## Pharmacy Responsibilities In Handling Schedule VI Medications for Nursing-Facility Residents

Multiple Dispensing Fees	The Division allows multiple dispensing fees where applicable; for instance, monitoring small quantities of antibiotics or psychotropics where dosages may vary over time.
Medication Label	Department of Public Health regulations require that only a pharmacist can affix a prescription label to a medication container whenever there is a change in dose but no change in the medication. It is permissible for a nurse to affix an auxiliary label that states, "Directions have changed; refer to the resident's medication record for proper dose." The pharmacy should supply these labels to the nursing facility.
Early Refills	Refilling prescriptions sooner than seven days before the end of the current supply is not allowed for residents of nursing facilities.
Amount of Medication to Be Ordered by the Nursing Facility	The nursing facility must order only the amount of medication prescribed: for example, a quantity sufficient for 10 days or less for medications new to the resident, for medications that require monitoring (for example, psychotropic or cardiac medications), or for medications that require frequent dosage adjustments (for example, anticoagulants or antibiotics).  Order prescribed maintenance medications in 30-to-60 day quantities.
Change of Pharmacy	The Division will not pay for new prescriptions solely because of a change in the pharmacy provider. The nursing facility should re-order medication only when the current supply is about to be exhausted.
