


















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
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The <u>rate</u> of opioid-related overdose deaths increased 2.5% in 2022 compared with 2021. This rate is 9% higher than the 2016 peak.




Preliminary data show 216 confirmed and 306 estimated opioid-related overdose deaths in the first three months of 2023.



Estimated 566 deaths


Estimated 522 deaths

Fentanyl remains a key factor in opioid-related overdose deaths (94% present in toxicology screen in 1st quarter of 2023).



White non-Hispanic residents account for 86% of all deaths and only 69% of opioid-related overdose deaths






From 2021 to 2022 Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic males had increased rates of death


Confirmed Opioid-Related Overdose Death Rates, All Intents, by Race and Hispanic Ethnicity





From 2021 to 2022 Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic females had increased rates of death

Confirmed Opioid-Related Overdose Death Rates, All Intents, by Race and Hispanic Ethnicity




In 2022, the most rural communities had the highest rates of opioid related incidents treated by EMS and opioid-related overdose deaths

BHPL sits within the Massachusetts Department of Public Health

The DOL – DPH Transition

On August 5, 2021, Chapter 39 of the Acts of 2021, "An Act Reorganizing Certain Licensing Agencies of the Executive Department" brought with it 13 new health licensing boards from Division of Occupational Licensure (DOL) to DPH.

11 of those health boards are now part of BHPL

*Registered Sanitarians and Certified Health Officers are now located in DPH's Office of Local and Regional Health

Managing the DOL – DPH transition

- Between June 2022 and December 2022, BHPL and DPH managed the transition of DOL health boards to DPH in three (3) cohorts to provide the best experience for staff, licensees, and applicants
- To prepare for the boards and staff, BHPL created an Implementation Plan with several workstreams, including Operations, Communications, Legal and eLicensing
- BHPL devised an accompanying Communications Plan, which identified internal and external stakeholders impacted by the transition. The plan mapped their messaging needs and communication channels for which BHPL developed targeted messages
- **Daily Transition Management Group** calls were held with BHPL leadership to discuss status updates, identify challenges, mitigate roadblocks, and develop strategic solutions

BHPL oversees and supports 21 boards of registration and certification in health professions across 126 license types and the Drug Control Program.

New e-Licensing Application and Renewal Platform (eLX)

DPH is upgrading its current elicensing platform (MLO) to a more user-friendly and robust system called **eLX**.

<u>Customer Service</u>: eLX will enhance the interactions that licensees and applicants have with their boards, **making it easier and quicker to apply for and renew licenses**.

The Bureau has a **strong support structure** and we have been working continuously on quality improvement to ensure a more positive experience during the licensing process.

eLX – Project Overview

DPH eLX (eLicensing eXcellence) is a strategic initiative to unify DPH with a single License, Compliance and Enforcement system, vendor and standards

How the Boards Operate

- All members are appointed by the Governor (various terms)
- Monthly meetings (most boards, some meet as few as 4x/yr.)
- Each Board has between 5 and 17 seats, depending on their statute
- Member qualifications are set by statute

Board Process for Passing Regulations

BHPL oversees:

- Drug Control Program regulations, listed in 105 CMR; and
- Board regulations, each listed in a separate CMR chapter

The PHC hears and approves amendments to DPH regulations in 105 CMR

Whereas, Boards are **statutorily enabled** to promulgate their own regulations pursuant to the following review process:

- Boards develop and approve amendments by vote
- DPH Commissioner's office reviews and approves to present to EHS
- EHS and ANF review and approve for public hearing and comments
- BHPL holds public hearing and evaluates public comments
- Boards finalize post-comment changes and approve by vote
- DPH Commissioner's office reviews and approves to present to EHS
- EHS and ANF review and approve for promulgation

BHPL: Quick Facts

BHPL is also home to the:

- Pharmacy Substance Use Disorder (PSUD) Program
- Substance Addiction Recovery Program (SARP) for Nurses
- Public Records Unit, which responded to 786 Public Record Requests (PRRs) in 2022, with an average response time of 6.98 days
- MassPAT, which recorded over 11,871,000 searches in FY22, an increase of 2.5 million searches from FY21
