- 1. Non-Party is a party and should receive the same accommodation as the other parties.
- Pursuant to the order on Robert Goldstein & others v. Secretary of the Commonwealth, SJC-12931. It asks for all in similar situation. Therefore, non-party should be allowed the same accommodation.

Candidate Nomination Papers

The Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court <u>has ruled</u> that, due to the difficulty of obtaining signatures on nomination papers during the current pandemic, the following accommodations shall be made for all candidates, **except for non-party candidates** for federal offices:

- The number of required signatures for ballot access will be cut in half;
- The deadlines for filing nomination papers with local registrars and with the Secretary of the Commonwealth's Elections Division will be extended by one week for candidates
- running for district and county offices;
- An "electronic signature" similar to the voter's hand-written signature will be accepted on printed nomination papers.

Therefore, Janine Marie Balistreri asks this court to include non-party in the order issued regarding the candidate nomination papers.
