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Dear Loryn,

My name is Sarah Horsley and I live at 34 Brookside Avenue, Jamaica Plain. I serve on the Board of the Boston Tenant Coalition & on the Housing and Development Committee of the JP Neighborhood Council. I am mother to a 7-year-old who loves nothing more than to play in Franklin Park. I am a nearly life-long resident of JP.

While in high school, I volunteered at Shattuck Shelter and started to learn about the complex root causes of homelessness. I met many unhoused folks who were employed and yet still not able to afford housing.

As someone who has worked on housing issues for much of my life, I can say that we are now in a true crisis period. The pandemic and economic downturn have made things even harder. And we know that in order for people to recover from substance abuse and mental health challenges, it is **crucial** for folks to be housed first.

And I am not alone in being concerned about these crises. According to a 2019 survey of Boston residents about their top health concerns, housing affordability, substance abuse and mental health ranked as the top 3 concerns.

Two years ago, I participated in the State's extensive planning process for the Shattuck campus redevelopment. Although there were different perspectives and priorities, a wide-ranging group of stakeholders came to consensus on a vision for the campus. The vision includes behavioral health services and 75-100 units of supportive housing. This vision **also includes** (1) integrating the campus with Franklin Park and (2) including components that will be accessible to the community, such as meeting space, a community garden and perhaps even space for the Shattuck Childcare Center to return to the campus.

The Shattuck Campus is far more integrated into the community than Long Island, where many of these services were previously located. Thanks to the redesign of Morton Street/Route 203, it is now connected to Forest Hills station by foot and bike paths and bus lines.

The final point I'd like to make is that this idea that all the services at the Shattuck Campus be transferred to Arborway Yard is not practical and not morally responsible.

First, because of the MBTA's financial troubles, the 20 year old MOU - in which the T promised to transfer 8 acres of Arborway Yard to the City of Boston - is not likely to be honored anytime soon. Second, the Arborway Yard does not have enough space to house the services proposed for the 13-acre Shattuck campus. Finally and most importantly, in the long term, we need both spaces for supportive housing and affordable housing!

I am a resident of Jamaica Plain, a member of the board of the Jamaica Pond Association and an organizer of a community discussion on the Shattuck redevelopment in October 2019.

I wanted to voice my strong support for the current proposal for transitional housing at the Shattuck site. While the site is not ideal from a public transit site, no site is perfect given the inevitable trade-offs between prime location and likely neighborhood opposition. The Emerald Necklace Conservancy's alternate "proposal" is focused on an alternative site (the Arborway Yard) that the MBTA hasn't even indicated they're looking to give up soon in a neighborhood that has seen more than its fair share of neighborhood resistance to new development. Any attempt to shift course towards the Arborway Yard would likely delay the proposed new transitional housing by at least two years.

In regards to the Emerald Necklace Conservancy's desire to restore open space in Franklin Park, the current Franklin Park improvement plan being designed by the City is likely to return more acreage to public use via the proposed closure of Circuit Drive and other improvements than the ENC's proposal would via the return of the Shattuck site to Franklin Park.

The need for transitional housing in Boston is urgent and far outweighs the need for 13 additional "open space" acres in a 500+ acre park.

All around the City of Boston, you can see the rising number of homeless people that are on the streets of a city that has rent prices that the average income cannot afford. Not only do we need the Shattuck Campus to be renovated, but we also need the much-needed affordable housing that the MBTA promised to allow to be built in the Arborway Yard to support other families. I value the work that the community groups did on this project. I was a member of the Jackson Square CAC and a member of the Forest Hills Neighborhood Initiative as a member of the Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council. I know too well that this planning process was time consuming and carefully done. The Emerald Necklace Conservancy's attempt to subvert any process needs to stop. There is a better answer to our neighborhood than" green space no matter what".

I was at the last meeting and heard comments from Bill Weld and Michael Dukakis, as well as the Emerald Necklace Conservancy. I was astounded at their short memories.

The Arborway Yard was a project that had 20 years of planning for affordable housing from members of my neighborhood and the MBTA that never came to fruition because of the many roadblocks put up by the Emerald Necklace Conservancy. Acres of park land that would have coexisted with affordable housing were held up due to a 6ft curb cut that would have eliminated 1 tree that was planted in the 1960's. Not by Olmstead. It isn't easy for the Governor of Massachusetts to do anything with the MBTA. Dear Loryn Sheffner:

I submit this letter as part of public comments on the plan for redevelopment of the Shattuck Hospital site. My comments here elaborate on remarks I made during the remote DCAMM hearing held on April 13.

The existing Shattuck plan represents a depressing continuation of decades of abuse of the Emerald Necklace. Most cities and states would kill for an open-space asset like the Necklace, with its rich history and capacity to deliver green-infrastructure services—never mind a park universally seen as one of the greatest works of Frederick Law Olmsted.

The Commonwealth and the City have for decades treated the Necklace as a cost-free stash of land they could raid at will to erect public facilities unrelated to park uses and functions. Paving over the "Missing Link" in the Fenway for a retail parking lot in the 1950s stands as the most blatant example of this destructive attitude.

The Commonwealth's plan for the Shattuck site continues this tradition. It contains at least three serious flaws:

- 1. **The plan undermines environmental justice.** Franklin Park abuts some of Boston's poorest and most racially segregated communities. Over the years, removal of land for other uses—a golf course, a zoo, this hospital—have reduced unencumbered park area by more than 40%. Without question, a refusal to acknowledge the needs of (or outright animus toward) communities of color fueled this steady shrinkage of the park. Returning the Shattuck site to parkland would set state policy on a welcome new course by *increasing* open space available to communities that most need it. It would represent a welcome down payment on redressing decades of neglect.
- 2. The plan willfully turns a blind eye to the climate crisis. Over the last 20 years, the term "green infrastructure" has reframed thinking about urban parks and open spaces. At no cost, these spaces deliver crucial environmental services that would otherwise require massive and expensive public works projects. These services include absorption and filtration of stormwater; improvements in human physical and mental health; and carbon sequestration. Climate instability means that Boston will endure increasingly heavy rainstorms that produce heavy flooding and require more active stormwater management. Similarly, the goal of fully decarbonizing our economy will require aggressive carbon sequestration. One of the most effective—and lowest-cost—ways to do that is by expanding the urban forest, and restoring the Shattuck site would advance that critical goal.
- 3. **The plan trashes Olmsted's greatest work.** The Emerald Necklace stands as a masterpiece of American design, created by the man who essentially invented landscape architecture in North America. Next year's bicentenary of Olmsted's birth will draw global attention—and an influx of tourists—to the Emerald Necklace. The Commonwealth needs to think about two very different narratives that could frame that concentrated attention. Will the world say, *Restoring this parkland affirmed Olmsted's artistry and demonstrated the state's leadership on sustainability?* Or will it say, *What a shame that Massachusetts lacked the vision for anything but business as usual—buildings and parking lots plopped into a world-famous park?*

What makes the Commonwealth's stubborn defense of the current plan so disheartening is that the proposal created by Northeastern students demonstrates the superiority of the Arborway Yard site for the uses planned at Shattuck. Without question, the City and Commonwealth need the services and housing the current plan would bring, but the Arborway alternative does a better job of meeting those needs. It can support the same volume of housing, provide enough space for the same level of service, and allow the MBTA to continue using the site to maintain its vehicles. Critically, it sits closer to transit, a valuable benefit for both affordable-housing residents and treatment-service clients.

On April 13, former governors Dukakis and Weld skewered the Commonwealth's main argument against the Arborway site, the idea that multiple state agencies can't unite around a better outcome. They can and they should. The Commonwealth needs to hit the pause button, acknowledge the clear benefits of the Arborway site, and restore the Shattuck site to its highest and best use—as part of the historic Olmsted plan for Franklin Park.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the draft proposal for the Shattuck Campus Redevelopment at Morton Street.

Our organizations support the overall vision for the new Shattuck Campus as a person-centered Campus designed to promote health, reduce barriers to treatment, and integrate care across the physical and behavioral health care and housing systems. However, we have several concerns about the draft proposal presented at the April 13th public meeting, specifically:

Housing + Services

We are pleased that the inclusion of 75-100 units of supportive housing is a baseline requirement for this project. However, we are concerned that the integrated health services, including both services currently offered on the site and new types of services/programs cited in Vision Plan are included as *desired*, but not *required* elements of this proposal. Through the 12+ month visioning process, members of the public and key stakeholders elevated the urgent need and support for substantial and expanded services at this site. We strongly feel that the inclusion of these services should be a requirement of this project.

Mobility + Access

We appreciate that multi-modal access is included as a priority for this project and we support the inclusions of safe bike and pedestrian routes, specifically improving the link to Forest Hills with a multi-use path. While this is a good start, significant improvements to the mobility and access component of this project should be explored. The site is a half mile from the Forest Hills stations and even with the proposed improvements, will be challenging to access for people with mobility challenges.

We are disappointed that, throughout the multi-year visioning process, DCAMM did not seriously explore alternative sites for this project, despite repeated requests from key stakeholders and community members.

We encourage DCAMM to meaningfully explore and evaluate the proposal to shift the future Shattuck Campus site to the Arborway Yard Bus Facility. This proposal has been advanced by the Emerald Necklace Conservancy, in collaboration with Northeastern University, as DCAMM did not



engage in proper due diligence to analyze potential alternative sites that may better meet the goals of the project.

As identified in the above mentioned study, the Arborway Yard Bus Facility offers an opportunity to greatly improve access to supportive housing and services included in the Shattuck Campus redevelopment proposal. The 18-acre site offers space to provide the many requirements requested by the MBTA, the City of Boston, the community and HHS, including:

- 8 acres for community services, residential units, and affordable housing (as required by the 2001 MOU between the MBTA and the City of Boston).
- Mental health and addiction rehabilitation services and 75-100 units of housing for the formerly unhoused.
- Mixed-use services and recreational greenspace adjacent to public transportation.
- Adjacent to the Forest Hills T stop and public transportation, mitigating the access concerns highlighted above.
- Sufficient space for new electric bus facilities.

At the April 13th public meeting, DCAMM stated that it has explored this option with the MBTA, but has offered no details to the public about these interagency discussions. At a minimum, DCAMM and the MBTA must provide a joint public response that details their process for analyzing the viability of this Arborway site and the criteria used for determining that this site did not meet the stated goals of the project.

Process + Community Engagement

We recognize that DCAMM has made an effort to engage impacted stakeholders throughout the vision planning process, specially by holding three public meetings and seeking feedback from the Community Advisory Board. While this process produced strong health needs and services assessment, it is clear that community members and several key stakeholders in the communities of Roxbury and Mattapan have not been meaningfully engaged in this project. This was reflected by the overrepresentation of stakeholders from Jamaica Plain at the most recent public meeting. We strongly recommend working with advocates, local leaders and elected officials to seek further input from these communities.

We also recommend providing more opportunities for two-way communication with the public. At the recent public meeting, several community members asked questions that were noted, but not directly addressed by the project team and there was no process or timeline outlined for the public to receive answers to these important questions. As this project progresses it is critical that DCAMM have a community engagement process in place that equitably engages all stakeholders and provides authentic opportunities to seek feedback and answer questions.

Thank you for considering our comments. We look forward to working with you to ensure the Shattuck Campus Redevelopment Project is successful, equitable and accessible.

I am writing in strong support of the vision plan outlined for the Shattuck Campus with the help of the community advisory board, last year.

As a neighbor, and as a person in long-term recovery from addiction, I know this campus well. I understand there are efforts from a minority of very outspoken community members to explore other sites for supportive housing and recovery services. But, I encourage the State to move forward with the current plan (on time), because there is so much to lose. I'm so grateful for the stability that recovery has brought me and housing stability is a huge part of that. I'm now fortunate to be happily raising a family in this community. Others deserve a chance for stability and to live their lives fully too.

