Purpose

- Provide free, safe youth-based programs for thousands of at- risk teens and young adults in urban areas.
- Demonstrates commitment to urban youth development.
- Builds community.
- Fosters activities that promote healthy lifestyles.
- Promotes shared stewardship of our parks.



Background

- Launched in 2015 to provide free, safe, youth-based programming
- DCR coordinates with Local Partners that offer youth-based programming to urban youth
- Partners have expanded from 4 in 2015 to 14 partners in 2020 to 100 in 2024
- Average attendance -5,000 participants before 2021. 2024 attendance was over 22,000
- Programs offered at DCR Locations, partner facilities and city parks
- Partners offer wide range of activities including sports, arts and life skills workshops
- Funding goes towards partner programming, police details, marketing, equipment and DCR staff overtime
- Programming includes the following categories:
 - Recreational, Cultural and educational programming
 - Outdoor Recreational Programming Facilitation (teaching urban youth skills to camp, fish, kayak)
 - Accessible Recreational Programming

2024: By the Numbers

- 100 partners
- **37** communities
- 125 different locations
- 2,250+ youth programs offered
- **8,500+** hours of youth programs
- 22,000+ youth participants



Communities Served

- Expanded to eleven new communities with partners-Attleboro, Bridgewater, Norwood, Everett, Revere, Pittsfield, Somerville, Salem, Chicopee, Easthampton and Westfield.
- Nine Boston neighborhoods
- Beverly, Brockton, Chelsea, Fitchburg, Haverhill, Holyoke, Lawrence, Lowell, Lynn, Methuen, Milton, New Bedford, Quincy, Springfield, Stoughton, Taunton, and Worcester.



Summer Nights: Partner Funding

In 2024, DCR dedicated an estimated \$2.615 million to partner funding. Additional Funding supports police details, staffing, marketing and equipment.

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Summer Nights: Notable Highlights

Seven partners brought a combined 150 youth to DCR properties to enjoy fishing led by Mass Wildlife colleagues at Harold Parker and Myles Standish State Forests and Hampton Ponds State Park

Five partners [Easter Seals, Partners for Youth with Disabilities, Holyoke Rows, Boys and Girls of Dorchester and Waypoint Adventures] offered accessible and adaptive programming specifically designed for youth with disabilities. Together over 100 individual youth with disabilities enjoyed Summer Nights activities like swimming, kayaking, theater, and sports

Summer Nights: Notable Highlights

Over 50 individuals went camping overnight (many for their first time) and had the opportunity to experience the outdoors through the Appalachian Mountain Club's Weekend Campouts and Public Lands Initiative held at Harold Parker State Forest in Andover.

Boston Harbor Now, welcomed 25 Summer Nights partners who brought over 450 youth on day trips to explore, discover, and enjoy this urban oasis.
