# EVALUATION CRITERIA

## The material:

- 1. Has the potential to be recycled through a legitimate market
- 2. Is not detrimental to the system (worker safety & machines)
- 3. Current MRF infrastructure is designed to handle

# RECYCLING IQ KIT UPDATE

- \$482,000 awarded to 16 communities
- 13 curbside
- 3 drop-off
- Application still open: up to \$40,000
   (>12,000 households); \$7,500 for drop-off
- 40 hours of MAC time + Boston staff