The redevelopment of the Franklin Park Shattuck Campus to include permanent housing and recovery services is exactly what our community needs. I've tried to outline my comments below as briefly as possible:

- 1. The current vendor programs at the Shattuck campus that are focused on substance use disorders, are separate from the hospital and will not be moving to the South End. These services are incredibly hard to place (because of stigma, misinformation, and NIMBYism). They will have a difficult time finding a new permanent home in Boston if this project does not move forward.
- 2. Supportive housing for the formally homeless is a huge public health gap and need that can be partially filled on this public land that is deed-restricted for public health. Those who are chronically homeless have been particularly burdened by the COVID-19 pandemic. This is an opportunity of investment for a community that has been reeling since the closure of the long island bridge and is desperately deserving of an upgrade in quality of life.
- 3. Calls to not rebuild the Shattuck campus point to an alternative site at the nearby MBTA Arborway bus yard. The bus yard was committed for affordable housing roughly 30 years ago and there are no plans for that land to be available in the near future. History does not point to evidence that this site will be able to meet the urgent need of a recovery campus for those suffering from addiction, or supportive housing for those who've experienced homelessness.
- 4. With major investments planned for Franklin Park, allowing this campus to be redeveloped will provide access to Boston's largest park for those living at the campus. The site is a a 12 minute walk on a new multi-use path to the new Forest Hills Station head house, and only a 5 minute walk to more densely populated residential streets in JP.
- 5. As someone who regularly volunteered on this campus before the pandemic, and has had loved ones receive care or temporary shelter here, I think the calls about the campus being

isolated are overblown. I frequently run into many people staying at the shelter, in the heart of JP. They're getting food, or walking to the pond, or attending an NA meeting. Often they'd love to stay in the area where they began their recovery, but cannot afford to.

Please know that the people who need this campus the most are not in good position to send an email like this, write a letter, or attend a public meeting. But they are our neighbors. Let's redevelop this campus and give all our neighbors access to the emerald neckless, not just those lucky enough to already live here.

Hello Loryn,

I was unable to join the public hearing on the Shattuck Hospital site plans last night due to a personal emergency. I would therefore like to officially submit my public comments via this written communication.

I have to start by saying I have worked in the Park for over 40 years and in that time have almost never gone by the Shattuck (as currently constructed) without shaking my head and thinking just how incongruous and inappropriate it is that it was located within the Park. My mind often wondered who the players were that thought this was a good idea, worked through the assumedly complex machinations it took to make this happen. Clearly, this was a different time with a different set of societal standards. "Not In My Back Yard" (NIMBY) was a more powerful force than (perhaps naively) I believe it to be today. Then I'd think, well it is there and so that will never change, but what a shame. Now, we have an extremely unique opportunity to right a wrong, fix a mistake, address a shame that never should have happened.

I was invited to be a member of the Citizens Advisory Board (CAB) on this project. While I and several others tried to bring-up the issue of re-siting, particularly to the Arborway Yard site, it would not be considered. There were several "ground rules" laid out to the CAB at the onset of the meetings. One was that the current location would be used for supportive housing (minimum of 75-100 units) and another that there would be supportive out-patient services continued, at minimum at the level that is there now. These were considered non-debatable. The make-up of the CAB was highly dominated by folks that represented Human Services. There was little representation of park-oriented people. It was made abundantly apparent how much these human services are needed. There were many very knowledgeable, very good people involved who represented these needs very well, but arguments that the site was too far from the MBTA and that the facility was too isolated were quickly dispensed with. I tried to make the argument, and still am, that the Park is so important to many, many people's and families' behavioral and physical health. I participated all

through the process and found it frustrating and exasperating. By the end I was just trying to assure that the design principles were as sensitive as possible to its very unique location.

The Arborway Yard location would allow many with great need to get to and from treatment facilities, their jobs and other responsibilities in a much easier and more timely manner. This, I believe (as a non-professional), would believe assist in their road to recovery. I know a how unreliable the bus service from Forest Hills is and it gotten many people in my workplace into trouble.

The use of Franklin Park by the people of the City, the region and the surrounding neighborhoods in particular has grown so much. Despite the large existing acreage, more is needed. Thus, as I see it, re-siting the supportive housing and the out-patient treatment to the Arborway Yard would be a win for all involved, including the MBTA.

This truly is a once in a lifetime opportunity to change something that never should have happened to begin with and I hope you really consider the ramifications of this decision before you make it.

My name is Desireé Vaughn and I am a resident of Roxbury. I write today to express my strong support of the state's Preliminary Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck campus.

I understand that the Shattuck State Hospital will be moving to a new site near Boston Medical in 2024, but the shelter and several behavioral health programs will remain on the current Shattuck campus. In addition, the state wishes to add 75-100 critically needed supportive housing units to the redeveloped site.

I support the current proposal for the Shattuck campus because it will meet a crucial challenge: the dire need for supportive housing and behavioral health services.

- As a resident of Roxbury and educator in the South End/Roxbury sections of the city, I am often reminded of the persistent and urgent need of support, resources and care for those who are without homes, battling addiction and mental health challenges. This is not a "hidden" or "out of sight, out of mind" issue as some may think. Anyone driving to the South Bay shopping center, to the Orchard Gardens elementary school or along the medical center can see that people are in dire need of various supports!
- As a ripple effect, it's not hard to notice that as the neighborhoods of Boston become
 more gentrified, open and welcoming to those with more money and resources, housing
 for those who should be able to afford housing in the city, cannot do so. The housing
 crisis is especially acute for our neighbors struggling with mental health or substance
 abuse challenges.
- Black and Latinx persons have a higher likelihood of experiencing homelessness than non-Latinx White persons, according to the City of Boston's Assessment of Fair Housing.
- We now know that connecting people with housing first is crucial for recovery from mental health and/or substance abuse struggles. This should be highly obvious, as if one's basic needs go unmet, they are likely going to continue to be in the strong grips of mental health and substance abuse. Without stable and supportive housing, people end up in the ER or in an inpatient unit, which is worse for them and more costly for all of us.

As an educator, I know that restorative practices, mindfulness and wrap-around services are key to successful children and families. When the community and people with "power" collaborate to do what is best for children and families, neighborhoods can thrive.

Fortunately, Boston has developed strong civic-mindedness around the crucial needs of housing and behavioral health services. When the state conducted a comprehensive planning process in 2019, stakeholders from the surrounding neighborhoods, community groups, greenspace advocates, housing, and health care groups came to consensus on a Vision Plan.

The Vision Plan includes behavioral health services, the shelter, and 75-100 units of supportive housing. The Plan also includes integrating the campus with Franklin Park and including components that will be accessible to the community, such as a community garden or a child care center. These components are imperative to creating a space for healing, wellness and

restoration not only for the individuals that will be housed there, but also for the family members who are an integral part of their lives.

Importantly, while the Franklin Park Coalition initially advocated for the land to be returned to the park, they participated in the planning process and ultimately **supported** the Vision Plan.

Recently, the Emerald Necklace Conservancy has suggested that when the hospital moves, the supportive housing and remaining services should be moved to the Arborway Yard. This suggestion is neither practical nor morally responsible.

 Arborway Yard simply does not have enough space to house the services proposed for the 13-acre Shattuck campus. Franklin Park is a special place that's been badly neglected by the City. For years, police abdicated their responsibility to address crime and drugs in the Park based on a lack of clear jurisdiction. This is a disgrace. Fortunately, there has been more value and interest in Franklin Park and the proper use of it continues to increase. I just returned from some days in New York City including time in Central Park. I'm struck by how the City and private citizens have made that Park a well loved and lovely place. The fact that Central Park is largely positioned around wealthy neighborhoods is a clear reason it's been protected. It's discouraging that Boston has not valued the Franklin Park green space and instead, in the words of our former governor, has whittled away at it. The argument that 13 acres doesn't matter is shocking. Of course it matters. Is there a metric for how much open space is enough? These changes are permanent and it's silly to pretend otherwise.

This is a time where environmental, mental health, and social justice interests all converge to support expanding public green space. Certainly Covid has given us one of the most compelling reasons for valuing the park and open space.

The supportive services that are proposed for the Shadduck replacement are needed. If Governor Baker doesn't have the political will to direct this facility at the Arborway Yard, then another location should be found ASAP. But granting a 99 year lease will mean that a critical opportunity will be lost to serve all of Boston but especially the lower income communities that abut the park with the beautiful, rejuvenating outdoor space that was originally envisioned.

I live very near Franklin Park, on Montebello Road and am a frequent user of the Park. As I've listened to advocates of the current proposal I'm struck by the fact that the most common argument in its favor is that the planned facility is urgently needed. I seldom, if ever, hear that it is the optimal location. In fact, those who support it, often acknowledge that it's isolated from transportation and groceries. Speed to open is simply not a compelling enough reason.

As you and other leaders surely appreciate, Franklin Park is not just a local, neighborhood asset. It's a jewel of City and the State. I respectfully urge you to have the courage to protect the park and recommit the City to aspirations of Olmsted and the park founders in creating so special a place.

As a longtime JP resident, Franklin Park user, and social worker, I want to share my reasons for supporting the use of the Shattuck Hospital site for transitional

housing and neighborhood MH and SA services.

First, this is a project which was **discussed in a well-advertised and attended series of community meetings over a nearly 2 year period.** It is a project **ready-to-go** in a time when the need is astronomical.

As. an LICSW social worker serving Roxbury, Dorchester and JP families for 25 years, I have talked to mothers with children who desperately needed stable subsidized housing or lived in

places where there were no services to support their commitment to sobriety. As a prison reform activist I also know that Framingham Women's Prison is full of primary caretakers who would be much better served in stable supportive housing, and treatment services like those which would be offered at the former Shattuck site. Offering them a supportive, safe and green place to live would turn their lives around.

Supportive housing tenants from sites already in JP attend my church, First Baptist of JP, and contribute a lot.

Second, **Franklin Park is hardly "out-of-the-way"** as many are claiming. It's a 10-minute walk to

Forest Hills Station, one of the busiest bus and train hubs in Boston, offering access to all parts

of the City and beyond. Many Shattuck patients, staff, and clients walk the route every day and shuttle buses to nearby Forest Hills are on the drawing board.

Third, I closely followed the Arborway Yard boondoggle. I have friends and neighbors in JP who spent

two nights a week in meetings for more than a decade negotiating a plan for the site. It was frustrating, laborious, and often divisive work. And what do we have today? The Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council (JPNC) would like to express our gratitude for the robust community process that resulted in the Draft Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck Campus at Morton Street. The JPNC continues to support the public health use of the site, including the building of at least 75-100 units of supportive housing as well as maintaining and expanding the existing health and shelter services. The JPNC sees these services as a much-needed part of the continuum of mental health and substance use services and, therefore, supports phased development of the site, including an "Early Start" area, so that development can begin as soon as possible, ideally prior to the Hospital's relocation to the South End in 2024.

Additionally, we want to clarify that we are not aware of any evidence that would indicate that it is appropriate or possible to place any public health services on the Arborway Yard. In 2015, the JPNC took over the responsibilities for the Community Planning Committee for the Arborway Yard (CPCAY) and as such the JPNC has maintained a close monitoring of the Yard. The Arborway Yard is on the MBTA's long-term planning timeline for upgrades as a necessary and important part of bus transit. In addition, a portion of the surrounding property has been promised as a land swap between the City of Boston and the MBTA, as outlined in a 2001 MOU. The Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) identified the eventual uses for this land in its PLAN: JP/ROX.

The JPNC would also like to reiterate its support for all of the Planning Principles, including: integration of Shattuck campus with Franklin Park; improved access to neighborhoods with better public transit, bicycle and pedestrian options; increased green and open space; and alignment with local and state sustainable development goals and strategies.

