborough will increase 4 the need for co-locating imaging, which our single 5 MRI and CT units will not be able to support. 6 7 expansion will allow the Foxborough Center to provide additional local imaging capacity to better 8 serve area residents who receive specialty care in 9 10 Boston. In addition, the statistics indicate that an aging population requires more diagnostic 11 capacity. The Foxborough Center's radiology 12 13 department needs sufficient capacity to meet the 14 needs of expanding patient panels and to continue to 15 ensure that patients who receive treatment in Boston 16 locations will be able to receive MRI and CT services locally, avoiding the time and expense of 17 going to Boston locations for imaging services 18 whenever possible. 19 20 As we engage with our patients, we receive 21 feedback that this local access to services, 22 including MRI and CT, is important and adds to 23 patient satisfaction.

The Foxborough Center takes patient

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feedback very seriously, both in connection with this proposed project and regarding the Foxborough Center in general. In developing this proposed project, we have provided information to the communities we serve and sought community input and feedback. In addition to holding a community meeting about the project, we proactively reached out to area community and business leaders. We still maintain a dedicated email address that the public can use to contact us specifically regarding questions and feedback about this proposed project.

From a population health management perspective, approval of this proposed project will enable the Foxborough Center to ensure sufficient MRI and CT capacity to support the hospital and other services offered, including primary care, orthopedics, women's health and cardiology, right here at Patriot Place. Convenient, easy access to imaging services in the same location where patients see their physicians and other providers fosters care coordination, improves the overall quality of services and promotes better health outcomes.

Because the imaging services will be located at a Brigham & Women's Hospital satellite location, all

1 CT and MRI results for tests performed at the 2 Foxborough Center will be integrated into the Partners HealthCare (Epic) electronic health record. 3 Such integration of health information technology 4 systems directly affects health outcomes, as access 5 to a single, integrated health record improves care 6 7 coordination. Note that the Foxborough Center is the only comprehensive Partners facility within this 8 geographical catchment area. By facilitating 9 10 effective population health management for patients receiving care in Foxborough, the proposed project 11 will ensure that the Foxborough Center will have the 12 capacity to provide cost-effective, high quality 13 imaging services, creating care efficiencies for 14 15 patients. 16 It is important to note that the Foxborough Center works to provide care in a culturally 17 competent manner and to support health equity and 18 access to care for all patients, including those 19 20 deemed underserved. The proposed project will not 21 affect accessibility of Brigham & Women's services 22 for poor, medically indigent and/or 23 Medicaid-eligible individuals. In fact, it will improve access for these underserved patients. 24 The

Hospital does not discriminate based on ability to pay or payer source, and this practice will continue following implementation of the proposed project.

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Importantly, the imaging services provided by these additional CT and MRI units will be reimbursed at the same contracted rates as the services provided by the current units at the Foxborough Center. By placing these units at the Foxborough Center, the Applicant's patients and providers will experience efficiencies of co-located services, avoiding unnecessarily travel, and improving overall health outcomes to reduce health care expenditures. Approval of this project will contribute positively to the Commonwealth's goals of containing the rate of growth of total medical expenses and total healthcare expenditures.

Approval of this project will enable the Foxborough Center to continue to meet the current and projected imaging needs of our patients and communities we serve now and into the future and will further the health care goals of the Commonwealth.

On behalf of the Applicant, I ask that you approve this proposed project. Thank you very much

1 for your consideration of this application and for 2 giving me the opportunity to address you this 3 evening. HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: May I have Lisa 4 5 Phelps and Joseph Casey come up. Lisa, you can take the podium. 6 7 MS. PHELPS: My name is Lisa Phelps, and I live in Dedham, Massachusetts. I'm a licensed 8 clinical social worker at the Brigham & 9 10 Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center. I work with the Foxborough Center and provide social work 11 services within my scope of practice. I also 12 13 provide and coordinate with other staff to provide screening and services related to social 14 determinants of health. 15 In my practice and role, I help patients 16 improve their health outcomes and quality of life 17 through facilitating access to health care and 18 related services. I'm here this evening to provide 19 20 my support and approval of this Determination of 21 Need application for the following reasons: 22 As a social worker, one of my goals is to 23 provide or identify supports to help patients comply

with their plans of care. One of the challenges to

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meeting this goal is ensuring that my patients make and keep their appointments, and one of the best ways to do this is to try and schedule all of their needed care in coordinated appointments here in Foxborough, ideally on the same day.

A common concern for all of us is that patients may forego or delay health care because commuting into Boston for MRI, CT or other services is tremendously difficult for them. In this respect, having access to services in our community is an invaluable resource.

On a near daily basis, I am asked to assist coordinating transportation for patients to appointments in or near Boston. Recent patient transportation challenges include a concern from one local parent about missing her child's school bus if an appointment runs late or getting stuck in traffic when returning home.

Another person said he took \$150 from his savings to pay for an Uber because he did not have other transportation to a scheduled appointment.

A third patient stated he did not trust his car to get him to an appointment in Boston and was nervous his car may break down.

A final example is an elderly female who declined scheduling needed appointments, after missing two, because her adult child cannot take a half day or a full day off work to take her into Boston.

As mentioned by my colleagues, the

Foxborough Center has a significant need for
expanded imaging services to meet the needs of its
patients who receive care from Foxborough Health
Center physicians or who may be receiving care in
Boston, but need MRI or CT services. Due to this
demand, it is almost impossible to schedule a
patient for same-day imaging services appointments,
which are generally reserved for urgent cases.
Appointments in this most desirable time slot are
particularly difficult to get. By adding the
requested CT and MRI capacity, we would be able to
ease scheduling challenges. This would increase
adherence to medical care plans and decrease missed
appointments.

The MRI and CT equipment requested in this

Determination of Need application is essential to

ensure that when our most vulnerable patients need

MRI and CT services to help primary care and other

1 providers formulate and execute plans of care, they 2 can access services locally and in a timely and effective manner. I urge that the Department of 3 Public Health approve this Determination of Need 4 5 application. Thank you for the opportunity to provide 6 7 these comments. 8 HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you. 9 MR. CASEY: So I did try to skinny this down to thee minutes, so I apologize if it's a 10 11 little choppy. So good evening. My name is Joseph Casey. 12 13 I'm the President and CEO of Sturdy Memorial Hospital. I've worked there for over 30 years. 14 15 Sturdy is a 132-bed disproportionate share hospital, 16 meaning that it serves on public insurance programs such as MassHealth and Medicare. 17 So I appreciate the opportunity to provide 18 comments on behalf of the Sturdy Ten Taxpayer Group 19 20 concerning Partners HealthCare System's DoN 21 application. 22 On behalf of the Sturdy Group and for the 23 reasons I will detail below, we respectfully request two additional levels of review by the Department of 24

this DoN application, as is permitted by the DoN regulations.

