town and are traversing a golf-course or want to noodle around in some lower pitches of woods behind your house. These metal-edged skis can be as skinny as 6o cm underfoot or as wide as 100 cm underfoot. The skinnier skis can be mounted with NNN-RC bindings that resemble traditional Nordic bindings, but are a bit beefier. You have to use an NNN-RC boto with these bindings. You can choose from a few styles of boot depending on how wide your skis are. The widest skis in this category may be used with 3 prin bindings (described below).

The leather boot with 3-pin binding has been standard issue backcountry gear for decades and has been used to access all kinds of terrain, including flat, undulating, low-angle, and the occasional steep slopes. Reinforced leather boots with buckles and/or an adjustable heel cable provide additional stability and maneuverability. Some rigid boots and bindings are suitable for lowangle touring as well. The plastic telemark boot is far more rigid and can be used on rolling and flat terrain as well as the steeps and is a better choice if longer tours with steep uphils and downhills are in your adventure.

Safety equipment

The ten essentials are always a necessity when going into the backcountry. These include things like extra

sockoung (using childing, Previously, snowboard for descending. Previously, snowboarders were at a distinct disadvantage in accessing the backcountry and were usually confined to access using snowshoes while carrying their board.

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Taken together, the advancements in telemark, alpine, and snowboard technology have greatly expanded the ability and desire of outdoor winter enthusiasts to venture deeper and higher into the backcountry using the equipment of their choice. Technological advances in cell phones and GPS made getting out with this newer equipment even easier. You can see where other people are skiing by looking at Strava or share a geo-located map with a friend of a good spot to try out. Freed from the limits of developed ski areas, skiers in increasingly greater numbers have started to explore the backcountry and earn their turns' on previously inaccessible terrain.

Backcountry Skiing and Riding Equipment

Backcountry equipment has advanced considerably in recent decades and covers a broad spectrum of needs. Skiers use specific gear (or 'set ups') to meet their preferences, skill level, and budget. Not all equipment is suited for all backcountry terrain. Weather, snow conditions, terrain, and difficulty levels all influence a skier's choice of equipment. Leather boots and skinny wax less skis, for example, may be appropriate for low-angle backcountry touring but would be inadequate for more advanced terrain such as Tuckerman's Ravine on Mount Washington or even the Teardrop Trail on Mount Mansfield.

Modern backcountry skis are made with a variety of materials and come in a number of lengths and widths and feature various degrees of camber (flex), sidecut (the difference in width between tip/tail and middle of ski), and rocker (curvature at tip and tail), all to more easily tour or turn. Skis are either smooth underneath (for less friction) or have textured fish scale traction (also known as wax less base, for greater friction/traction). Most backcountry skis feature either a partial or full length metal edge to add durability and influence turning and edging.

Climbing Skins

Climbing skins are strips of fabric that are covered in unidirectional hairs (historically these were literally animal skins attached to the bottom of skis). Skins can cover the entire base of the ski or just the middle 'kick' zone of a metal-edged Nordic ski. The unidirectional hairs mat down when you glide forward/go uphill and then engage to prevent you from sliding backwards downhill. Skiing uphill using skins is called "skinning" or "skinning up."

Boots and Bindings

Metal-edged Nordic skis offer a way to get out into the snow whether you live in

Once again, backcountry/Alpine touring interest continues its meteoric rise in the industry, including resort uphill travel. Last year, Alpine touring saw an increase of more than 90%, and this growth was seen broadly across all demographics. While FREESKIER's core audience has been trending in this direction for years, it seems that the broader industry has caughton to Alpine touring too. And growth was seen in all demographics, including: age, gender, race/ethnicity, income and education.



Over the past three years, the number of Alpine ski touring participants has grown from 701,000 in 2019-20, to 1.1 million in 2020-21, and now up at 2.2 million in 2021-22. The age demographic with the most Alpine touring participants: 25-34 which represented more than 37% of all touring participants. The participation by gender generally mirrors that of the Alpine market with men comprising 66.7% of Alpine touring participants, and women 33.3%.

Working for Wildlife on Bryant Mountain

Bryant Mountain was the site of the Berkshire Snow Basin, a popular dowhill isk are from the early-1950 through the mid-1960s. Since closing the slopes reverted to a forested habitat, and if allowed to mature the blodiversity value for wildlife species would decline. Wildlife species that rey on old-field and meadow habitats have been declining, giving way to forest regrowth and development pressures.

Several species of rare plants and animals have been observed here. Goals include measures to protect and improve the habitat. In an effort to manage for conservation of our Commonwealth's biodiversity for

Commonweally bounders by for future generations, the former ski slopes are to be maintained in a grass-shrub stage. This provides habitat for early successional wildlife species such as the Eastern Cottontail, Ruffed Grouse, various butterflies and songbirds.

This project is a cooperative effort of the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) in partnership with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) through its Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (HIP).

Berkshires Lose Another CCC Camp

Veterans' Unit at Beartown To Move On Nov. 14

Another Berkshire CCC camp, next-to-last to fold up, will go out of the picture Nov. 14 when the veterans' company at Beartown State Forest, South Lee, moves to Voluntown, Conn.

The only remaining camp will be at the west end of Savoy State Forest, in North Adams. Savoy forest alone, at one time, had three camps.

One hundred thirteen men of the Beartown camp will move into the camp at Voluntown which has just been closed after occupancy by a junior company. The latter company was disbanded for failure of recruiting efforts, and the veterans will carry on their work in the forested area near the Rhode Island state line.

Major work at Beartown recently has been centered on completion of the ski lodge and water system and building more roads.

The Beartown camp is about seven years old, and the work crews, have carried out one of the most extensive developments at any CCC center in the county.

Overview

Civilian Conservation Corps Companies 108 and 112 were stationed in Beartown State Forest in Lee, Massachusetts in the 1930s.

In 1935 ski trails were developed on the northern peak of Beartown Mountain. Two rope tows were installed on the lower half of the mountain, serving the Polar and Sedgewick slopes. In addition, at least three trails were cleared from the top of the mountain following the bear theme - Kodiak, Grizzly, and Polar.

The ski area closed at some point in the 1940s, but was reopened in 1951-52, featuring top to bottom rope tow lift service.

The area was operated in the 1960s as Beartown Associates, Inc. by William T. McCormack. The area remained open through the winter of 1963-64. It was transferred to Wayne K. McCormack in 1981, then to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in 1984.

Today the ski trails are grown in, though some remains from the area can still be found.

The Beartown Heritage Ski Trail Rehabilitation Project: Phase I

- Brush out to trails to historical width...and make skiable Kodiak, Grizzly, Panda, and Polar Trails
- Highlight Polar as intermediate and Kodiak & Grizzly as advanced
- Create one-way traffic (uphill for access) along Panda Trail to top of ski area & widen in areas sufficient for some downhill in predetermined locations
- Mow and trim access road behind gate #4, remove debris in culverts, drainage, and ditches
- Paint and letter gate #4 appropriately
- Put up signage at entrance and along Polar and Panda trails, including paint blazing