The JPNC advocates for these items to be included in the Final Project Proposal

- Continued participation of a Community Advisory Board (either the one that was formed for the planning stage, or a new one) to continue the public discussion regarding security, site maintenance, and sustainable construction;
- The establishment of and funding for a community liaison to address ongoing community concerns and provide quick mitigation for all concerns. The liaison can also be tasked with notifying the community of the progress of the

- redevelopment and any upcoming meetings.
- On-going public conversation with Boston Parks Department and park advocates to ensure integration of the facility into Franklin Park and the surrounding neighborhoods, especially as the City continues its Master Planning effort.
- A requirement that the selected developer apply racial equity standards in all aspects, including design, hiring, and use.
- Greater consideration be granted to those respondents to the RFP that are non-profits and Massachusetts-based.

Finally, we request that EOHHS honor our request to partner with the Greater Mattapan Neighborhood Council if or when it becomes necessary to review the Zoning of the project.

We believe that the Final Project Proposal will represent the synergy that occurred through this robust community process and we hope the DCAMM Board will agree.

As a Boston resident since 2006, I have seen the city become more and more gentrified, with housing ever more expensive and difficult to obtain or hold on to. The housing crisis is especially acute for our neighbors struggling with mental health or substance abuse challenges.

Over 2/3 (70%) of market-rate eviction filings are in census tracts where the majority of residents are people of color, according to a 2020 report from MIT and City Life/Vida Urbana. In the city of Boston, there are over 10,000 individuals that experience homelessness each year. The state has identified that there is a need for over 3,300 supportive housing units in Eastern Massachusetts, and Black and Latinx persons have a higher likelihood of experiencing homelessness than non-Latinx White persons, according to the City of Boston's Assessment of Fair Housing

Good morning,

I am the retired RN who worked the 3 then 5 Department of Mental Health units at Lemuel Shattuck for 23 years. Last night was mentioned that the folks on the other side of the park were not very represented. When we were in the park just about daily, there were two walks: a fast perimeter walk then a more meandering one, we noted that the majority of people using the park were brown or black.

The rules changed; fences went up and down. We used to be able to enter the park easier before fencing. Patients initially needed only staff escort status to go with the park group; later this was changed to staff escort off grounds to use the park. Many, many times our patients would watch the picnics and tennis courts. Often those having picnics would offer food to our patients.

I am very concerned about protecting the vulnerable, as current staff John Stout mentioned, from addicts. When I retired in 2015, part of the chapel had been converted to a methadone clinic.

I also do not understand why a private company would want to develop this. However, as I attend the cathedral across from Brewer's Fountain on the Common, the homeless many addicted or mentally ill or both and maybe begging, many of whom I know, are not good for tourism. The only European city I have seen comparable, and seemed less, is Rome.

Finally, these antipsychotics used to be called major tranquilizers — the idea that a homeless mentally ill person can be given a major tranquilizer and left on the street is really tragic.

I am a JP resident and am writing to voice my support for the general plan to create supportive housing at the Shattuck site and also to request that *family* supportive housing be incorporated into the plan.

The current vendor programs at the Shattuck campus that are focused on substance use disorders are separate from the hospital and will not be moving to the South End. It is incredibly difficult to find locations for these types of programs, which frequently encounter opposition from potential neighbors. They will have a difficult time finding a new permanent home in Boston if this project does not move forward.

Supportive housing for the formerly-homeless and for families are huge public health gaps that can be partially filled on this public land that is deed-restricted for public health. Those who are chronically homeless have been particularly burdened by the COVID-19 pandemic. This is an opportunity of investment for a community that has been reeling since the closure of the Long Island Bridge and is desperately deserving of an upgrade in quality of life. We also desperately need places where families can stay together and where parents with substance use disorder or mental health challenges can get the support they need.

With major investments planned for Franklin Park, allowing this campus to be redeveloped will provide access to Boston's largest park for those living at the campus. The site is a 12 minute walk on a new multi-use path to the new Forest Hills Station head house, and only a 5 minute walk to more densely populated residential streets in JP.

Calls to not rebuild the Shattuck campus point to an alternative site at the nearby MBTA Arborway bus yard. The bus yard was committed for affordable housing roughly 30 years ago and there are no plans for that land to be available in the near future. History does not point to evidence that this site will be able to meet the urgent need of a recovery campus for those suffering from addiction, or supportive housing for those who've experienced homelessness.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has the opportunity to invest in the long-term needs of the City of Boston, its neighborhoods and climate by adding in a significant manner to Boston's open space inventory. In 1949, 13 acres of Franklin Park were converted into a campus for Shattuck Hospital. DCAMM has the opportunity to repair the area, restore the 13-acre parcel to its previous use as parkland and provide the most public open space possible in this high-needs area and at this critical time for climate resilience.

In 2008, Mayor Menino set an important goal for Boston. The City would plant 100,000 new trees by 2020 and expand the city's tree canopy by 20%. Between fiscal years 2008 and 2017, the City planted 9809 new street trees and removed 5815 street trees for a net gain of fewer than 4000 new street trees. The City needs to look for opportunities to plant trees throughout the city as it considers ways to address climate change. Returning the Shattuck Hospital site to parkland would provide 13 acres for tree planting. Converting this area covered in buildings and parking lots back to green space by planting trees and removing impervious surfaces, would help achieve the city's goals for a Climate Ready Boston.

Boston is the fortunate beneficiary of Frederick Law Olmsted's park planning genius. The father of landscape architecture saw a way to store stormwater in an innovative linear park system. Boston's Franklin Park is one of his master works. The City needs to expand stormwater storage in order to address climate change. DCAMM has the opportunity of the century to respect Olmsted's legacy by returning the Shattuck Hospital site to park land and in doing so:

- Expand the city's tree canopy,
- Increase carbon uptake,
- Provide needed park amenities for the neighborhoods surrounding Franklin Park, that deserve environmental justice,
- Reduce heat islands and
- Increase stormwater detention.

The new uses proposed for incorporation into Franklin Park in the current process include housing for the formerly homeless and related healthcare uses, which would require 200,000 sq. ft. in an area not integrated into a community. Locating these uses nearer to transit and other activity areas on the nearby 18 acres of state-owned property at the Arborway Yard, could provide at least 200,000 sq. ft. of space. The Arborway Yard is located near the park, but is

closer to transit and less isolated, making it a far better location.

I am a long-time homeowner in Jamaica Plain and have enjoyed many walks through Franklin Park. The Shattuck Hospital has always been in the park and it has never been an issue about its existence until now. The parkland is extensive and there is plenty of space for all the uses of the park and the hospital. It is not an either/or.

In addition, as a criminal defense attorney for more than forty years, I know that the coordinated services that will be provided will save lives. We do not do enough to address drug addiction and mental health issues. Small programs often address one issue without any involvement in the other issue. Yet mental health and drug addiction are intimately tied, along with homelessness and resultant health issues. A center with the capacity to provide shelter and coordinated counseling and other assistance is expensive, and won't be cost-effective if it is not on a large scale. There are no other realistic spaces to provide this opportunity.

Opponents of the plan suggest that it be built in the Arborway bus yard. But a lengthy community process has not resulted in any change in the MBTA's position on the use of this property. A suggestion that these services be built there will fail and the opportunity and lives will be lost.

I feel very strongly about this issue and hope that you will do everything in your power to make it happen.

My name is Shannon McCarthy and I am a 28-year resident of the Woodbourne neighborhood of Jamaica Plain and have a psychotherapy practice on Washington St, three blocks from Franklin Park. I am writing in strong support of the state's Preliminary Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck campus.

I understand that the Shattuck State Hospital will be moving to a new site near Boston Medical in 2024, but the shelter and several behavioral health programs will remain on the current Shattuck campus. In addition, the state wishes to add 75-100 critically needed supportive housing units to the redeveloped site.

I support the current proposal for the Shattuck campus because it will meet a crucial challenge: the dire need for supportive housing and behavioral health services. As a clinical social worker who has practiced in a variety of settings with a variety of people from the homeless, the addicted and the mentally ill, I am acutely aware of the dearth of support resources for people who most need them. I believe we are a country, state and city that can and must do so much better than we are to care for vulnerable residents - so that each individual and family may live with dignity. I have seen our city and my neighborhood become more and more gentrified with fewer and fewer able to afford living here at all.

I love Franklin Park and have enjoyed it for many years – jogging around the golf course, exploring the "wilderness" with my daughter, participating in the kite festivals, cheering my neice and other youth runners in citywide cross-country competions, cycling, attending carribean festivals, observing public art, cross-country skiing, taking restorative walks during lunch breaks, watching the seasons change and so many other things. The park is a true gem in the city and allowing the Shattuck campus to be used for supportive housing and behavioral health services will only help our city by sharing the wealth with those who need it most.

Recently, the Emerald Necklace Conservancy has suggested that when the hospital moves, the supportive housing and remaining services should be moved to the Arborway Yard. This suggestion is neither practical nor morally responsible because there is no guarantee that the MBTA will give up this space - in fact they haven't in (at least) 20 years that it has been in discussions.

I hope we have all learned from this pandemic just how important it is to protect the most vulnerable in our community. I urge the Commonwealth instead to fulfill the community's 2021 vision of a public health campus that integrates desperately needed housing and services with green space available to all.

My name is Helen Raizen and I am a resident of Jamaica Plain. I write today to express my strong support of the state's Preliminary Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck campus.

I understand that the Shattuck State Hospital will be moving to a new site near Boston Medical in 2024, but the shelter and several behavioral health programs will remain on the current Shattuck campus. In addition, the state wishes to add 75-100 critically needed supportive housing units to the redeveloped site.

I support the current proposal for the Shattuck campus because it will meet a crucial challenge: the dire need for supportive housing and behavioral health services.

As a longtime Boston resident, I have seen the city become more and more gentrified, with housing ever more expensive and difficult to obtain or hold on to. The housing crisis is especially acute for our neighbors struggling with mental health or substance abuse challenges.

In the city of Boston, there are over 10,000 individuals that experience homelessness each year. The state has identified that there is a need for over 3,300 supportive housing units in Eastern Massachusetts.

We now know that connecting people with housing first is crucial for recovery from mental health and/or substance abuse struggles. Without stable and supportive housing, people end up in the ER or in an inpatient unit, which is worse for them and more costly for all of us.

I have lived in Jamaica Plain since 1984. I walked in Franklin Park while waiting to give birth to my oldest child, who is turning 34 next week. I have ridden bikes there with my children; attended kite festivals; visited the zoo. My wife has worked in homeless services for nearly 20 years. We both know how important these housing units are for the health and welfare of our community.

Fortunately, Boston has developed strong civic-mindedness around the crucial needs of

housing and behavioral health services. When the state conducted a comprehensive planning process in 2019, stakeholders from the surrounding neighborhoods, community groups, greenspace advocates, housing, and health care groups came to consensus on a Vision Plan.

The Vision Plan includes behavioral health services, the shelter, and 75-100 units of supportive housing. The Plan also includes integrating the campus with Franklin Park and including components that will be accessible to the community, such as a community garden or a child care center.

Importantly, while the Franklin Park Coalition initially advocated for the land to be returned to the park, they participated in the planning process and ultimately **supported** the Vision Plan.

Recently, the Emerald Necklace Conservancy has suggested that when the hospital moves, the supportive housing and remaining services should be moved to the Arborway Yard. This suggestion is neither practical nor morally responsible. Arborway Yard simply does not have enough space to house the services proposed for the 13-acre Shattuck campus.

Those in favor of "returning the land to the park" seek to fulfill Frederick Law Olmsted's 1878 vision of a complete Emerald Necklace. As someone who lives on the Arborway, I recognize the the Emerald Necklace has a lot of housing at its edges and we should share this privilege with others, particularly those in need of supportive housing. Thus, I urge the Commonwealth to fulfill the community's 2021 vision of a public health campus that integrates desperately needed housing and services with green space available to all.