In particular, we request the Commissioner direct the preparation of, one, an independent cost analysis and also, two, a DoN staff report and referral of this application to the Department and the Public Health Council for consideration in place of a delegated review process.

We envision the proposed scope of such an independent cost analysis as evaluating the likelihood and magnitude of additional patient migration from Sturdy to the Foxborough satellite as a result of the proposed project and its impact on Sturdy's ability to support the full range of community hospital services it provides, many of which are under-reimbursed and therefore dependent on the more lucrative commercially insured outpatient services, such as imaging.

Sturdy Memorial Hospital is designated by the Department of Public Health and the Health Policy Commission as having protected status as an independent community hospital. For example, DoN regulations prohibit surgicenters from being built in the primary service area of an independent

community hospital, unless the community hospital provides a letter of support. This is to help prevent cherry-picking from community hospitals of more mobile and lucrative commercially insured patients.

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Consistent with the special status of independent community hospitals and the rationale for our request, earlier this month the Health Policy Commission presented an update of its important Community Hospitals at a Crossroads report, reconfirming and further highlighting the enormous challenges for community hospital sustainability and the need for concerted action in this area to protect the essential services they provide. The Health Policy Commission's report details a downward spiral or death by a thousand cuts, whereby, one, academic medical centers and teaching hospitals continue to grow and align with more physicians, who then refer more patients to these hospitals, increasing their volume dramatically. This results in community hospitals lacking sufficient resources to invest in programs, staff and infrastructure, among other things necessary to effectively compete and attract

patients.

In short, academic medical centers and teaching hospitals continue to expand and reach deep into the community, thereby increasing risk of community hospital service reductions and closures.

Sturdy is a successful independent community hospital, with an outstanding medical staff that provides services appropriate for a community hospital. For those services not appropriate for a community hospital setting, we rely on hospitals such as Brigham & Women's, Mass. General and other tertiary hospitals in both Massachusetts and Rhode Island to provide those services.

We've also partnered with these institutions to bring services into our communities when possible. For example, we have a very successful radiation oncology partnership with Brigham & Women's in Mansfield, Massachusetts, which is an integral part of our highly successful cancer program.

When community hospitals and tertiary hospitals work together as they have in the past, the results should be an efficient, sustainable

1 health care delivery model -- community hospitals acting as the lower cost provider for 85 percent of 2 services appropriate for community hospitals, and 3 tertiary hospitals being referred the more complex 4 cases from the hospitals outside of their 5 communities. Unfortunately, this symbiotic 6 7 relationship has changed as tertiary hospitals now compete directly with community hospitals for overlapping services, as detailed by the Health 9 Policy Commission. 10 Sturdy is a full-service community 11 hospital, providing inpatient, including maternity, 12 and emergency room care, in addition to outpatient 13 services. Admissions for the current fiscal year 14 15 are expected to be approximately 8,000, including 645 deliveries, and we expect 49,000 emergency room 16 visits. 17 We have recently purchased a second CT unit 18 at Sturdy and have ample capacity on that machine to 19 20 serve additional Partners' patients, with some 21 capacity in MRI as well. 22 Hospital outpatient services 23 cross-subsidize the inpatient and emergency room services, because the outpatient services payer mix

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is always better, resulting in higher payment rates. Since the Foxborough satellite opened in 2009, Sturdy's commercial payer mix has decreased from 44 percent to just 30 percent of total services. MassHealth payer mix, is 20 percent at Sturdy. This includes our emergency department, where the payer mix is 31 percent MassHealth. The all outpatient payer mix at the Foxborough satellite is almost the opposite of Sturdy, with 62 percent commercial and just 5 percent MassHealth.

The strategy for tertiary hospital systems to spread into the community markets, such as Sturdy's, runs the risk of weakening those hospitals over time. The outpatient services we provide can be replaced, but the inpatient and emergency services are critical to our region and would be lost if Sturdy ever closed.

Based on the information provided by

Partners in connection with the DoN application, the

Foxborough satellite already attracts a significant

number of patients from Sturdy's primary service

area, approximately 34,000 at present, which numbers

will increase with the expansion of services and

equipment at the site.

1 In sum, the Department's review of this DoN 2 application should encompass the goal of ensuring 3 that the symbiotic relationship between Sturdy and Partners can continue in order to sustain the 4 important services provided by this independent 5 community hospital, thereby ensuring access and 6 7 contributing to cost containment, as the DoN 8 regulations require. 9 Thank you. HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you. 10 11 Mark Elfman and Cheryl Leary and Tom Ken Kenvin; if you can come down, please. 12 13 Mr. Elfman, three minutes, please. DR. ELFMAN: Good evening. My name is Dr. 14 Mark Elfman. I am the Chairman of the Board of 15 16 Selectmen for the Town of Foxborough. On behalf of our board and our town 17 management team, we want to offer our full support 18 for the Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care 19 20 Center's Determination of Need application. 21 Access to health care is important for the 22 well-being of any community, its residents and for 23 our regional economy. By having one of the highest

ranked hospitals in the country, the Brigham &

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Women's Hospital here in our own backyard, is highly beneficial. The addition of more primary care and specialty care physicians in Foxborough has, over time, been identified as a real need that is now being addressed. We collectively believe the residents of Foxborough and those in our surrounding communities should have access to excellent health care options where they live, as opposed to having to travel to nearby urban centers to receive a high level of care.

We further understand the imaging services that are presently offered at the Foxborough, which currently includes one MRI unit and one CT unit, are insufficient to meet the growing need. The present units are operating under extended hours, as they are already functioning at capacity.

In addition, Foxborough Center does not have a backup for either of those existing MRI or CT units. In the event that a machine goes down or if it is needed to suddenly serve urgent cases, service levels become constricted. Moreover, as the demand for medical services in this region continues to rise -- and all indications are that this is already the case -- a single MRI/CT unit will simply not be

enough to meet the future demand of patients' needs. There is also the growing perspective that once area residents who are currently receiving treatment in Boston begin to rely more heavily on the Foxborough Center for their scan needs, this will only provide further strain on the existing capacity of the service.

I think we all know and appreciate that traveling into Boston these days by any mode of transportation is difficult and less desirable due to the sheer volume of commuting traffic. By providing this improved range of services here in Foxborough, we believe that this will result in a quality of life improvement for our residents.

