Very little of forests original stored carbon is retained in wood products.
- It takes 465 new trees to match the existing benefits provided by one mature tree. New trees take decades of growth to achieve all the climate benefits of existing mature un-degraded trees and forests.
- In Massachusetts, about 64% of the state's forests are private. These forests can provide some of our state's wood products, and additional wood products for Massachusetts needs can be sourced from southern state's tree plantations which are already degraded and have longer productive growing seasons than northeast forests.