I write today to express my strong support of the State's Preliminary Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck campus. The integrity of the planning process that led to the this proposal is unquestioned. It actively engaged a broad set of stakeholders, including neighbors, community organizations and agencies, and city and state elected officials, in serious and thoughtful conversations. The Proposal offers the State an exciting opportunity to provide desperately needed supportive housing and services for some of our most vulnerable residents.

The late involvement of the Emerald Necklace Conservancy to basically sabotage the plan is very regrettable. It is also completely untenable as it raises the Arborway Yard as the alternate site for the Shattuck Campus. For more than twenty years I cochaired the Community Planning Committee for the Arborway Yard, an all volunteer group of residents that was supported by over twenty two community and neighborhood and small business groups, by the late Mayor Thomas Menino and former mayor Marty Walsh, by State Representative Liz Malia and State Senator Sonia Chang Diaz, and by the Boston City Council. Ultimately our joint advocacy led to the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding signed by the MBTA and the City and endorsed and supported by all of those named above. I have attached a copy of the document. As you read it you will see that at least 8 plus acres of the 18 acre site was promised to the City to build affordable housing, create additional open space, and promote small business development along Washington Street. The MBTA reserved up to 10 acres for the development of a state of the art maintenance and garage facility.

While the agreement has not been implemented, the State invested overt millions of dollars in preliminary plans for the site and has not sought since its signing to amend or abrogated the agreement. Any plan to shift the Shattuck to the Arborway Yard would be met by fierce opposition and would defeat such plans for alternate use of the Arborway yard. If it would be helpful, I would be open to talking with you about my concerns.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF BOSTON AND THE MASSACHUSETTS BAY TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

This Memorandum of Understanding is entered into on this 24th day of April, 2001, by and between the City of Boston (the "City") with a principal place of business at City Hall, Boston, Massachusetts 02201 and the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (the "MBTA") with a principal place of business at the Transportation Building, Ten Park Plaza, Boston, Massachusetts 02116.

It represents the culmination of an exhaustive comprehensive and collaborative planning process between the City, the MBTA and the Community Planning Committee for the Arborway Yard (the "CPCAY") as described in the November 16, 1999 Memorandum of Understanding between the City and the MBTA.

The following agreements are based on information provided on the Topographical Survey and Planimetric Map [15N-8E] and provided by the City of Boston. In view of the design process that is under consideration, the MBTA will be obliged to perform a more exacting survey of the site, inclusive of the City Street Lighting Pole Yard [the "City Pole Yard"] and their abutting land.

To the extent that this process reveals any discrepancies between the original City Topological Survey and Planimetric Map [15N-8E], the total land area assumptions will be adjusted accordingly.

For contextual reference, we are providing the following site plans for review:

- City of Boston Topological Survey & Planimetric Map;
- MBTA-COB-CPCAY Revised Option-T with Site Analysis, May 2001

Now therefore, the City and the MBTA agree as follows:

FACILITY PROGRAM, PLANNING & DESIGN

A. The total number of buses to be garaged and maintained at the proposed Arborway Transit Facility shall not exceed 118. If the LRV service is restored, then the maximum number of vehicles to be stored at the Transit Facility shall not exceed 104.

- B. The buses garaged, fueled and maintained at the Arborway Facility, in the near term shall be 40' CNG buses and in the long term, there may be twenty-60' CNG buses. Alternative technologies including fuel cell and hybrid electric vehicles shall also be pursued. No diesel buses are to be fueled, garaged or maintained at the Arborway Yard, even on an interim basis. Only vehicles actually garaged at the facility will be fueled and maintained there.
- C. The Facility and all access and egress points must be located on the Arborway side of the site.
- D. The best location for a two-way road under the Casey Overpass should be studied, acquired, designed and constructed to provide optimum bus access/egress to the Arborway Yard.
- E. There must be an Emerald Necklace Re-Connector with an average width of 85-ft and not less than 60-ft at any point, to link Franklin Park with the Arnold Arboretum, and that does not run along the Casey Overpass. The MBTA should amend the Facility design contract of Goodkind & O'Dea to reflect the additional task of providing landscape architectural services for the Emerald Necklace Re-Connector.
- F. The Washington Street/Arborway corner of the site must be developed as a signature entrance to site and enhance the Emerald Necklace Re-Connection.
- G. No vehicles will cross the Emerald Necklace Re-Connector at grade unless it permits a substantial increase in green space.
- H. There shall be no commuter parking. Employee and visitor parking shall be accommodated on the roof of the transportation facility. In order to preserve and provide for adequate parking for existing businesses and residences, fifteen surface parking spaces shall be provided for businesses in the Brookley Road/Stonley Road area and the City will install parking meters on both sides of Washington St.
- I. All MBTA activity shall be confined within an area not to exceed 10.3-acres, inclusive of the Facility, the LRV reservation and # 500 Arborway. Should the LRV not be restored, then a minimum of 0.8-acres of land will be made available for community planning and use purposes.
- J. The Facility will meet federal and state standards as agreed upon by all; to reduce light pollution, all exterior lighting must be fully cut-off and shielded; must include sound barriers constructed to enclose noise sources; HVAC blowers and compressors should be structurally isolated; marshaling yard must be enclosed with walls/screening buffers of sufficient height so that buses are not visible..

The Facility design and construction must ensure that the discharge of any pollutants meet the higher of federal, state standards, codes or regulations.

The Facility must be designed, operated and maintained to prevent additional ambient noise.

- K. The existing City owned "Pole Yard" will be incorporated into the Arborway Yard Plan.
- L. The MBTA will transfer, for good and valuable consideration, no less than 8.0-acres of the Arborway Yard site to the City for community use. The MBTA is transferring this land with the understanding that it is necessary to satisfy community priorities and mitigate the impact of the Facility. Priority uses, as determined by the CPCAY community planning process are affordable housing, youth recreation, retail, light industrial, the Emerald Necklace Re-Connector and mixed-use development along Washington St. The CPCAY will bring together all relevant community interests in Jamaica Plain, including, but not limited to, local abutters, to establish a committee of these interested parties that will oversee the community planning process for determining how these priority uses for the not less than 8.0 acres will be implemented.

OPERATIONS

- M. A vintage alternative fuel vehicle should be run between Forest Hills Station, the Arboretum, Franklin Park Zoo and the Mass Audubon Society's Boston Nature Center. The MBTA will participate in funding 50% of the cost of the seasonal service. The MBTA will not operate the service.
- N. No stationary commercial advertising of any kind is to be located on or associated with the facility.
- O. Comprehensive security arrangements must be provided at the facility by the MBTA.
- P. A transportation management plan must be approved by the City to ensure that no bus or other large MBTA vehicle is allowed on residential side roads; and MBTA employee's or clients will not use residential side roads for parking or access to the facility.
- Q. Traffic, acoustic air quality modeling must be completed before the project enters the schematic design phase and evaluated by the CPCAY and the City of Boston, as previously agreed to by the MBTA.
- R. The City must retain ownership of the Stoney Brook.
- S. The MBTA strongly encourages the use of Minority, Women, and Disadvantaged Business Enterprises and City of Boston residents as prime contractors, subcontractors, tradespeople, and suppliers in all of its contracting opportunities.
- T. Only low to mid-level maintenance shall be performed on vehicles in the facility. All work shall be performed between 6 AM and 11 PM. No repair work to be performed between 11 PM and 6 AM. Activity will be limited to visual bus inspections. Low to mid-level maintenance does not include major bodywork or engine and transmission overhaul.

U. To ensure complete compliance of the Agreement between the MBTA and the City of Boston during the design completion, construction and operations of the Arborway Yard Facility, all design and construction documents will be made available to the CPCAY and the City for timely review, including, but not limited to 5% and 15% schematic design; 30% and 60% design development; and 90% and 100% construction documents.

In the event of any violation or alleged violation of the Agreement during the design phase of the project (which also shall include any design work concerning change orders during the performance of the construction contracts), the MBTA, on its own, or upon request from the City or the CPCAY, will suspend design only of the area of dispute concerning any such violation or alleged violation. The teams (CPCAY, the City and the MBTA) shall be given notice of any such violation or alleged violation, and the teams shall be provided thirty days to cure any violation of the Agreement. In no event, however, shall the MBTA cause or allow the design work following such 30 day cure period, to proceed in a manner that will cause or allow a violation of the Agreement.

In keeping with the MBTA's continued commitment to be responsive to community concerns, which has included, but not limited to transfer of a minimum of 8.0 acres of real estate, the MBTA shall implement and maintain the highest standard for responsiveness to community concerns on all aspects of the operations of the Transit Facility. As part of this standard, the MBTA will continue to meet with and report to community members on a regular basis, shall publicize the name and telephone number of the superintendent of the facility, and shall respond and act to resolve all reasonable community concerns on a prompt basis.

COROLLARY

V. There must be a Forest Hills Area Master Plan to evaluate and optimize the full impacts of development and transportation related activity in the vicinity of the Forest Hills/Arborway Yards. The MBTA, the City and all appropriate agencies will participate in this master planning process.

Regardless of the process by which any decision was reached this Memorandum of Agreement shall not create any rights in a party not a signatory hereto nor shall it give rise to any rights or claims against any party not a signatory hereto.

This Memorandum of Agreement is hereby excuted as of the first date written above.







Ms. Sheffiner, I am taking a minute to let you and your colleagues know that the event you called a public hearing last Tuesday, April 13, 2021 evening,was actually a public disgrace and an affront to anyone that has spent any time working with public policy and civic engagement. After more than 45 plus years of working in government at every level, from local to national and international I have never been subjected to such a disrespectful and disgraceful presentation by a public agency. I spent more than 16 years in the Executive office of Environmental Affairs and oversaw hundreds of public projects involving DCAM MDC, and a host of other agencies. At no time did I ever witness anything as poorly managed as this past "public" event around the Shattuck campus.

Not only did you and your team bully the conversation by not allowing participants to interact, shutting off inter group communication but you unfairly control the process by allowing those you prefer, to speak longer and others you liked to speak without correction and to give blatant misinformation and false perspectives.

Firstly, Franklin Park and the Shattuck Campus is NOT/NOT now or ever has been in Jamaica Plains section of Boston. The fact that you agency has placed it there for the convenience of support and as a way of avoiding the Black and Latinx community, does not change the reality that what you are doing is a violation of the process which requires real community involvement and participation in programs and projects like this, that seek to deprive the residents of an area of its natural resources and access to what should be public space.

This had been one of the more Racist procedures on the part of the Commonwealth, I have had the misfortune to witness or try in which to participate with in a very long time. Not just because of your lack of any black or brown people on your staff, working on or with this project but there has been little to no public outreach to the communities of Roxbury and Dorchester that abut the park and no documented history of any communications with established housing programs, churches, social groups or neighborhood associations within the Black and Latinx Communities surrounding the Park.

The issues raised from the very beginning of this so called public process as to the purpose and benefits of this development to the residents and communities that abut the park have yet to be addressed. While it seem that after almost three years you and your crew (colleagues) which seemingly are being paid to ignore black and brown residents of this city and their needs to maintain and upgrade the open spaces

withing their community the real purpose of the land give away has yet to be determined. Despite all your prognostication there is no real or rational benefit to the "conically under housed" or the so called substance dependent community that can be achieved through this development scheme, your agency is pushing down the throats of this community.

You nor any of your colleagues in the health community has yet to explain how they believe by ISOLATING people with serious substance abuse issues and who a have been marginalized by society, put off and shunned away, will benefit from being forced into a location of this nature. It is a complete sham to say that you are trying to assist or helping to integrate people with social emotional, economic and health challenges, back into society while at the same time forcing them into a location that has little or no attachment to active areas of the community, poor transportation options, NO grocery or candy store, NO churches or schools and NO/NO neighbors other than the dead to speak of or with.