At the June 6, 2019 community meeting regarding this application, the Foxborough Center staff provided a thorough review of the need for the additional MRI and CT capacity, along with the information pertaining to the technology of the units to be acquired. Much like a town that needs to plan to meet the current future needs of its residents, the Applicant is now planning to meet the present and future imaging needs of its patients here in Foxborough and beyond. In this regard, the

Town fully supports these efforts.

Since its inception, the Foxborough Center has been engaged with the community and regularly communicates with town officials, including our office. Leadership and staff are also actively involved with the local Chamber of Commerce and the business community. They consistently support the community events and lend staff and physicians to help plan and participate in Town health and educational programs. We appreciate the level of involvement and are happy to support the Foxborough Center as one of our community Partners.

We urge that the Department of Public

Health approve this Determination of Need

application, and we thank you for the opportunity to

provide these comments.

"The Foxborough Center has regularly participated in our annual Age Well With HESSCO Conference. Since 2016, the Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center in Foxborough has been a member of the HESSCO Board of Directors, providing valuable input about the health and wellness of our community.

"HESSCO supports the Determination of Need application, as it will increase access to care and needed services within the HESSCO area community. Receiving care within the local community is of particular interest to the older adult community, who sometimes struggle with concerns related to transportation and mobility.

"The expansion of imaging services that the Determination of Need application identifies will go hand-in-hand with an expansion of primary care. As the increase in access to primary care services expands, the Center is also thoughtfully planning an increase in access to specialty care and ancillary services, such as the lab and imaging services. | 15 | HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Tom Kenvin. | |
| 16 | MR. KENVIN: Good evening. My name is | |
| 17 | Thomas Kenvin, Foxborough Fire Department, resident | |
| 18 | of Walpole, Massachusetts. I'll be reading a letter | |
| 19 | from Chief Michael Kelleher. | |
| 20 | Good evening. My name is Thomas Kenvin, | |
| 21 | Deputy Chief of EMS at Foxborough Fire and Public | |
| 22 | Health Nurse. I'm here to speak on behalf of | |
| 23 | Michael P. Kelleher, a 20-year veteran of the | |
| 24 | Foxborough Fire Department, a third generation | |

Foxborough resident, a patient at Brigham & Women's/Mass General Health Care Center, and the newly appointed Chief of Foxborough Fire Rescue.

Chief Kelleher regrets missing this hearing, but is out of town at the Kennedy School of Government's Homeland Security Program. My comments here tonight are to let the Department of Public Health know that Chief Kelleher and the Foxborough Fire Department support the Partners HealthCare System's Determination of Need application for the expansion of imaging services at Brigham & Women's Hospital's outpatient satellite at the Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center in Foxborough.

In addition to responding to, preventing, fighting and investigating fires, the Department shares responsibility for public safety with the police and other town departments. The Emergency Medical Services Division, staffed by an EMS Coordinator and highly trained paramedics, as well as the Foxborough Emergency Management Agency come under the jurisdiction of the Fire Department.

Recently, we began to coordinate with the Health Department to provide the Town's Public

Health Nursing service as a benefit of receiving additional Medicaid funding. This provides savings to the Town, as well as providing greater continuity of service to the community between Fire and the Board of Health and is, to our knowledge, the first such partnership in the state.

The Foxborough Fire Department interacts frequently with the Foxborough Center and the physician practices at Patriot Place. We respond when patients require emergency transport and coordinate transfer of the patients to the EMS crew in those instances. Foxborough Fire interacts with Brigham & Women's Hospital Emergency Medicine nurses and physicians around all major events at Gillette Stadium. As part of Foxborough Public Safety, Foxborough Fire works with the Foxborough Center leadership around regular fire drills, as well as initial creation and recent revisions to the Center's Emergency Operations Plan.

While EMS responds to emergency medical situations, having access to a outpatient location at the Brigham & Women's Hospital, as well as to primary and specialty physicians located in the Foxborough community, contributes to the overall

1 improved health and wellness of our residents and 2 the area communities. Getting regular preventative care and addressing identified illnesses and 3 conditions helps our residents maintain better 4 health and reduces the need for emergency care and 5 Town spending on emergency health services. We are 6 7 pleased to learn that more primary and specialty physicians will be coming to Foxborough; we need 8 more access to these services. Of course, as more 9 10 residents are able to access care in the community, the demand on the current single MRI and CT units 11 will be higher than those units are rated, as they 12 13 are already operating at capacity, with both services now on extended hours. This is why the 14 15 Foxborough Center is requesting additional units, so 16 that we're able to support the additional patient 17 care requests. In addition, we know that sometimes 18 conditions arise where residents need to access care 19 20 at tertiary hospitals in Boston, and we are 21 fortunate to live where it's possible to get such 22 However, possible doesn't mean easy, care. 23 convenient or inexpensive. If a resident needs to

see a specialist in Boston, having access to CT or

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1 MRI services at the Foxborough Center is much easier 2 and more cost-effective in both time and money. Having results in the same medical record means that 3 specialists in Boston can consult real time with 4 primary care and other providers in Foxborough, 5 adding to better coordination of care and timely 6 access to services. 7 I thank you for holding this hearing and 8 for receiving these comments. I would also like to 9 10 thank the men and women of the Foxborough Fire Department who are here to support this position. 11 strongly urge the Department of Health to approve 12 13 this Determination of Need application. HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you. 14 15 May I ask Tom O'Rourke and Kara Griffin to come closer up. 16 MR. O'ROURKE: Good evening. My name is 17 Tom O'Rourke. I reside in Norwood, and I'm the 18 President and CEO of the Neponset River Regional 19 20 Chamber. I'd like to thank you for the opportunity 21 to provide comments on this application. 22 The Chamber draws its membership from 23 Foxborough, as well as Canton, Dedham, Medfield, Milton, Norfolk, Norwood, Randolph, Stoughton, 24

Walpole and Westwood. Brigham & Women's/Mass.

General Health Care Center in Foxborough is one of our 500 members.

Our mission is to enhance quality of life and economic development in the Neponset River Region by supporting and connecting business, community, education and government.

Our vision is to be the premier member-driven organization uniting business, education and government to champion the Neponset River Region as a great place to live, work and play.

We are a nonprofit organization, and we partner with our members in supporting community efforts that align with our mission and vision.

