2	MR. NEFF: Howard Neff and it's 7:30
3	a.m.
4	THE COURT: Okay. Everybody can be
5	seated. Thank you. Good morning, everyone.
6	This is a hearing conducted in connection with
7	the Commission on Judicial Conduct's Complaint
8	2019-22 concerning Judge Shelley Richmond Joseph.
9	My name is Dennis McInerney and I have
10	been appointed as the hearing officer in this
11	matter. I would ask that the attorneys who are
12	representing the parties in this case to please
13	identify themselves and the parties that they're
14	representing for the record.
15	MS. FABRICANT: Good morning. I am
16	Judith Fabricant, Special Counsel for the
17	Commission on Judicial Conduct.
18	MR. NEFF: And good morning. Howard
19	Neff for the Commission on Judicial Conduct.
20	MR. HOOPES: Good morning, Your Honor.
21	Tom Hoopes for Judge Shelley Joseph.
22	MS. MULVEY: Good morning. Elizabeth
23	Mulvey for Judge Joseph.
24	MR. KEATING: Good morning, Your Honor.

Michael Keating for Judge Joseph.

THE COURT: Thank You. I would like to note at the outset that as the parties are aware, on June 3rd I issued an order regarding media protocol and coverage. If there's anyone here from the media who has not received a copy of that order, it is also available on the CJC's website on the page that has the May 13th press release about this matter.

The hearing will begin with a view that will be conducted here at the Newton District Courthouse. After the view is completed, parties will go through with me to the Suffolk County Courthouse at 3 Pemberton Square in Boston, Courtroom 1309, to continue the hearing.

With that, unless there are any other matters the parties would like to raise at this time, I will turn it over to the special counsel first and then Judge Joseph's counsel to get a brief opening statements regarding the view.

When the hearing resumes at the Suffolk County Courthouse, the parties will have the opportunity to have their full opening statements and to present their evidence.

Special Counsel Fabricant, I will turn it over to you now.

1 MS. FABRICANT: Thank you, Mr.

McInerney. Is that working properly?

THE COURT: Yes.

MS. FABRICANT: All right. Good morning.

The event that gives rise to this case was an arraignment proceeding in this courtroom while an ICE officer waited in the main lobby that we just came through.

After the judge ordered the defendant released from state custody, the court officer escorted the defendant, his lawyer, and the interpreter downstairs through that door into the dock and downstairs through the second secured door down the stairway to the lockup area and released the defendant out the sallyport door to the rear of the building, enabling him to avoid the Immigration and Customs Enforcement officer who was waiting out in the main lobby.

The essential question that you will be called upon to decide is what role the judge had in that result.

We're going to tour the entire building so as to put each location in context. And as we do, I will ask you to note certain locations,

dimensions, and orientations in relation to each other. And I'm sure counsel will have other things they'll want to bring to your attention.

After we take note of various aspects of this courtroom, we will go into the dock and follow the path that the defendant and those with him took. Through the secure door, through the second secure door, down a flight of stairs into the lockup. And from there we will see the secure door that leads out to the sallyport in the back of the building.

We will look out to see the fenced area outside the door and the parking lot beyond that. And we will hear evidence regarding how the sallyport is used to transfer persons in custody into and out of the courthouse.

We will continue through the secure hallway on the lower level, noting two other secure doors that judges and staff use to access the parking lot.

We will reach a secure door that opens to a public area where we will see the probation counter. From there, we will proceed up the public stairway, noting the door from the stairway to the main lobby. We will continue up

the public stairway to the second floor where we will see the second session courtroom with an adjacent judge's lobby, a jury pool room, and a jury deliberation room. And you will hear evidence that the second session courtroom is used for the jury session one day a week and for certain other proceedings more sporadically, and that when the first justice is presiding in the first session in this courtroom and another judge is also present, the visiting judge sits in the second session.

Once we have toured the second floor, we will go back down the public stairway to the main lobby to view the main lobby, the equipment and furnishings there, and the various locations off of it.

We will then go back out the front door and down the front steps. And from there we will walk around the building going what I think is to the right, although I may be disoriented, so as to see the lower-level areas, the doors, and the parking lot from the outside as well as the police station next door and the surrounding streets.