Again, I ask that you give an explanation as to what your mental health colleagues believe will be the benefit of this deep social isolation and stigmatization of individuals trying to recover and work their way back into society. Other than the tons of money the provider groups and agencies are going to make off of their misery, servicing them and forcing them by geographical isolation to maintain their dependency on social welfare and corrective programs, what is the growth perspective for the participants in this socially ostracized dependent ghetto? Who in the group, you say you are committed to reaching out to, will be able to afford to buy a house...how? How will those, isolated in this area, get to work given the poor transportation options and distance from the Forest Hill Station? In all honesty what are you and your colleagues really trying to create and why because clearly it is not your intentions to improve the quality of life for those trapped in this never ending cycle of dependency is you place them in a location that does not promote access to growth and change?

Next, why is Massachusetts the only state in the nation that is taking historic and iconic, PUBLIC PARK LAND and deeding it over to a PRIVATE DEVELOPER for NINETY-NINE (99) YEARS? How short sighted and stupid is that? When the demand is for more public space, given the needs of growing communities in the inner city, the State and the City is taking away public access and public space from the citizens of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the City of Boston. In this letter, I will explain my support through the following: 1) feedback summary, 2) current Massachusetts public health needs, and 3) public health campus availability. At the end, I ask two questions.

1. Feedback Summary

The State of MA led a thorough, inclusive community process, which identified the most pressing Massachusetts public health needs and proposed a pathway to address them. Local feedback influenced the designs through green space recovery and physical community connection. Lastly, no near term alternative sites are available. I therefore strongly support this Shattuck Campus project focus and vision.

2. <u>Current MA public health needs: Substance use disorder, behavioral health, dual diagnosis, and income restricted housing (including supportive). I agree.</u>

Public health surveys consistently identify behavioral health, substance use disorder (alcohol and/or opioid addiction), dual diagnosis, and housing (income restricted including supportive) as the biggest MA public health needs. The Shattuck Campus CAB vision aligned to these health needs. All public health experts (city and non-profit) CAB members agreed with these unmet needs. No CAB member identified other public health needs.

Some CAB members highlighted green space's general health benefits. I acknowledge positive medical literature showing positive public health outcome when comparing low access to high access green space areas. However, the area has over 500 acres of green space. Adding 13 acres or an additional 2-3% to green space would not provide the same societal benefits as addressing the urgent need for housing and SUD/behavioral health treatment.

Setting aside percentages and focusing on the top unmet health needs in Massachusetts, I am unable to locate publications linking green space to a reduction in the aforementioned public health needs.

I agree with the identified public health needs as being Massachusetts' most pressing (SUD, behavioral health/dual diagnosis, income restricted housing including supportive housing).

3. Public health campus availability: In the context of only one available health-deeded public health campus, I support repurposing the existing Shattuck Campus

For context, Undersecretary Lauren Peters sought feedback from all participants, often receiving tough feedback, even from City employees. All topics were welcome, including alternative locations from non-CAB members. The alternative site conversation genesis was a well-publicized letter from non-CAB member group.

In response, the Undersecretary stated that she contacted the MBTA about how to obtain the Arborway Yard. The process included fair market value assessment, public bidding, long timelines, and new community processes. For example, the methadone clinic and homeless shelter would be relocated to a dense residential neighborhood, where the community would want to discuss the existing zoning and suitability of a nearby methadone clinic and emergency men's shelter. After presenting this information, the Undersecretary asked if anyone had additional comments or concerns or wished to continue this discussion. No participants desired to continue the discussion at that point. In future meetings, site selection and "Northeastern study" did not play a major role.

If 5 sites with equal availability, feasibility, and capacity were available, the CAB would have had to make significant trade-offs. However, 5 sites are not available now. Only 1. If we switch sites now, the aforementioned public health needs will continue worsening as we initiate another multiyear public process.

After the last public meeting, where many community residents endorsed the "Northeastern report", stating that it influenced their views on siting. I have now read the report and learned the following about the report:

- 1. Northeastern students ran the project with a faculty advisor
- 2. Emerald Necklace was the client, with an Emerald Necklace board member serving as the students' faculty advisor
- 3. The report stated that relocating services would be better for providers and patients without stating which public health experts and organizations shared this view
- 4. The report did not highlight the timeline and process for DPH to obtain new parcels
 - i. Arborway yard as a housing location has been discussed for 20 years how long will it take?
- 5. The report did not highlight legal considerations with relocating services like methadone and homeless shelters. Do they want to move? Methadone clinics feel legally singled out and sue under ADA. To avoid singling them out, I will ask: are there other ways to recover green space besides the 13 acre Shattuck campus?

Full disclosure: I am a Northeastern University graduate and have collaborated with students on 2 separate community consulting projects. I am familiar with the process of

approaching NU with a specific question and collaborating with wonderful students in solving my question.

Because of the lack of alternative sites with the same timelines, I support repurposing Shattuck to address the above public health needs.

4. Two questions

- 1. This state of MA vision will ultimately benefit people who generally do not participate in community meetings: People who are currently homeless, formerly homeless, and/or people with behavioral or SUD. What is the state of MA doing to ensure that this voiceless community has a voice in this process?
- 2. Mike from Franklin Park Coalition highlighted that the State of MA should contribute to the environmental clean-up. I strongly agree with his position. Can the state of MA commit to funding the post demolition environmental clean-up?

I understand that the Shattuck State Hospital will be moving to a new site near Boston Medical in 2024, but the shelter and several behavioral health programs will remain on the current Shattuck campus. In addition, the state wishes to add 75-100 critically needed supportive housing units to the redeveloped site.

I support the current proposal for the Shattuck campus because it will meet a crucial challenge: the dire need for supportive housing and behavioral health services.

I'm writing to express my opposition to the proposal by EOHHS to re-use the Shattuck Hospital site for supportive housing and other health services. To be clear, I'm **not** opposed to the supportive housing and other health services, just to the proposed location at the Shattuck Hospital site. There's an alternative location nearby – the Arborway Yard Bus Facility - that is better-suited for such uses, could meet multiple needs and commitments and allow for the return of parkland that was transferred from Franklin Park, which is surrounded by environmental justice communities – Roxbury, Dorchester, Mattapan, Roslindale and Jamaica Plain.

I urge EOHHS and the MBTA to work together to find a way to provide the supportive housing as soon as possible and to right the many wrongs which were described in previous correspondence to Commissioner Gladstone.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to solve multiple problems - and to make the best possible use of 31 acres in two locations near Forest Hills (13 acres at the Shattuck Hospital site and 18 acres at the Arborway Yard Bus Facility).

Please make every effort to ensure that we do not miss this opportunity to:

- provide the greatly needed supportive housing & health services, which the state is seeking to provide, in a transit-oriented location;
- create a cleaner-fuel (electric) transit storage & maintenance bus facility;
- follow through on the vision for affordable housing, commercial use and more (Plan: JP/Rox);
- restore lost parkland in Franklin Park, designed by Frederick Law Olmsted to

create a space for urban dwellers to experience nature, which results in physical, mental and spiritual health benefits

It could be a **win/win/win/win(!)**, and a collaboration between the Emerald Necklace Conservancy & Northeastern University has shown several ways that it could be done.

Also, there is new leadership at the MBTA & MassDOT, a new Mayor, a new President, and potential funding for infrastructure. When will there be a better chance for the Commonwealth to fulfill the potential of these 31 acres? Children who were born when the Arborway Yard Bus Facility MOU was signed by representatives of the MBTA & the City of Boston on April 24, 2001 are turning 20 years old tomorrow. That agreement called for the MBTA to transfer 8 acres to the City for community use in exchange for the City-owned Pole Yard & more. Instead, we got a "temporary" bus facility and nothing else.

Franklin Park is surrounded by environmental justice communities. The land that was transferred for the Shattuck Hospital was taken from these particular communities for a reason. (It was initially planned to be sited in a suburban location.) The hospital has provided valuable services for nearly 70 years, but now that there are plans for it to be demolished, Roxbury, Mattapan, Dorchester, Roslindale, JP deserve to have their historic green space restored. Why would we deny these communities when there's a way to provide the supportive housing & health services in a location that's better for the people EOHHS intends to serve?

I am also very concerned about two other aspects of the proposal:

- the many Waivers that are being sought, which appear to deny checks and balances that were put in place for a reason.
- the proposed 99-year lease of public land to a private developer land that the City went to great lengths to acquire for use as public parkland.

 The Franklin Park site should be the last resort not the first & only choice! It has value as open space not just for what can be built there.

I understand that EOHHS has this site and they have a great need to provide

supportive housing & recovery services, so they would like to fill that need in the location that they have. But if they approached it from the perspective of the people they intend to serve, who don't own cars & are trying to build new lives, it may not be in their best interest to be in the Shattuck Hospital location.

For the above reasons, I hope that EOHHS and the MBTA can be asked to work together to find a way to provide the supportive housing, the most critical need, as soon as possible at the transit-oriented site, the Arborway Yard Bus Facility site.

Dear Ms. Sheffner,

I am writing to express the Boston Public Health Commission (BPHC)'s support for the Shattuck Campus Redevelopment Project draft proposal. As currently presented, this project would continue to serve our city's most vulnerable residents, individuals experiencing homelessness, substance use disorder and behavioral health. There is a pressing need for the safe, quality housing that this project would provide, in addition to the significant behavioral support services to assist its residents. This plan is consistent with the City of Boston's commitment to housing all chronically homeless individuals currently living in shelter or on the street in Boston.

As Boston's health department, BPHC's mission is to protect, preserve, and promote the health and well-being of all Boston residents, particularly the most vulnerable. Our programs cover an extensive range of health-related issues including recovery services, homeless services, violence prevention, racial justice and health equity, and more. For decades, BPHC has provided accessto-care, harm reduction, and treatment services through the bureau of Recovery Services. Recovery Services offers comprehensive programming and resources aimed at preventing substance use and supporting the treatment and recovery for those impacted by substance use disorders. Direct services are provided by Recovery Services at three locations in Boston and cover the continuum of care including harm reduction programming, overdose prevention and Narcan distribution, street outreach, day time low-threshold spaces, drop-in access to care services for treatment, transitional and long-term residential programming, outpatient services, youth prevention and a peer recovery center. We also work across City departments and with community partners to create a coordinate citywide recovery strategy, fight stigma, and increase access to care. BPHC's Homeless Services Bureau is one of the largest providers of emergency shelters in New England, serving 600-700 persons experiencing homelessness each night. The Bureau provides a wide range of services, including emergency shelter, career counseling, job training, substance use prevention, and transitional and permanent housing support services. Our mission is to make homelessness rare, brief, and one-time. To succeed in this mission, we recognize the need for housing, especially permanent supportive housing. Supportive housing offers a tailored approach to helping an individual get the help and assistance they need based on their service plan. Permanent supportive housing provides both needed financial support paired with client-specific supports to make housing retention successful.

Housing insecurity and homelessness has been recognized as an urgent crisis, but the COVID-19 pandemic has made the preexisting issues even worse. People living in congregate shelter settings have been especially vulnerable during the pandemic. While comprising less than 1% of the U.S. population, people living in congregate shelter settings have comprised nearly 50% of coronavirus deaths. We are proud that at BPHC, we were able to keep our doors open to new and returning guests throughout the pandemic and worked hard to keep guests safe with dedensification measures, frequent testing, and accessible vaccinations. Overall Boston-wide emergency shelter capacity, however, has decreased by nearly 600 beds while the number of single adults living on the streets of Boston and needing emergency shelter has increased.

Boston's homelessness crisis needs long-term, people-centered, sustainable solutions. All placements into permanent housing need to be sustainable over time, providing the kind of support services that aid clients in addressing the root problems that led to their homelessness. Without these services, some recently re-housed people will drift back toward homelessness, only to repeat the cycle. To address this crisis, the City of Boston has a broad housing strategy, *Housing Boston 2030*. The goal is to create 69,000 new units of housing that will serve a range of incomes. Permanent supportive housing with wraparound supportive services at the Shattuck plays an important part in meeting those goals and the increasing need for affordable housing. The proposed Public Health Campus Redevelopment Project at the Shattuck Campus is a much-needed additional piece to the City's efforts to reduce homelessness.