Together, our members employ over 15,000 people, many of whom live in the Foxborough area, and get health care at the Foxborough Center. As local businesses, our members know how important access to local health care in the community is when people are deciding where to work, live and raise their families. Access to care, including primary and specialty care physician services, as well as the hospital satellite services, such as the CT and

MRI imaging services provided at the Health Care
Center, is critical for the economic health of our
communities and, of course, to the health of our
residents.

The Chamber's vision statement references our region as a great place to live, work and play. Access to the services that the Health Care Center provides is a significant part of making this area a great place. The Chamber believes that the area needs more access to care and that the need will only continue to grow.

The Chamber supports the availability of more health options and choices in the community, including additional primary and specialty care physicians at the Health Care Center. It was not long ago that the primary care physician practices at the Health Care Center were closed to new patients. We appreciate Brigham's work to increase access at the Health Care Center and the ongoing commitment to expand access to primary and specialty care for our communities.

We applaud the Health Care Center's commitment to inclusive, culturally competent care for all of our residents. The Health Care Center's

population health management efforts will allow for access to excellent, efficient health care in the local community, while controlling costs.

The Applicant is active in providing community education around health care topics and supports the Chamber's efforts in this regard. For example, next month the Chamber's Women's Leadership Alliance and the Tri-Town Chamber of Commerce's Women's Link are co-sponsoring an educational event at Patriot Place in Foxborough, where two Brigham & Women's Hospital physicians will explore current topics in women's health. Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center is a sponsor of the Neponset River Regional Chamber's Women's Leadership Alliance and is very active in the Chamber.

The Chamber understands that increasing access to primary and specialty care will increase the burden on the Foxborough Center's single MRI and CT units, which are already operating at expanded ours and at capacity. The Chamber supports adding the additional imaging services capacity at the Health Care Center to ensure that our communities will have access to the MRI and CT services as part of the coordinated care the Center provides,

1 avoiding the cost, inconvenience and stress of late 2 appointments, extended wait times, or going 3 elsewhere for these imaging services. Therefore, the Neponset River Regional 4 Chamber strongly supports this project and asks that 5 the Department of Public Health approve the 6 7 Determination of Need application. And we thank you for your thoughtful consideration of this application and the Chamber's comments. 9 10 HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you. 11 I also have Srini Mukundan come down; and next, Tyler Martin. 12 13 MS. GRIFFIN: Hi, everyone. I'm Kara 14 Griffin. And I'm going to kind of change it up a little bit. I'm speaking as a patient of the 15 16 Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center up in Foxborough. I've been a Mansfield resident 17 for 23 years. I live and work in Mansfield. 18 And kind of starting off ten years ago, 19 20 some people might think that I'm a Frequent Flyer 21 with my family up at the Brigham & Women's. 22 believe two of my kids were the first cast ever done 23 up there. Over the ten years, my three girls and myself have all utilized not only the urgent care 24

more recently, but the orthopedics, the scanning, the PT after.

I just want to talk about adding to quality of my life. As a working mother and having three daughters, at times, there were two of them that had an ailment we were taking care of, spent maybe two, three times a week going back and forth just to the facility for follow-up care. Without having it so close in our area and at such top-notch, I would be absolutely gray right now and completely insane.

Most recently, as I was stepping out of my car to get some coffee, I slipped on black ice. The firefighters did want to take me to a hospital that was far away. I opted to waive my right and wait for my husband to get home to go to the Brigham & Women's, because I have a relationship with the orthopedics there, and I knew my quality of care was going to be amazing.

Since then, during that process, I did need to get another MRI. And I have witnessed the fact that with the added care there, my MRI times were either 10:30 at night or 6 a.m. So there is a great need for these two machines to be brought to Foxborough. I just wanted to close out the night to

personally urge you to really think about this process. Thank you.

DR. MUKUNDAN: Good evening. My name is Dr. Srini Mukundan. I'm a neuroradiologist at the Brigham & Women's Hospital, and I serve as the medical director of the magnetic resonance imaging program at Brigham Health. I'm here this evening to voice my support advocacy for this Determination of Need application.

In radiology, we strive to help our patients and specialist colleagues provide the best care and services they can to our share of patients. We understand that no patient wants to visit their doctor, find out that they need to get a CT or MRI scan, and then find that they must wait several days for their scan, because no appointment is available.

As detailed in the application and discussed by colleagues and others here this evening, we currently have one CT unit and one MRI unit, both of which are operating at full capacity. We are rarely able to give patients a same-day appointment, except, of course, for urgent cases. Imaging access will continue to become more difficult, especially once the additional primary

care and specialty physician services are available in November.

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Currently, any additional capacity for both MRI and CT services within the Partners HealthCare System is limited to our Partners' urban core locations or locations that, unlike Foxborough Center, do not offer comprehensive care. As those who drive from Foxborough to Boston know, it can easily take upwards of 90 minutes door-to-door. Patients taking time off from work to receive health care, or their caregivers providing transportation or other support, are faced with the choice of either traveling to Boston or having to wait four to five days for MRI services or two to three days for imaging at the Foxborough Center. By allowing us to co-locate physician services with sufficient imaging capability here in Foxborough, we can mitigate the well documented fact that Boston has some of the nation's worst traffic, while saving patient's time by offering same-day imaging and reduce the need for them to travel outside of their home community. Prompt availability of MRI and CT imaging

integrated care by Partners' physicians. First, all

at the Foxborough Center provides for timely,

studies performed before 4:30 p.m. on any given day will be finalized on the day of service by a subspecialty radiologist.

Second, the images and interpretations are readily available to the referring physician under Partners HealthCare electronic health record. The referring physicians can review the images, review the reports, consult with the radiologist, if needed, prior to formulating their plan of care and communicating with the patient.

Another group of patients who would benefit from increased access to MRI and CT services at the Foxborough Center are those who receive advanced care at the Brigham & Women's main campus. By providing the same high-quality protocols at Foxborough Center as we do in our urban core facilities, patients living in this community would not need to travel to Boston for imaging, but would travel only for care visits to our urban core facilities.

I have outlined the overarching goal of the Foxborough Center to provide high quality patient care by providing access to same-day imaging to patients who see their Foxborough-based physician

and need diagnostic imaging as part of their medical workup, and the opportunity for local imaging to patients living nearby who receive advanced care at one of our downtown hospitals. Our current CT and MRI imaging capacity will not allow us to achieve this goal.

I cannot overstate that this Determination of Need application is essential to ensure that our patients in this community receive the MRI and CT services that they deserve. I urge that the Department of Public Health approve this Determination of Need application. And I thank you for the opportunity to provide comments here this evening.

HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Tyler Martin; and next is Pauline Zajdel, if she can come down.

