Honorable Chairs and Ranking Minority Members of the Committees on Ways and Means:

Pursuant to Section 6 of Chapter 14 of the General Laws¹, the Department of Revenue (DOR) hereby submits its mid-month tax revenue report for the month of September 2017. The attached table shows September month-to-date tax revenue collections through September 15, 2017, along with changes from the equivalent period in September 2016.

Revenue collections are uneven and weighted toward month-end, and the brief period covered in the midmonth does not provide sufficient data for comparison to prior years. **Therefore, the Department strongly urges that mid-month figures should not be used to assess trends or project future revenues.**

Context for September estimates

September is a significant month for revenue collection because both individual and business taxpayers have estimated payments due. On average for the past several years, roughly 10% of annual revenue has been received during September, placing it #4 among the twelve months of the year for revenue.

Highlights

- **Total Tax** collections for the month-to-date period were \$1.481 billion, up \$181 million or 13.9% versus the same period last year. This is not necessarily predictive of the month.
- **Income Taxes** totaled \$833 million, up \$152 million or 22.4% from the equivalent period in September 2016.
- Sales & Use Tax collections were \$101 million at mid-month, which is \$5 million or 5.5% above the 2016 figure. Regular Sales and Meals Tax revenues are heavily weighted toward the second part of the month. Therefore, the mid-month revenue figure is not predictive.
- Corporate & Business Taxes were \$471 million for the September month-to-date period, which is \$21 million or 4.6% more than the last year. September is a major month for business tax revenues.
- Other Taxes totaled \$76 million at September mid-month, which is \$2 million or 3.4% more than the 2016 figure.

Detail

Total Income Tax of \$833 million for mid-month September comprises the following:

- **Withholding** of \$581 million, up \$47 million from mid-month September 2016.
- Estimated Payments of \$246 million, up \$100 million versus the same period last year.
- **Returns/Bills** of \$22 million, which is \$6 million more than the same period last year.
- **Refunds** for the September 2017 month-to-date period were \$16 million, with no change from the refunds of the September 2016 mid-month period.

Sales & Use Tax collections of \$101 million for the September month-to-date period are \$5 million or 5.5% more than the equivalent period last year. Only a small proportion of expected Regular Sales and Meals remittances are received by the mid-month date.

- The \$46 million in Regular Sales Tax collections is \$6 million more than the same month-to-date period in 2016.
- Meals Tax revenues of \$16 million month-to-date are \$1 million more than the September month-to-date period last year.
- Vehicle Tax revenues of \$40 million for the month-to-date period are \$2 million below the equivalent 2016 figure.

Corporate & Business revenues were \$471 million for the month-to-date period, which is \$21 million or 4.6% more than the same period in September 2016.

All Other includes a number of tax categories including motor fuels, cigarettes, estate taxes, and deeds. Revenues of \$76 million for the month-to-date period were \$2 million more than midmonth September 2016.

Because collections are weighted to the end of the month, we do not use the mid-month figures to project full-month revenue. Comparisons to prior-year periods are unreliable because of normal fluctuations and calendar differences in the short 15-day window of incremental data.
