A copy of this form must be given to parents and filed in the child's record.

Massachusetts Early Intervention (EI) Programs must provide written notice a reasonable time before the program proposes or declines to begin or change an evaluation of your child to determine eligibility, the identification of your child as eligible or not eligible for EI services, or the EI services for your child and family (including location, frequency, duration and/or discipline of provider). Receiving prior written notice is one of your family rights in Early Intervention.