MR. MARTIN: Good evening. My name is

Tyler Martin. I'm the Senior Director of Radiology

Operations for Brigham Health. I'm going to read a

statement prepared on behalf of Jay Burke, who was

not able to attend this evening. Jay Burke is the

Radiology Clinical Director at the Brigham &

Women's/MassGeneral Health Center in Foxborough.

"MRI and CT imaging services at the

Foxborough Center are currently provided, as we know, from hearing from others this evening, with one MR and one CT currently operating at capacity. In June of 2019, in response to demand, the Center again expanded its evening coverage to meet the imaging needs of its patients. Currently, the Foxborough Center provides MRI services from 6:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 6:30 to 8 p.m. Friday, and from 8 to 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. The MRI scanner is currently pre-booked at 100 percent capacity, with an average utilization rate of 94 percent. The 6 percent utilization drop on a weekly basis includes last-minute reschedules, cancellations, lost slots due to stadium events, equipment maintenance or unplanned downtime.

Prior to expanding the CT scanner hours of operation, the CT scanner is also 100 percent pre-booked, with an average wait time for a CT appointment of two to three days. After expanding hours in June, the CT unit remains pre-booked at 100

percent capacity during the preferred hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and the average wait time for a CT appointment is next day.

At this current capacity and not factoring in the planned expansion of primary and specialty physician services, the radiology department at the center is straining to meet the demands of the current volume.

Without a backup MRI or CT unit, if a unit is down, a patient needing imaging must either wait for the unit to be repaired, reschedule their appointment for the next available time slot, or seek care elsewhere. As the MRI and CT units are currently overworked, these single units need to be serviced and taken offline more often, for planned and unplanned maintenance. Any additional capacity for both MRI and CT services within the Partners HealthCare System is limited to Partners' urban core locations associated with the Brigham & Women's main campus or locations that, unlike the Foxborough Center, do not offer comprehensive care.

These single units will certainly not be able to meet the patients' needs once more physician services are available here in Foxborough. In

addition, area residents who are receiving treatment at Partners' Boston locations rely on the Foxborough Center to have their needed MRIs and CTs without the time, strain and expense of going to Boston. We support continued availability of timely CT and MRI appointments for these patients and for all who need these services. Our goal is for patients to have the best possible experience, which includes enabling patients to receive same-day imaging services at the Foxborough Center.

In planning for the proposed project, we evaluated different MRI technology to ensure that the Foxborough Center would be acquiring state-of-the-art technology that would meet the needs of its patients and referring providers. We ultimately decided that a 1.5 MRI scanner, as opposed to 3 Tesla MRI scanner would best serve the interests of the Center's patients. A 1.5 Tesla scanner provides better quality images for patients with any type of surgical implant within the area to be imaged. The 3T scanner's higher magnetic field often creates artifacts when a patient has such implant. Thus, in addition to expanding capacity, we will be able to better serve patients with

surgical implants or for whom a 1.5 Tesla scanner is the preferred modality.

We urge that the Department of Public Health approve this Determination of Need application. Thank you for the opportunity to provide these comments.

HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Next is Pauline Zajdel and Diane Griffin.

MS. ZAJDEL: Good evening, everyone. My name is Pauline Zajdel. I'm the Health Director here in the Town of Foxborough for the Board of Health. I am here this evening to offer my full support for this Determination of Need application.

The Foxborough Health Department, in coordination with other town departments, works to improve and protect the health of Foxborough's residents and the environment. In several ways, the Foxborough Center plays an important role in the health and well-being of our residents.

As mentioned in the application, this area of Massachusetts is underserved for primary care, with one of the lowest primary care provider-to-resident ratios in Massachusetts. This is concerning. Increasing access to primary and

1 specialty care services in Foxborough is necessary 2 to address current and future health needs. However, this increase will further tax the imaging 3 services. 4 The single MRI and CT units are already 5 operating at extended hours and at capacity. By 6 7 adding one additional MRI unit and CT unit, as requested in the application, the Foxborough Center 8 is engaging in thoughtful planning to ensure that 9 10 they will be able to meet the current and projected 11 patient needs. I'd like to mention that the Foxborough 12 13 Center and staff, as well as the other clinicians 14 here located in Foxborough, participate in the Town of Foxborough and regional public health emergency 15 16 planning efforts. In 2010, the Foxborough Health Care Center's staff volunteered in participating 17 with us in the H1N1 Public Flu Clinic. 18 Approximately 2,000 citizens through that evening 19 got their immunization with the blue vaccine. 20 21 This summer, the Health Department and the 22 Foxborough Fire Department began working collaboratively on providing Foxborough residents 23

with public health nursing services and the

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community paramedicine services.

Finally, the Foxborough Center provides care for all, including Medicaid beneficiaries. I recognize the Foxborough Center's efforts on inclusion, attention to social determinants of health and its commitment to provide access to interpreter service and culturally competent care.

I ask that the Department of Public Health approve this Determination of Need application.

Thank you for holding this hearing and taking my comments.

HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you.

Maura Schaeffer, if you can come down.

MS. GRIFFIN: Good evening, my name is
Diane Griffin, and I am the Marketing Director at
Patriot Place. I am here to lend my support for the
approval of this Determination of Need application
to add MRI and CT imaging services capacity at
Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center
at Patriot Place.

As my title suggests, I work to draw business and the public to Patriot Place. And having access to world class health care here in Foxborough, including both urgent care and physician

services, as well as the hospital satellite services, that we are discussing here this evening is a strong selling point. Employers seeking to attract employees to Foxborough find access to health care to be an important consideration when recruiting. In addition, should employees need urgent care while on the job, having excellent care available at Patriot Place is an important benefit. We see growth in the Foxborough area, which is an affordable option to living and working in the Greater Boston area.

Foxborough and the area communities deserve and need additional access to health care, and we are fully supportive of the Applicant's efforts to increase access. Approval of this application is necessary to be sure that with increased access to health care services, patients are able to access necessary MRI and CT services at the Foxborough Center. These services, even with extended hours, are already at capacity. Sustaining the Foxborough Center's ability to meet imaging service needs for current demand and projected patient volume is critical.