With input from the planning process to date, the State created a *Vision Plan for the Shattuck Campus at Morton Street*; a *Public Health Needs and Services Assessment*; and a *Preliminary Project Proposal*. The BPHC supports the vision for the campus which is to provide a continuum of behavioral health and health care services, a minimum of 75-100 units of supportive housing and integrate with Franklin Park, maximizing green space on Campus, improving accessibility and sustainable development.

Throughout the State's planning process, it has been assumed that public health uses would be a part of the site consistent with the State's understanding of deed restrictions and statutory restrictions set out in the act of the legislature authorizing the transfer of the property from the City to the State, Chapter 770 of the Special Acts of 1949. This also reflects the findings of the Public Health Needs and Services Assessment, as well as what appears to be a consensus among many community members, behavioral health and substance use disorder providers and advocates that public health uses remain a key part of the State's plans for the site. This is especially true given the enormous difficulty of siting the kinds of facilities envisioned by the State's plan.

In closing, we would like to extend our thanks to the Executive Office of Health and Human Services and the Department of Public Health for their leadership throughout this process, as well as the many organizations and community members who have thoughtfully participated throughout. We, the undersigned, members of the Stonybrook neighborhood and other friends of Franklin Park, oppose the current proposal for the Shattuck Campus.

Boston currently faces a housing crisis and a raging opioid epidemic. Supportive housing and recovery services are more essential now than ever. We strongly support more supportive housing and services throughout Boston, including in our neighborhoods. But Boston's citizens should not have to choose between social services and green space.

First, the Shattuck Campus is not an appropriate location for the proposed services. The current proposal would isolate already stigmatized populations and create ideal conditions for opportunist criminals to prey on those we are trying to help when they are at their most vulnerable. Supportive housing and recovery services should be integrated into the community and offered alongside non-stigmatized health services, such as services for children and the elderly.

The state would have us believe that there are no other suitable locations for the proposed services. This is wrong. There is ample unused or underused government-owned land within a few blocks of current Shattuck Campus. The land surrounding 500 Arborway, for example, is largely empty. Similarly, unused land within the Arborway Bus Yard—an eyesore that has been languishing as a "temporary" bus depot for nearly twenty years—is wasted space. Closer to public transportation and located within the dynamic and growing Stonybrook neighborhood, either property would be far better for supporting housing and recovery services than the current Shattuck Campus. With hundreds of other new residences already in construction in the immediate area, the Stonybrook community would welcome as new neighbors those currently slated to be isolated within Franklin Park. Indeed, the community already supports another new supportive housing project, the Pine Street Inn project at 3368 Washington Street.

Second, we fear that these and other potential locations are being overlooked, not because they are unfit for the proposed services, but because carving up Boston's parks is politically easier than developing other publicly-owned land. This is a disservice to every Boston citizen. Communities need open space. Green space is essential to public health. In light of increasing rates of obesity, diabetes, and other debilitating conditions, Boston's citizens need and deserve adequate and safe parkland for sports, exercise, and other recreational activities. Franklin Park serves as a major outdoor recreational area for Mattapan, Roxbury, Dorchester, and Jamaica Plain. The people of these communities should not be required to give up, in the name of political expediency, precious public green space when locations more suitable for the proposed services are right down the street.

Boston's housing crisis and rising property values means that all available land is being developed. But this should **not** include park land. Park land is not "available" for other uses by

the state. Park land already has an essential public health purpose and belongs to the people of Boston.

We therefore call on you and our other elected representatives to use available urban properties for the proposed services and return the Shattuck Campus to Franklin Park.



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



Since its inception in 1969, **Pine Street Inn, Inc.** (**PSI**) has served Greater Boston's homeless through various responsive, community-based programs and services. PSI is the largest nonprofit homeless services agency in New England. Pine Street Inn provides food, clothing, shelter, day and night-time street-based outreach, access to health care, job training, affordable housing, and other critical resources for nearly **2,000** individuals each day and night at its **39** locations throughout Metropolitan Boston.

Pine Street Inn has successfully served homeless individuals with many disabilities and difficulties for over **50** years. Current emergency shelter locations include the Men's Inn, **Shattuck Shelter**, Women's Inn, and Holy Family Inn programs, which collectively include **670 beds** (pre-COVID). PSI emergency shelter facilities are all **low-threshold**, **low-barrier** environments; there are no requirements to receive services or emergency shelter and no limits to the length of stay. Together, these facilities provide two meals and overnight accommodation for up to 768 (including overflow beds) people experiencing homelessness and are open 365 days a year. PSI provided shelter for at least one night or outreach to unsheltered homeless individuals to an unduplicated count of **7,377** individuals throughout FY2020.

Since 1984, PSI has been developing and operating permanent affordable housing specifically for people experiencing homelessness. Pine Street Inn has developed housing and housing-based services specifically for persons living with disabilities, including mental illness, HIV/AIDS, chronic substance use disorder histories, dual diagnosis, and mobility limitations.

Please accept the following commentary from Pine Street Inn regarding the proposed Lemuel L. Shattuck Hospital Campus redevelopment process. PSI operates both an emergency homeless shelter and a shelter-based Structured Outpatient Addictions Program (SOAP) on-site. There is a high need for these services in the community, and Pine Street Inn expects to remain an integral partner on the Shattuck Campus.

A shelter for persons experiencing homelessness has been on the Shattuck Campus for decades. As the agency running the Shattuck Shelter, Pine Street Inn aims to ensure homelessness experiences are rare, brief, and one-time. While the need for shelter continues, PSI is also focusing on housing, the **solution to homelessness**.

The need for more permanent supportive housing is undeniable. Over **2,000** single adults live on the streets of Boston and stay in emergency shelters (*City of Boston 40th Annual Homeless Census*, City of Boston, January 2020, Boston.gov). Simultaneously, PSI Street Outreach Van contacts increased by **40%** from August 2019 to August 2020, and outreach contacts have increased **30%** through 2021.

Pine Street Inn's vision is a permanent home and community for everyone. However, there is an overwhelming lack of affordable supportive housing in Boston. The inclusion of new supportive housing in the Vision Plan and the RFP is a crucial, concrete action to ensure that people can exit homelessness and live stably and successfully into the future.

With this pressing need, Pine Street Inn ardently supports the **Early Start Area** concept on the Campus to allow development to advance on the supportive housing goal sooner rather than after the Hospital's relocation. PSI further recommends **separating the emergency shelter/supportive housing plan from the whole site development proposal**. It may be problematic to find a single developer for the entire site. If that is the case, it is crucial to ensure no delays to emergency shelter and housing.

Separation allows the necessary housing to proceed, circumventing delays due to the many issues of overall campus development. While the shelter/housing will be cohesive with the entire campus design, development should not wait for the full process.

Pine Street Inn also appreciates the Planning Principals that guided the discussions resulting in the Vision Plan. The Planning Principals included creating a **minimum of 75 to 100** units of permanent supportive housing. Pine Street Inn encourages the inclusion of a minimum number and requests that a baseline Program Element is the set minimum of 75 to 100 units.

The developers responding to the RFP will establish design, feasibility, and staffing patterns in their proposals. With the minimum number of units at 75 to 100, the developer will have the flexibility to propose, for example, a 3-story building with 40 units per floor – because that configuration may work for the best delivery of supportive services. Planning the structure and program to meet and exceed the needs of people formerly experiencing homelessness lays the foundation for long-term stability and permanent housing success.

The Shattuck Campus must be used for public health purposes. It has become a recognized principle that **housing is health care**. PSI's COVID experience in shelters and supportive housing

confirms that permanent housing is the superior option for health and safety. While PSI shelters initially experienced a COVID-positive rate of 36%, the positive rate never rose above 1% across PSI's permanent supportive housing portfolio. National data further supports this – people living in congregate shelter settings comprise **less than 1%** of the U.S. population, but **nearly 50% of coronavirus deaths** (Housing is Healthcare: Challenges, Best Practices, and Policy Recommendations to Improve FEMA Programs to House People Experiencing Homelessness in Non-Congregate Shelters During the Pandemic, National Low Income Housing Coalition, October 27, 2020, nlihc.org).

The Shattuck Campus site is the perfect setting for supportive housing with unique support services **enhanced health through interactions with nature**. Green space activities can co-exist and will augment and enrich the tenants' health and community.

As a **current service provider** on Campus, PSI recognizes the Shattuck Campus's redevelopment provides an unprecedented opportunity to create a person-centered, integrated public health and wellness community. Critical behavioral health systems can work together to promote the health of those who either live on the Campus or receive services there.

Pine Street Inn applauds the Commonwealth's commitment to an efficient and equitable process. We are in **full support** of the Executive Office of Health and Human Services, seeking **approval** from the Asset Management Board to enter into a long-term lease for the Shattuck Campus in keeping with the Vision Plan of 2020.

I am strongly in favor of the Vision Plan for the Shattuck Hospital presented at the community meeting on 4/13. It strikes a good balance between maintaining important services and supportive housing and paying attention to open spaces and the connection to the park.

A few points:

- 1) This process was not perfect but it represents more than a year's worth of meetings and dialogue to try to get to agreement about the future of the Shattuck site. All voices were heard in this process. I sincerely hope DCAMM will honor the process that you led and not be distracted by a last-minute push to delay or derail the vision plan.
- 2) This plan represents the kind of cross-neighborhood cooperation that we all talk about wanting to see, especially between the South End and JP/Mattapan. Our community is saying yes to moving some of the services from the South End to the Shattuck. If more communities stepped up and recognized that the challenges of homelessness, mental health, and addiction are problems that affect all our neighborhoods, then resources and services would be more equitably distributed across the city and metro region.
- 3) I spent many years organizing around the Arborway Yard with hundreds of other neighbors, to make sure that development of the site includes significant community benefits, including affordable housing, green space, and commercial uses. I am hopeful that this vision will come to fruition one day, but in the meantime it is misleading and disingenuous for opponents of the Shattuck plan to suggest that a simple solution would be to move proposed housing and services to the Arborway site. Creating a false equivalency between the 13 acre Shattuck site and the 6 acres of MBTA land on a working bus depot that one day will be developed is an argument that I trust and hope that DCAMM will reject out of hand.

I am an avid daily user of Franklin Park, a longtime Jamaica Plain resident, and a citizen deeply engaged with the Emerald Necklace parks and redevelopment issues in the Forest Hills and Arborway neighborhoods. I've also researched extensively the history and legacy of the Shattuck site as well as current best practices for the myriad communities it has served.

It seems to me that the question of "what to do with the Shattuck site" has been overly focused on the site itself rather than on what is best for the patients and clients the Commonwealth hopes to serve. Since the Supreme Court's 1999 "Olmstead Decision" and subsequent court expansion of the principles it lays out, best practice has shifted to providing services in the "least restrictive and most integrated settings" possible, within the communities such clients hope to re-enter successfully. Isolating such services and clients "out of sight and out of mind" in a corner of Franklin Park seems to me to be far closer to a 19th Century model - when patients were warehoused in isolated settings - than to a 21st Century integration model.

Siting such services and clients within the surrounding community, closer to the Forest Hills transit hub, closer to the daily life of a vibrant neighborhood would be in the best interests of the clients. It would lead to better health outcomes for them through reduced isolation, and would provide better access for employees, suppliers and care providers. Fortunately there is an underdeveloped Commonwealth-owned site in the area that can provide all that: the Arborway Yard site, which has provided "temporary" bus services and blighted but sufficient acreage for more than two decades.

