Massachusetts Smoke-Free Workplace Law And Questions about Bingo

The Smoke-Free Workplace Law, M.G.L. Ch. 270, §22, mandates that enclosed workplaces with one or more employees must be smoke-free. The state law's intent is to protect workers in enclosed workplaces from secondhand smoke exposure. The Massachusetts Department of Public Health has received many calls about smoking at Bingo games under the statewide smoke-free workplace law. Below are some of the most common questions and answers. Please call 1-800-992-1895 for information about specific situations.

Question:	Is smoking allowed at a Bingo game at a school?
Answer:	No. The law prohibits smoking in all schools, including private schools and parochial schools.
Question:	Is smoking allowed at a Bingo game at a workplace?
Answer:	No. If the location employs one or more employees, it must be smoke-free.
Question:	Is smoking allowed at a Bingo game in a membership association?
Answer:	If the Bingo game is open to the public, it must be smoke-free. A membership association, as defined in the law, includes non-profit private clubs and religious organizations. Membership associations must be smoke-free when open to the public.