Like the Foxborough Center, Patriot Place

1 strives to engage with the area communities and to 2 be a strong civic partner. I personally work with Foxborough Center staff to collaborate on community 3 events, including recent events like the Center's 4 free spring health classes tackling orthopedic 5 health, vein and vascular care, the annual Helping 6 7 Kids' Day co-sponsored with the YMCA, and the Center's clinical staff volunteering at our annual 8 Finish and the Fifty 5K/10K race, to name a few. 9 10 I ask that the Department of Public Health 11 approve this Determination of Need application so that MRI and CT services will continue to be 12 13 available to meet the needs of those seeking 14 services at the Health Care Center. 15 Thank you for your consideration for the application and for holding the hearing. 16 HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: 17 Thank you. Maura Schaeffer; and then next, Carolyn 18 Hettrich. 19 MS. SCHAEFFER: Good evening. 20 I will 21 actually be reading two statements tonight, one for 22 myself and one from another who cannot be here 23 tonight. Good evening. My name is Maura Schaeffer, 24

and I live in Franklin, Mass. I'm speaking with you this evening in my capacity as the current President of HUGS Foxborough. "HUGS" is an acronym for "Help Us Get Safe." And also, I am the facilitator of the Foxborough Human Services Domestic Violence Support Group and to offer strong support for this Determination of Need application.

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By way of background, HUGS Foxborough is committed to making our community safer by educating the public regarding relationship violence and by providing nonemergency assistance to victims and families affected by domestic violence. HUGS Foxborough works in collaboration with the Foxborough Police Department and Foxborough Council on Aging and Human Services to help victims of domestic violence by offering a confidential help line for information about nonemergency services, referrals to local Domestic Violence Support Groups and a Foxborough community social worker, working with the schools and community to provide programs that create awareness and educate about violence, and providing nonemergency assistance to victims and families affected by domestic violence.

The Foxborough Center supports and partners

1 with both HUGS and the Domestic Violence Support 2 Group. As part of its support, the Foxborough Center underwrites interactive theatrical 3 performances in the Foxborough Schools on topics 4 such as domestic violence and bullying. 5 Since 2009, the Foxborough Center has 6 7 donated their Holiday Giving Tree gift certificates to the women and children of the Foxborough Area Domestic Violence Support Group. And I'm telling 9 10 you, without that, most of these families would have nothing. So we are very grateful for their 11 continued support. 12 13 Some of our group members and their 14 children are also Foxborough Center patients who 15 utilize the many services, which is a lot closer 16 than going to Boston, as many of these women do not have access to a car or any other mode of 17 transportation for a myriad of reasons due to their 18 situation. 19

Domestic violence is a public health issue.

Access to primary and specialty care in Foxborough
is essential to addressing domestic violence. The
expansion of these services, including women's
health services, is welcome and very much needed.

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Of course, this application pertains to expanding
the MRI and CT services at the Brigham &
Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center. It is
critical that the Foxborough Center have the
necessary imaging services to support patient needs
within the community.

The imaging services at the Foxborough Center currently include a single MRI and CT unit. They're already operating at extended hours and at capacity. Adding the additional MRI unit and CT unit, as requested in the application, only demonstrates that the Foxborough Center is working to ensure that it can meet current community needs and that it will be able to keep up with projected increased demand.

The last thing someone dealing with domestic violence needs is lack of access or delay in care. Having these imaging services readily available at the Foxborough Center is essential for these people and for the entire community.

As we continue our efforts to address domestic violence in all its forms, we look forward to continuing to partner with and rely upon the support of the Foxborough Center. I ask that the

1 Department of Public Health approve this 2 Determination of Need application, and thank you for holding this hearing and for the opportunity to 3 provide these comments. 4 And now I would like to move on to this 5 statement by the former Executive Director of 6 7 Foxborough Council on Aging and Human Services, Ms. Vicki Lowe. 8 9 "I fully support," she says, "the expansion of imaging services at many Brigham & Women's/Mass. 10 General Health Care Center." She is unable to join 11 us this evening, so I have agreed on her behalf to 12 13 read this. Vicki states she held the position as 14 Executive Director for over 17 years in this 15 16 community. During her tenure, she developed close 17 working relationships with many community partners. None was more crucial or productive than the 18 partnership with Brigham & Women's/Mass. General 19 20 Health Care Center and Ms. Cynthia Peterson, VP of 21 Ambulatory Services and Community Development. 22 Together, we provided several health education and 23 wellness programs for seniors. Partnering with Foxborough cable access, we produced a live 24

1 streaming panel discussion with experts and 2 resources about the opioid crisis. We partnered to aid victims of domestic violence. Through Ms. 3 Peterson, our staff was able to meet and share 4 5 resource information with primary care social services staff. Over the years, there are countless 6 7 examples of how this partnership has benefitted our 8 community.

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As the baby boomer population continues to explode, the issue of quality and accessible health care for seniors has never been more important. Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center at Patriot Place provides the highest quality, state-of-the-art health care available in New England. And we have it right here in Foxborough. Transportation to Boston for medical care, such as MRI and CT, is extremely lacking. Brigham & Women's Health Care Center brings Boston to our back door, eliminating this difficulty. Foxborough is so fortunate to have Brigham & Women's Health Care They are experts at providing the best care and services. Expanding their imaging services, as well as access to primary care and specialty care services in Foxborough, will enhance and meet the

1 growing needs in Foxborough and the surrounding 2 communities. 3 Thank you for the opportunity to provide these comments. 4 HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Carolyn 5 Hettrich, and may I have Brian Early come down, 6 7 please. 8 DR. HETTRICH: Hi. My name is Carolyn Hettrich, and I'm an orthopedic surgeon at Brigham & 9 10 Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center. 11 Christian Latterman, who is also an orthopedic surgeon and Chief of Sports Medicine 12 13 Service and Director of the Cartilage Repair Center at Brigham & Women's Hospital, apologizes for not 14 being able to attend due to a scheduling conflict. 15 16 However, he and I felt compelled that one of us be here this evening to speak in favor of the Brigham & 17 Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center's 18 Determination of Need application. 19 20 In our orthopedic practice, we help 21 patients improve their health outcomes and quality 22 of life through surgical and nonsurgical treatments 23 of tendons, ligaments, cartilage and bone. this evening to provide my and Dr. Latterman's

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support in approval of this Determination of Need application for a second MRI and CT scanners at Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center for the following reasons:

All of our patients have musculoskeletal complaints, and CT and MRI imaging is one of our best tools in diagnosing symptoms, creating plans of care, and monitoring progress of our patients.

While we conduct a number of patient tests, CT and MRI imaging is the only way to definitively diagnose symptoms. In addition to conditions affecting the brain, MRI's imaging ability to noninvasively display high-definition images of the bones, cartilage, muscles, tendons, ligaments and joints is crucial in diagnosing a wide spectrum of spinal and musculoskeletal conditions.

Particularly, in an urgent post-injury setting, it is not justifiable to have patients wait more than a couple of days to schedule their MRIs.

