What do you think are the major challenges, barriers or obstacles to source reduction & reuse in MA?

Barriers to creating a culture of reduce/reuse/repair/share in Massachusetts

- Lack of knowledge/education about the importance of source reduction and reuse
- The perception/belief that source reduction & reuse is more time-consuming, inconvenient, or more costly
- Cheap consumer products (both cost and quality) that are designed for disposal rather than durable and repairable
- We don't pay the true cost of items - less incentive to reduce/reuse/repair
- Lack of access to reuse facilities and transparency on which items can be donated for reuse
- The cultural perception that new is better than used or repaired
- Lack of knowledge/transparency on what happens to our discarded, donated, or recycled items – making it difficult to make better choices as a consumer
- Misleading product labels/ greenwashing that may keep people from taking further action to reduce waste or reuse/repair items they already own
- Lack of understanding/empowerment at the individual level that people can vote with their money
- Lack of buy-in to importance of R&R (could be within a business, institution, municipality, or at the resident/consumer level)

What actions can we take
to help create a culture of
source reduction and
reuse in MA?

Strategies

- Develop an educational campaign similar to Recycle Smart MA focused on Reduce/Reuse
- Continue to bring R&R stakeholders together frequently to facilitate the sharing of information
- Establish an online network or pool of items and resources
- Develop and share case studies of successful swap shops/sheds, library of things and tool libraries, and repair and reuse events
- Quantify the cost savings and environmental impacts of source reduction and reuse

Strategies: Residential

- Provide **micro grants** to municipalities, NGOs and businesses to stimulate growth of reuse/repair/share operations.
- Incentivize municipal investments in reuse/repair/share programs.
- Provide trainings and share best practices to institutionalize reuse/repair/share programs.
- Develop communications plan to help residents adopt best practices for reducing waste, increasing reuse and repair, and extending product lifespans.

Strategies: Information

- Create an online calculator to quantify the environmental, social and economic benefits of choosing reuse/repair/share over purchase and disposal to help Massachusetts residents, businesses and municipalities better understand the benefits of reuse options.
- Develop an online tool/map to help connect Massachusetts residents with reuse/repair/share resources across the state.

Community Engagement

- Include climate change activists in the outreach work; make the connection between waste reduction and climate change
- Use DEP's cart tagging program to communicate about R&R initiative and stakeholder opportunities to participate
- Use students to get the word out. Example: many college universities have Eco Reps that help raise awareness of environmental issues
- Involve Mass Municipal Assn and Regional Planning Authorities (e.g. MAPC) in the R&R dialogue
- Capitalize on the anti-plastic, anti-single use plastic sentiment to promote our message
- Tell the story about the difference donated household goods can make

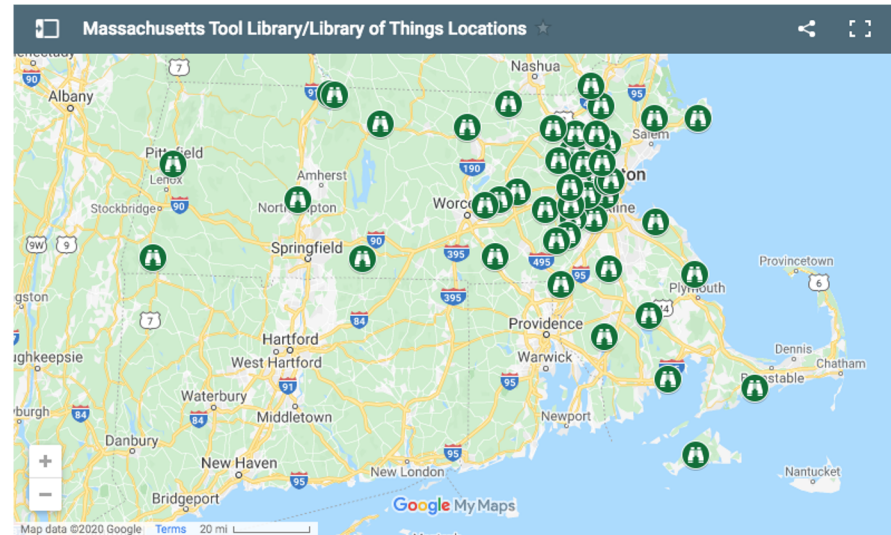
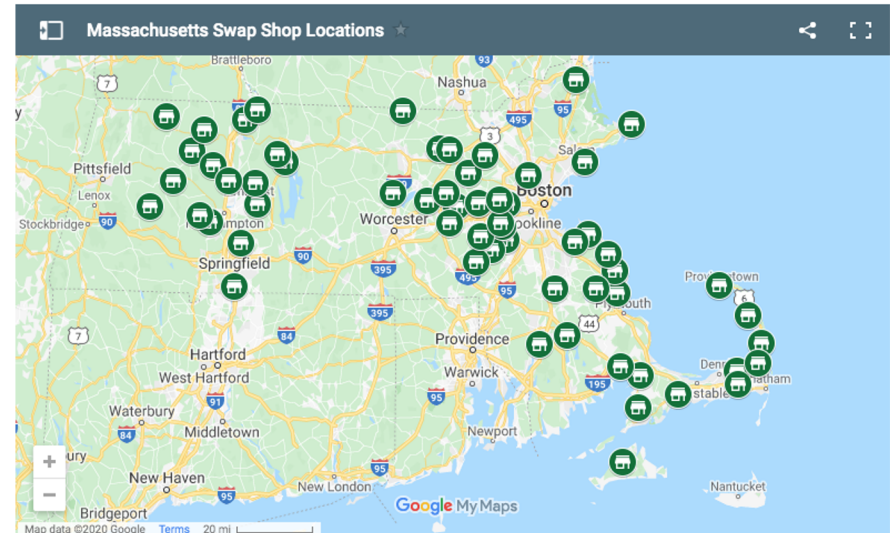