I urge authorities to reconfigure their current thinking: start with a Best Health Outcomes focus rather than the current "What to do with the Site" model. Think of ways to provide a more humane and less isolated provision of service. Before granting 99 year leases, consider what is in the long-term best interest of the clients, the service providers, and the

surrounding community.

And work hand-in-hand with other state and city agencies (MBTA, Boston Parks, and more) to provide an integrated, comprehensive solution that truly serves all - clients, providers, park users and the surrounding community.

I am among of the <u>majority</u> of speakers at DCAMM's public meeting of April 13th who expressed the desire to have the Shattuck Hospital site, "*Heathfield*" restored as public parkland and returned to Franklin Park from which it was divorced over 70 years ago. Now is the time to right a past wrong!

Locating marginalized members of society in remote settings, (out of sight/out of mind), is a nineteenth century concept that has long been dispelled. Arguments against isolating members of society should prove difficult for anyone from a current perspective to refute. In fact, in 1999, the Supreme Court came out with a ruling, coincidentally titled, the "Olmstead Act," - (under the American With Disabilities Act), that asserts the following:

- 1. "Institutional placement of persons who can handle and benefit from community settings perpetuates unwarranted assumptions that persons so isolated are incapable of or unworthy of participating in community life."
- 2. "Confinement in an institution severely diminishes the everyday life activities of individuals, including family relations, social contacts, work options, economic independence, educational advancement, and cultural enrichment."

The humane thing to do is to integrate people into society, with access to transit, urban amenities and job opportunities.

Finally, I would be remiss not to mention that the April 13th DCAMM meeting was the least public public meeting I have ever attended. The pandemic has made zoom the obligatory communication option for such gatherings. However, given the constraints inherent to the zoom format, why were certain zoom features not enabled? DCAMM members' videos were turned on while the video functions for participants were disabled, effectively turning the 'public' into a faceless, dehumanized mass. Another zoom detail: The participants' list (250 people in all) was not made visible to attendees. By my count, 48 people spoke and identified themselves - who were the 202 others? Can the full participant list, as well as meeting notes and the comments that were posted in the Q&A be made public and distributed to those in attendance?

In closing, may the voices of reason and humanity prevail!

We all sleep better knowing our neighbors have the care they deserve.

How nice for housing to be offered near Franklin Park, the quiet and beauty would offer such peace and solace for these new residents.

Fortunately, Boston has developed strong civic-mindedness around the crucial needs of housing and behavioral health services. When the state conducted a comprehensive planning process in 2019, stakeholders from the surrounding neighborhoods, community groups, greenspace advocates, housing, and health care groups came to consensus on a Vision Plan.

The Vision Plan includes behavioral health services, the shelter, and 75-100 units of supportive housing. This letter is written in strong support of the current proposal for future development of the Shattuck Campus site as presented at an on-line meeting of 4/13/2021. I am writing on behalf of myself and the **over 40 neighbors below**, most of whom are long-term Boston residents and appreciative users of Franklin Park.

My name is Patricia Feeley. I live at 69 Paul Gore Street, Jamaica Plain. I am 50-year resident of Jamaica Plain, most of that time as a community health nurse in Jamaica Plain /Roxbury. I have had patients, friends, and relatives who have dramatically benefitted from the services on Shattuck Campus. As a public health person, I know how important decent housing is to health, so we are especially glad to learn of the substantial amount of supportive housing included in this proposed project. Both as a nurse, and as a local resident, i am proud to have been involved in the development of the Bowditch School and the Blessed Sacrament Campus, both of which continue to include very successful supportive housing.

Regarding the housing issue, of particular importance to note:

- In June 2020, MIT & City Life/Vida Urbana did a report: <u>Evictions in Boston:</u> <u>The Disproportionate Effects of Forced Moves on Communities of Color.</u> Over 2/3 (70%) of market-rate eviction filings are in census tracts where the majority of residents are people of color.
- In the city of Boston, there are over 10,000 individuals that experience homelessness each year. The state has identified a need for over 3,300 supportive housing units in Eastern Massachusetts.
- Black and Latinx persons have a higher likelihood of experiencing homelessness than non-Latinx White persons, according to the City of Boston's Assessment of Fair Housing
- We now know that connecting people with housing first is crucial for recovery from mental health and/or substance abuse struggles. Without stable and supportive housing, people end up in the ER or in an inpatient unit, which is worse for them and more costly for all of us.

As someone who also lives close to Curley House, the new home of the Emerald Necklace Conservancy, I am disappointed that the ENC is creating a false and unnecessary conflict by insisting that 13 acres designated for public health be added to the 526 acres of Franklin Park. Of course, I realize the value of parks and I support increasing green space in Boston, but not at any cost. The marginal difference these

acres would make to Franklin Park is dwarfed by the impact of the proposed recovery campus on the lives of Boston residents and their families.

I also believe ANY proposal that these Public Health services be located at Arborway Bus Yard as an alternative site **is totally unrealistic for anytime in near future.** A look at the history of attempts to develop this space for community use shows the many difficulties and barriers involved. There are many excellent ways the Arborway Yard can be developed when and if it is freed for development, but to allow that eventual possibility to sabotage the current proposal would be foolish. The energy of many Boston residents who have been concerned about green space has been used to work collaboratively with State over recent months and years, to ensure that the green space promised in the current proposal is effectively incorporated into the new site, and I hope that work will continue.

In the 50's Mayor Curley and other officials designated this piece of land for public health use. This was because they understood the needs of THAT time. Again, TODAY, because of the needs of THIS time, OUR time, it is crucial that we continue the current and expanded health use of this site. Tuberculosis was one of the big public health issues in the '50's. Today we have multiple scourges, not just COVID-19, but the related increase in homelessness, job loss, opioid addiction and racism. To encourage diverting 13 acres of land that are crucial to the health of so many people AND therefore of the community at large, would certainly be a loss to the city.

My name is Kat Callard and I am a resident of Roslindale. I write today to express my strong support of the state's Preliminary Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck campus.

I understand that the Shattuck State Hospital will be moving to a new site near Boston Medical in 2024, but the shelter and several behavioral health programs will remain on the current Shattuck campus. In addition, the state wishes to add 75-100 critically needed supportive housing units to the redeveloped site.

I support the current proposal for the Shattuck campus because it will meet a crucial challenge: the dire need for supportive housing and behavioral health services. As a longtime Boston resident, I have seen the city become more and more gentrified, with housing ever more expensive and difficult to obtain or hold on to. The housing crisis is especially acute for our neighbors struggling with mental health or substance abuse challenges.

In the city of Boston, there are over 10,000 individuals that experience homelessness each year. The state has identified that there is a need for over 3,300 supportive housing units in Eastern Massachusetts. Black and Latinx persons have a higher likelihood of experiencing homelessness than non-Latinx White persons, according to the City of Boston's Assessment of Fair Housing. We now know that connecting people with housing first is crucial for recovery from mental health and/or substance abuse struggles. Without stable and supportive housing, people end up in the ER or in an inpatient unit, which is worse for them and more costly for all of us.

Additionally, Franklin Park is so critical as a green space in an urban environment that supports the well being of those who have the privilege of using that space. I take my children there to explore the magical woods.

Fortunately, Roslindale has developed strong civic-mindedness around the crucial needs of housing and behavioral health services. When the state conducted a comprehensive planning process in 2019, stakeholders from the surrounding neighborhoods, community groups, greenspace advocates, housing, and health care groups came to consensus on a Vision Plan.

The Vision Plan includes behavioral health services, the shelter, and 75-100 units of supportive housing. The Plan also includes integrating the campus with Franklin Park and including components that will be accessible to the community, such as a community garden or a child care center.

Importantly, while the Franklin Park Coalition initially advocated for the land to be returned to the park, they participated in the planning process and ultimately **supported** the Vision Plan.

Recently, the Emerald Necklace Conservancy has suggested that when the hospital moves, the supportive housing and remaining services should be moved to the Arborway Yard. This suggestion is neither practical nor morally responsible. Not at all!

- Because of the MBTA's financial troubles, it is unlikely to honor the 20+ year old MOU, in which it promised to transfer 8 acres of Arborway Yard to the City of Boston.
- Arborway Yard simply does not have enough space to house the services proposed for the 13-acre Shattuck campus.

Those in favor of "returning the land to the park" seek to fulfill Frederick Law Olmsted's 1878 vision of a complete Emerald Necklace. I urge the Commonwealth instead to fulfill the community's 2021 vision of a public health campus that integrates desperately needed housing and services with green space available to all.

Hi Loryn:

I am writing to ask you and your colleagues to do everything possible to ensure the Shattuck campus is dedicated to being a resource for housing and supporting community members experiencing homelessness, mental health crises, and substance use disorders. It's an absolute imperative.

I've been a resident of the South End area for the better part of the last 9 years. I've also volunteered with BPS elementary schools in the community including the Blackstone and, more relevantly, Orchard Grove, where play outside has become unsafe due to needles and children cannot safely walk to and from school. I'm going to pull a "think of the children" card here because it's warranted. These kids are entitled to a psychologically safe place to learn. Massachusetts is failing to provide that and it's absolutely shameful.

Watching the ever-growing crisis of increasing numbers of folks in the area experiencing homelessness, substance challenges, and the related uptick of violence and trauma especially towards minimum wage workers at Dunkins and CVS's trying to keep people from overdosing in the bathrooms, I just don't see how anyone who has seen truly experience and observed this community crisis up close could reasonably be against using Shattuck as a resource to help heal this issue for all of Boston.

In 2013, I used to walk from Dartmouth at Columbus to Orchard Grove to volunteer, so I had my stops and new a few baristas, clerks, etc along Mass ave on the way to Cass. In 2014, when the bridge closed, it quickly became impossible to do and feel safe as a person walking alone in daylight-- and I'm a grown up, not an elementary school student or Dunkin worker who is a recent immigrant and has limited english with which to diffuse a situation or to call 911 when situations become unsafe (used to volunteer with International Institute of Boston as well). As the years have passed, things have gone from really bad to almost apocalyptic with needles, open substance use, poop, etc. It's become a situation where no one in the community gets to have dignity and safety, including community members experiencing homelessness.

I also spent the last two years living just outside Central Square, an area with similar issues around community members experiencing homelessness, substance and mental health disorders. I've lived and worked all over the world, including in a number of developing countries and somehow these neighborhoods right here in Massachusetts are the places I've felt most unsafe walking alone and most let down by local government in caring for its people. If it's more helpful to talk dollars and numbers, frankly, there's huge economic incentive to ensure both Boston and Cambridge, the powerhouses of the State economy, are provided support by the state in the form of the Shattuck campus, so that workers feel safe getting to their offices, leaving late and taking public transit, comfortable frequenting local businesses and spending money. Massachusetts needs Shattuck to be a community resource that provides housing, rehabilitation, and dignity to all if it wants Cambridge and Boston to continue to be desirable places to live and work.

On the topic of rehabilitation spaces, I've seen first hand what they can do to get communities back on their feet. In 2018, I went to grad school in Lisbon, Portugal. Because I'd come from living so close to Mass and Cass, I was very curious about how Portugal had turned around its heroin

epidemic. Changing the law was significant, but in speaking with friends whose families had been impacted, it was the access to treatment facilities and programs that helped turned individual lives, families, and subsequently the city around. The neighborhood of Lisbon that remains most affected, Casal Ventoso, I can personally assure you is more comfortable to walk through than Mass & Cass, Central Square, Downtown Crossing, the Common near Park Street, or Harvard Square. With Shattuck, we can restore dignity and safety for members of our community.

We're 7 years into a desperate situation that's only poised to get worse, but it doesn't have to. Please do all that you can to support the Vision Plan submitted by DCAMM and the work of the Community Advisory Board and the recommendations of the State Department of Health and Human Services.

I have lived at Forest Hills since 1991. Before that I lived near the Stoneybrook MBTA station in JP.