The request for a second MRI scanner and CT scanner is a direct consequence of the growth of our physician access at the Foxborough Center. Our sports division has grown by three physicians in the last six months alone. As the orthopedic practice

here in Foxborough continues to grow, so does the demand for CT and MRI imaging.

In fiscal year 2018, more than 40 percent of the MRI and CT orders came from orthopedics and internal medicine. The grand majority of these scans are being used to determine the need for surgery.

As mentioned by my colleagues, the

Foxborough Center has a significant need for

expanding imaging services to meet the needs of

patients who either receive care from physicians in

Foxborough or who may be receiving care in Boston,

but need CT or MRI services.

Due to this current demand, our patients' imaging needs are already often delayed. Same-day imaging appointments are generally not available, except for in the most urgent cases. Many patients wait several days or up to a week, especially if they're not able to make their appointments during the extended hours. This means that our patients often have to make three trips to the Foxborough Center before they can be adequately diagnosed: An initial visit, an imaging visit -- which is often delayed -- and a follow-up visit.

1 By adding the requested CT and MRI capacity, we would be able to ease current 2 3 scheduling challenges, which will only worsen as access to services in Foxborough expands. We should 4 do everything possible to decrease the disruption 5 and stress our patients experience in imaging 6 7 services, diagnosis and follow-up care. This increased access to services would improve patients' experience and satisfaction and lead to more 9 10 efficient care. Also, to less time away from work 11 for patients and their caregivers. The MRI and CT requested in this 12 13 Determination of Need application is essential to 14 ensure that patients are diagnosed and treated 15 according to the standard of care; i.e., in a 16 medically appropriate and timely, as well as effective manner. MRI and CT services help 17 orthopedists and our colleagues in primary care and 18 other specialties formulate and execute plans of 19 20 care. 21 We would kindly ask for the Department of 22 Public Health to support and encourage and support 23 our efforts to improve access. I would kindly urge

the Department of Public Health approve this

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Determination of Need application.

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Thank you very much for the opportunity to provide these comments.

HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Brian Early, and next is Michael Johns.

MR. EARLY: Good evening. My is Brian

Early. I'm the Vice President and General Manager

of Patriot Place. Patriot Place supports approval

of this Determination of Need application to expand

MRI and CT imaging service capacity at Brigham &

Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center at Patriot

Place.

When people outside of Foxborough think of Patriot Place, they generally think of Gillette Stadium and our successful sports teams. However, Patriot Place has evolved to be a destination where residents of Foxborough and surrounding communities can shop, dine and most important for our purposes this evening, obtain world class health care services. We know that access to health care services is of the utmost importance to our communities.

With the addition of primary and specialty physician services, our communities, which need more

physicians, will have enhanced access. As the Determination of Need application details, MRI and CT services at the Foxborough Center currently operate under extended hours to meet high demand and are at capacity. With more patients able to access services here, the need will only increase. Without the requested additional capacity, the Foxborough Center will not be able to meet the needs of patients receiving physician and other services here in Foxborough. Those patients receiving care at the Applicant's Boston hospital locations also benefit greatly from having MRI and CT services available close to home, avoiding the need for travel for these services.

On a personal note, I, along with many of my colleagues at Patriot Place and the Stadium, have been patients at the Foxborough Center and concur that having primary care, specialty care and services like lab, MRI, CT and rehab under one roof is incredibly important.

18 months ago, I had an acute knee injury, which, based on the initial exam by my orthopedic specialist at the Health Care Center, required an immediate MRI. I assumed I would be able to stay on

1 campus for the MRI and return to my office and go back to work. But due to heavy demand, I was forced 2 to drive a significant distance to an offsite 3 facility; not very convenient. 4 I'd also like to mention the Foxborough 5 Center's Patriot Place location facilitates access 6 7 to health services. Parking, including handicapped-designated parking, is plentiful and The Town of Foxborough shuttle service, 9 free. GATRA, has a new stop at the Foxborough Center, with 10 transportation between Foxborough and surrounding 11 12 towns. 13 The Tri-County Connector line operates 14 Monday through Saturday, with pick-up and drop-off 15 stops throughout the day at the Norfolk MBTA Commuter Rail Station, the Foxborough Center, and 16 17 other places in Foxborough, Wrenthan, Franklin and The Town of Foxborough also operates the 18 Norfolk. 19 FISH Program, which uses volunteers to transport 20 Foxborough residents to medical appointments here at 21 Patriot Place and within an 11-mile radius of the 22 Town of Foxborough. 23 Affordable options to reach Patriot Place are increasing, which in turn, increases the 2.4

accessibility for patients. We are excited that scheduled to begin in October of this year, the MBTA and the Massachusetts Department of Transportation will offer weekday commuter rail service between Boston and Foxborough Station at Gillette Stadium and Patriot Place, as part of a year-long pilot program.

Our success at reaching agreement to bring daily train service to and from Foxborough was partly driven by the need for our extending communities to have access to the world class health care available at Patriot Place.

Foxborough station is ideal for people who commute from nearby stations that are particularly crowded during peak commute times and for reverse commuters who drive from Boston to the Foxborough area. The Foxborough pilot service provides area drivers with a new commuting option and will help alleviate parking congestion at nearby stations. A minimum of 500 parking spaces will be available for commuters, with close proximity to Patriot Place and 24-hour security. This will be helpful to residents who work in Boston who want to obtain medical services in Foxborough during the week. We

1 recognize the demand for high-quality health care 2 services is high, but that getting to Boston is difficult. We have worked hard to bring this 3 reverse commute option to fruition at Patriot Place 4 5 and will help people who want to be in Foxborough for medical appointments and access to public 6 7 transportation. 8 The Foxborough Center is highly engaged with the community. Patriot Place regularly 9 10 Partners with the Foxborough Center and with the Foxborough physician practices to host and support 11 community events at Patriot Place. 12 13 We urge the Department of Public Health 14 approve this Determination of Need application. And 15 I want to thank you for this opportunity to provide these comments. 16 17 HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you. Michael Johns and then David Faling. 18 MR. JOHNS: I'm Michael Johns, the 19 20 Assistant Town Manager here in Foxborough, and I 21 have two statements to read; one from myself and one 22 from our Chief of Police, who regretfully cannot be 23 here this evening. Mine is on a personal note. My parents, 24

Barbara and Norris Johns, are 57-year residents of Foxborough, each aged in their 80s. My father, a cancer survivor and stroke victim, whose life was saved at Foxborough Partners HealthCare during a heart attack and lung failure, is my mother's primary caregiver.

