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
Disclaimer:

The Department of Industrial Accident (DIA) reports monthly vital statistics to the Workers' Compensation Advisory Council based on our fiscal year cycle (July 1 to June 30). The data presented in this report is gathered for the time-period from the start of the fiscal year up to the month prior to the report date. This information is based on available data from that period and is provided for informational purposes only.


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






Fluctuations in the conference and hearing queues may vary by region and depend on the number of cases being referred from conciliation, conference order appeals, judicial schedules, and continuance requests. There have been 1,280 continuances as of August 31, 2024. 6,730 continuance requests were received in FY24. These are a rolling total, not a cumulative total.





Currently, the average waiting period for a conference is 12 to 22 weeks.







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Office of Investigations




1,742 compliance checks, 502 field investigations were conducted, 1,788 more employees are newly covered by WC insurance and 3,600 compliance letters were sent in August. FY 2024, yielded 79,550 compliance checks with 4,124 employees covered by WC insurance.

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
Office of Investigations



Last month 110 Stop Work Orders (SWO) were issued and 6 employers defaulted on SWOs that were previously issued. 230 SWOs have been issued year-to-date with total fine collections to date of \$6,848. FY 2024 yielded a total of 1,342 SWOs issued, with a total fine collection of \$1,158,659.

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
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As of August 31st, 21 uninsured injuries have been reported to the WCTF for FY25. Please note, claims may be determined to be insured or uninsured after filing. The WCTF received 104 newly reported claims in FY24.








Represents payments on all open claims to include those made in prior years.

Every effort is made to recover money owed by the uninsured employer pursuant c. 152 §65 (8).




FY 2025 as of 8/31/2024






Second Injury Fund Budget & Payments


COLA Reimbursement








FY 2025 as of 8/31/2024