Maybe more than anyone in Boston(!) I've used the area at the existing Shattuck site over the past 30 years. And I want to say that I strongly support the proposal to redevelop the existing Shattuck site as permanently affordable supportive housing for ex-homeless people.

My use of that area has included:

- I had two kids who attended the Shattuck Child Care Center (8 years of visiting it M-F)
- I coached the in Regan Youth League for 18 years and we used the Eliot Dale Field (the field abutting the hospital) in hundreds of youth baseball games.
- I had many bbq picnics (many with the families I coached in the Regan League) at the bbqs and picnic sites at the part of Franklin Park across the road from the Shattuck.
- With my friends, I ran the annual 5-mile Doyles Race through the Shattuck area and Franklin Park for over 15 years.
- With dozens of friends and teammates, for nearly 30 years I played in the JP Softball League, which held its games at Eliot Dale Field and nearby Playstead (across from the rear entrance to the zoo).
- My wife and dog and I have taken dozens of walks in the Franklin Park woods alongside the Shattuck hospital.

In no time over the past 30 years has anyone ever said, 'hey wouldn't it be great to have some more nature and trees on that hill, where you have a nice view on the other side of the 203 highway?

The Shattuck Hospital, its services, its Child Care Center, has always been an important part of the fabric of that part of Franklin Park. It provided much needed services. When it closed down, many of us jumped at the possibility of converting the site into housing which our community desperately needs – affordable and with support services for people with addictions and other health issues.

Boston's real estate prices make this affordable housing proposal one of race equity. At median income in Boston, Latin American families would have to nearly triple up to afford a 2-br unit. Black households are not far behind. Getting permanently affordable housing for those with substance abuse and other health issues is a critical need especially in communities unable to afford Boston's sky-high rents. The State says over 3,300 supportive housing units are needed in Eastern Mass alone, and I suspect even that figure is low.

I deal with mental health challenges in my own family and know the value of supportive residential housing. Such housing is make or break for many people with addictions and mental health illnesses. It allows them to be able to succeed in a job, engage in healthy relationships, and get back together with families.

There is vast park space where the Shattuck is. Across the street is Forest Hills Cemetery. On the other side of Forest Hills is the Arboretum. At its end is JP Pond. We do NOT need to stop such an important affordable housing project in order to open up much needed green space here. It's a ruse to make this a fight for nature and parks.

The Emerald Necklace Conservancy and friends are promoting a false alternative, to move the project to the Arborway Yard, and return the Shattuck site to the park. The yard is too small and there's no guarantee the MBTA would give it up. For over 12 years our community has tried to develop that parcel to no avail. It is a red herring for the Emerald Necklace to say this project should be developed there. They know it and we know it.

The local Franklin Park Coalition initially advocated for the land to be returned to the park, but then they participated in the planning process and ultimately supported the current plan.

I am on the Boards of three Jamaica Plain groups - Southern JP Health Center, First Baptist Church JP and the Centre for Faith, Art and Justice. We all strongly support the proposed supportive and affordable housing project at the Shattuck site. Every day that the development of this project is delayed, more people will die of addiction. Attempts to delay it are sinful and attacks on health equity in our community.

This project took years to negotiate with the community and other stakeholders, and it is desperately needed.

Since moving to the Egleston Sq. area in 1970 to work on integration, against redlining, and stopping the extension of I-95, my I have been active in Franklin Park. I ran nearly every day for an hour or more, walked, gone sledding, made hundreds of friends from Dorchester, Grove Hall, Roxbury, Rislindale, Hyde Park, etc., picnicked, and joined in special events and celebrations such as Juneteenth. I have not been able to explore every part of the Park, it so huge. But I have surely explored much of the wilderness. enjoyed crossing paths with groups of people rehabbing at the Shattuck our for a walk around Scarborough Pond, exchanging greetings with other runners and walkers. More recently my wife and I have bicycled or walked our grandson to and from preschool at the Shattuck, often through the wilderness. It was special to meet and talk with many of the rebabbing people outside or homeless guys waiting for the shelter to open; they specially liked the grandson and we regularly brightened up one another's days. Recently there have been birthday parties and yoga lessons at various points in the Park, and many summer picnics over by the tennis courts. It is wonderful to see increasing numbers of people enjoying the Park. But it is so extensive that there is plenty of room for everyone.

During the last couple of years I have participated the planning and consultation sessions about the future of the Shattuck campus area. The public health focus of the future use of the site in particularly attractive. These and the planning was well conceived, widely attenced, with plenty of time for exchange, including small group discussions with fascinating combinations of diverse people around tables. The public had plenty of opportunity for input, and the planners were listening. I fully support the product that emerged from those meetings and that process.

Recently we have heard of outsiders having voiced objections at the last minute. When I looked over the "brief" drawn up by the Emerald Neclace Convervancy people downtown some months ago, I was astounded that they did not seem to have even visited the area and had no sense of all the ins-and-outs of various agencies (state, city, MBTA, etc.) about the whole area, including the old bus and trolley car yards near Forest Hills Station and no sense of the traffic flow on Morton Street and the recent implementation of rearrangement of access (and non-entry) to the Park along Morton St. Their suggestions would have required waving some miracle wands in the interagency negotiations and re-doing much of recent planning and construction. Those of us who use the Park and live in Roxbury, Dorchester, Egleston Sq area, Forest Hills area, do not welcome intervention by people of privilege coming in from outside to block careful deliberative planning. How many of the Emerald Necklace Conservancy people have visited it, or driven along Sever St, Blue Hills Ave, or Morton St.). I

was worried that the former governors were pulled in to oppose the plan. But a neighbor says, no, they supported the public health emphasis in the plan for the future use.

So I urge that the long careful consultative planning process be followed. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Shattuck Campus Redevelopment Proposal. If the 13-acre Shattuck Campus site will be redeveloped for public health purposes, we hope the project will address connections to and along Morton Street to make it safer and more convenient for pedestrians, and reconnect Franklin Park to this side of the neighborhood. We suggest that the housing development plan, if adopted, include an enforceable requirement of wide, accessible walking paths and tree canopy in the spirit of the Olmsted Plan.

One of the high level planning principles identified is to "improve access to neighborhoods with public transit, bike and pedestrian options." This project, in conjunction with the greater Franklin Park Action Plan, has the potential to more deliberately restore public access to the park from the Morton Street side. The state needs to think beyond the borders of the project bounds in order to make this happen.

While Morton Street is a MassDOT road, two of the roads that feed into it with similar cross sections, American Legion Highway and Blue Hill Avenue, are listed on the City of Boston's High Crash Network in the top 3% of streets for motor vehicle crashes. The high speed design of Morton Street impacts all other modes. It feels uncomfortable and is an unpleasant walking and biking environment; there are sections of the street that do not have sidewalks on either side. The bus stop on Morton Street to access the Shattuck site was made accessible in the last few years by removing the center median barrier and adding curb ramps, yet the existing unsignalized crossing of multiple vehicle lanes is still dangerous for people walking. The project site is not far from the Forest Hills MBTA station, yet seems much further since Morton Street is poorly designed at this point for walking.

We hope that there will be a collaborative focus on traffic calming beyond the immediate project footprint incorporated into this redevelopment project and adjacent park effort by DCAMM, MassDOT, and the City of Boston.

We are Jamaica Plain residents of more than 25 years and we value the presence of Franklin Park contiguous to our neighborhood and other Boston neighborhoods. We have enjoyed many walks around the loop paths adjacent to the Shattuck Hospital in Franklin Park.

We write today to express our strong support of the state's Preliminary Project Proposal for redevelopment of the Shattuck campus, which was created by several groups, including the Franklin Park Coalition - whose mission we strongly support, as well.

The proposal would maintain a shelter and crucial behavioral health programs at the current site, while the hospital will be relocated near Boston Medical Center. Further it is proposed to create 75-100 supportive housing units on the redeveloped site -- urgently needed at this time.

Hi Loryn,

This is a public comment on the project proposed at the Shattuck Hospital site on Morton St.

The Shattuck site is located in the Mattapan zone for Boston's large project review process. Yet, based solely on the Shattuck's street address, DCAMM oriented this process to JP and failed to include BIPOC neighbors of Franklin Park from Roxbury, Dorchester and Mattapan, who are the majority of park users and will be most affected by a recovery campus at the Shattuck site.

This is an example of how our institutions must re-think business as usual to avoid racially unjust outcomes and even the appearance of racially biased decision-making.

JP has an obvious NIMBY interest in siting this recovery campus away from JP residences and the Arnold Arboretum, a beloved JP open space. That was apparent during the public hearing from the many comments to the effect that JP has plenty of open space and can afford to sacrifice 13 acres of Franklin Park. True, JP is blessed with Jamaica Pond, the Southwest Corridor Park and the Arboretum. An abundance of open space is not, however, available to the Shattuck's neighbors from Roxbury, Dorchester and Mattapan.

The Commonwealth owns property in Forest Hills at the Arborway Yard and also adjoining the State Lab overlooking the Arnold Arboretum. State agencies control those parcels and yet have not even considered them for the recovery campus, despite repeated requests from the beginning of this process and the advantages of being close to the T, shops, other people and activity. One apparent reason for ignoring those sites would be to avoid the NIMBY reaction that would arise compared to the Shattuck location that impacts few in Jamaica Plain.

Boston has a right to both the full benefit of Franklin Park and robust recovery facilities with supportive housing. There was never a reason to pit those important needs against each other. State officials should do the right thing and (1) reconsider siting this much needed supportive housing and campus to other Commonwealth-owned land that is available and better suited, and (2) restructure the public process to be inclusive of BIPOC neighbors.





My name is Christine and I am a resident of Boston. I am writing today in support of the state's Preliminary Project Proposal for the redevelopment of the Shattuck campus.

I understand that the Shattuck State Hospital will be moving to a new site near Boston Medical in 2024, but the shelter and several behavioral health programs will remain on the current Shattuck campus. In addition, the state wishes to add 75-100 critically needed supportive housing units to the redeveloped site.

I support the current proposal for the Shattuck campus because it will meet a crucial challenge: the dire need for supportive housing and behavioral health services. Despite most of our leaders in this country not recognizing it, housing is an essential human right. Having anybody on the streets is a moral failing. Housing first programs help address this moral failing in a way that recognizes the dignity of every person. It is not nearly as important, but this also saves money, much more money than the costs associated with housing instability. Countless studies have shown this over and over again, and yet we continue to ignore it to our city's own detriment.

Fortunately, Boston has developed strong civic-mindedness around the crucial needs of housing and behavioral health services. When the state conducted a comprehensive planning process in 2019, stakeholders from the surrounding neighborhoods, community groups, greenspace advocates, housing, and health care groups came to consensus on a Vision Plan.

The Vision Plan includes behavioral health services, the shelter, and 75-100 units of supportive housing. The Plan also includes integrating the campus with Franklin Park and

including components that will be accessible to the community, such as a community garden or a child care center. I moved here a year and a half ago, I miss the greenspaces I used to have access to in my old state most of all and I know first hand what a benefit these types of community spaces have for people. I want this for my new home.

Importantly, while the Franklin Park Coalition initially advocated for the land to be returned to the park, they participated in the planning process and ultimately supported the Vision Plan.

Recently, the Emerald Necklace Conservancy has suggested that when the hospital moves, the supportive housing and remaining services should be moved to the Arborway Yard. This suggestion is neither practical nor morally responsible. In 1999, the MBTA signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the City of Boston, which stipulates that the T transfer 8 acres of Arborway Yard to the City, to be used for affordable housing and other community needs. This land is already committed to the community. We have the vision and the need, do not throw that away for whatever red herring this is.

Those in favor of "returning the land to the park" seek to fulfill Frederick Law Olmsted's 1878 vision of a complete Emerald Necklace. I urge the Commonwealth instead to fulfill the community's 2021 vision of a public health campus that integrates desperately needed housing and services with green space available to all.