Last year, my mother had seven ambulance trips to the Foxborough Center for her multiple increasing severe health conditions. One of the conditions is osteoporosis, which has resulted in severe pain and multiple trips to Boston, because she needed to get an MRI to determine where the fractures were, because many of the fractures, which were determined, resulted from rolling over in bed, falls in the bedroom and falls in the bathroom.

I personally urge you to approve this

Determination of Need to more properly and better

care for our elderly patients in the area who rely

on local health care at Partners.

This is from our police chief:

"I'm William Baker. And as the Chief of
Police for the Town of Foxborough, I'm providing
this statement in support of the Partners HealthCare
System's Determination of Need application for the

expansion of imaging services at Brigham & Women's

Hospital's outpatient satellite in the Brigham &

Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center in

Foxborough. Regrettably, I'm unable to attend the

hearing this evening. I'm having Michael Johns read

this statement.

"I've been Chief of Police in Foxborough for three years. In carrying out the Police Department's responsibilities for law enforcement and for the public safety of Foxborough and its residents and visitors, we interact regularly with the Foxborough Center. The Foxborough Police Department responds to the Foxborough Center when situations arise that become a safety and security issue for the center staff, patients or visitors. The Foxborough Center serves all patients and may identify patients who are in some way at risk, perhaps from homelessness and substance abuse disorder and others.

"The police department and Foxborough

Center staff collaborate, when appropriate, to

address immediate safety needs and help patients and
their families access services to address social
issues that affect their safety and security, health

and well-being. We work with Foxborough Center's administration and security department to address issues such as parking, patient public safety emergencies, and everyone's general safety and security.

"Having a location of one of the best hospitals in the country right here in Foxborough and now with planned expanded access to medical care for all ranges of our population adds greatly to the quality of life in Foxborough. We need more access to primary care physicians, as well as specialists, both to be sure that there are enough physicians to meet the needs of the community and to enable our residents to have choices when it comes to physicians and hospital services, such as the imaging services offered at the satellite. The additional MRI and CT units that the Foxborough Center has requested are needed to support this expanded access and patient choice.

"Having MRI and CT availability here has a cascading effect for our residents. If, for example, a resident needs to see a specialist in Boston, having access to CT or MRI services that specialists can rely on, with results in the same

electronic medical record, without having to make another trip to the city is invaluable.

I know that the Foxborough Center has provided the Department of Public Health with statistics to support the need for expanding MRI and CT services. I'd like to offer a personal testimonial regarding this need.

"Over the course of the past three years, I have been a Brigham & Women's Hospital patient and have received services at the Foxborough Center, including both MRI and CT scans," says the Police Chief. "Due to patient demand, there was no immediate access to appointments for MRI and CT, even during off-peak hours. I waited a week or more for such appointments. And these experiences were before the planned and much needed expansion of our physician services. If there had been additional capacity at the time, it would have reduced my wait times, which would have greatly improved my patient experience.

Thank for holding this hearing and for accepting my comments. I ask that the Department of Public Health approve this Determination of Need application. Sincerely, William D. Baker, chief."

1 HEARING OFFICER MICHAELS: Thank you. 2 David Faling. 3 MR. FALING: My name is David Faling, and I'm a primary care physician, and I am the Primary 4 Care Medical Director at Brigham & Women's/Mass. 5 General Health Care Center. And I'm here this 6 7 evening to provide my support for this Determination 8 of Need application. 9 Primary care means providing and coordinating comprehensive care. My job is to 10 provide this for my patients, supervise the work of 11 my primary care clinicians, and to work to improve 12 13 access for the unmet primary care needs for our 14 community. I believe that this proposed project we are 15 discussing tonight is an essential part of the 16 larger efforts of Partners HealthCare to meet the 17 health care needs of the residents of Foxborough and 18 surrounding communities at a convenient location. 19 20 Our expansion of access to primary care 21 will help to address severe primary care shortages 22 in Bristol County. Bristol county has one of the 23 highest residents-to-primary care physicians ratios in the Commonwealth. In 2019, the Robert Wood 24

Johnson Foundation reported that there were roughly 1,930 residents to every primary care physician in Bristol county. For Massachusetts as a whole, the number was 960 residents for every primary care physician.

We see this demand for primary care in our health center every day. We have recently been able to begin accepting new primary care patients, after having closed panels for the last four years. We have been receiving up to 30, sometimes even more, calls requesting new patient appointments with a primary care provider in Foxborough. And we look forward to our growing ability to provide care for these patients.

The projected growth in Foxborough primary care patient panels necessities greater access to imaging service at the Foxborough Center. Our projected growth rate for imaging services, factoring in provider growth, is 9 percent for CT and 14 percent for MRI. The Foxborough Center can only meet this growth and demand by acquiring an additional CT unit and MRI unit.

These advanced imaging services have become an essential part of my practice and the care that I

1 coordinate with my subspecialty colleagues. In any given week, my primary care colleagues and I order 2 imaging to diagnose pulmonary embolism, 3 appendicitis, diverticulitis, fractures not seen on 4 X-ray, and other urgent conditions, along with the 5 imaging needed for non-urgent conditions. The key 6 7 to care is prompt, local access and our ability to coordinate care. 8

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Within the Partners HealthCare System, additional capacity for both CT and MRI services is just not effective care for our patients. Access is limited to the Partners' urban core locations associated with the Brigham & Women's main campus or to locations that do not offer comprehensive care. The benefit of co-locating imaging services and primary care is lost. These benefits include, but go well beyond preventing the unnecessary travel for patients. Many patients that we've heard are unable to travel the distances they need to. Imaging done in the Foxborough Center is documented and maintained in the patient's electronic health record. Information, including the ability to view images, is available to all our clinicians. allows our primary care team to communicate easily

with colleagues and patients and to effectively coordinate care.

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I wanted to mention in concluding, the commitment that Partners HealthCare, Brigham & Women's Hospital and the Foxborough Center has to a number of programs to connect patients with social service organizations. Patients have access to clinical social worker services. Our social workers help assess patient needs and work with patients and their families to implement appropriate interventions. Per MassHealth ACO requirements, social determinants of health screenings are done for all covered patients to provide appropriate care and to identify resources for patients experiencing issues such as domestic violence, food insecurity and housing issues. We screen all patients in primary care for depression and all older adults for cognitive impairment.

My ability to provide this kind of comprehensive patient care at the Brigham & Women's/Mass. General Health Care Center is what I love about my job. The need for access to MRI and CT services is an essential part of my ability to provide this care.