As we do that, we will see something

that was not there at the relevant time, which is a new fence with gates that one has to go through to get to the parking lot from each side so that there is now a fence perimeter around the parking lot that was not there at the relevant time.

And at this point I am ready to direct your attention to various things in this courtroom unless counsel wants to first make some remarks.

MR. HOOPES: Why don't we do that order. Thank you.

Good morning, Mr. Hearing Officer.

Some seven years ago, on April 2nd, 2018 in this courtroom and in this courthouse, David Jellinek Attorney Jellinek, devised a scheme with a court officer, Wesley MacGregor, to have his client escape ICE custody. That happened roughly by agreement in this courthouse and in this courtroom about noon. The escape occurred roughly at 3:00 in the afternoon.

Some eight months later, David Jellinek spoke with federal authorities for the first time and claimed for the first time that Judge Joseph aided and assisted in his effort.

Determining his credibility will be the

core of this hearing and the core of underpinning this and the foundation may be your observations of this courthouse as to whether he's got a scintilla of credibility.

I am going to ask you to focus on four areas if you would. This courtroom, the various factors that both of us will point out, going down to the dock and out to the sallyport. Third is going to be coming up the steps as an alternative way to access the downstairs section. And the fourth will be the perimeter to see both the parking area in the back and the exit in the front. Those four areas will encompass everything I hope that you need to know. Thank you.

MS. FABRICANT: So I am going to ask you while we are here in this courtroom to take note of the size and shape of the courtroom, the proximity of each location to other locations, particularly the judge's bench, the size of the bench, the side of the bench where the sidebar conversation would occur, these stairs where short lawyers might stand for a sidebar conversation, the probation desk where a probation officer might sit, a court officer's

desk where a court officer might sit, the clerk's desk where a clerk might sit and might turn around to speak to the judge if there's a need for that to happen. Recording equipment that you will hear evidence is not the same recording equipment that was on the clerk's bench at the time of the event. The audience section of the courtroom, the size of it, the location of it, the seats that are inside it. The counsel tables, their proximity to each other, to the pathway to get to the sidebar, to the judge's bench. And again, a court officer's desk.

The dock. The location where a person would speak to someone in the dock if necessary to hand papers to a person in the dock, and the door to and from the dock, the locked, secure door to and from the dock that would be opened or closed by a person with a secure device to open and close it to let a person in or out of the dock area.

And I will add two secure doors going to a secure hallway to the judge's lobby, to other secure areas. The one public entry and exit to the courtroom, its proximity to the audience areas, to the -- within the bar areas to

the dock, the exit from the dock that leads this direction. And that's what I want to point out in this courtroom. Counsel?

MR. HOOPES: Thank you. Good morning, Your Honor. I have four areas that I would like you to pay attention to if you don't mind. The first is what I would call the judge's zone, which is where you are now, which would encompass where you are, this bench, where your clerk is right now, the proximity of I to you, the proximity of the clerk to you, the proximity of probation to you and the judge's zone. When I say proximity, I mean actual distance if you can even measure in your own mind from me to you and from this person to this person, this person to the clerk, and this person here.

The second area is what I would call audience zone one, which would be this area back here. The ease of you as a judge to see everybody who is sitting in this particular area, the ease of anybody else in the courtroom to turn around and see everybody who is seated in this area.

Audience area number two would be -- facing you would be to my left would be this

area. The ease of view as the judge, ease of the clerk, the ease of anybody in the courtroom to see who might be seated in this courtroom and actually count the number of benches. One, two, three, four, before you get over there.

The fourth and last area is simply where my fellow counsel is standing, which is right here, where an interpreter might speak or where an interpreter might speak, but the actual distance from this person not just to you but over to the left side of the judge's zone.

That's all I would have. Thank you.

MS. FABRICANT: All right. I would suggest if we're ready that we go into the dock, observe the dock, go through the next secure door (indiscernible).

MR. NEFF: No, (indiscernible).

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And I will give you that. I know you have Eric's, but I'll give that to you.

MR. NEFF: Okay, great. Thank you.

MR. HOOPES: I would ask that we slow walk from the doorway where we came in and let you look left and right. In other words, it's a lot to take in. If we -- this is the door. You just got a demonstration of the badge, buzzer, opening the door to go up. And then after you -- we're going to -- right to your -- to your right is a holding cell. And then if you go straight ahead and then you went to your left, there's another holding cell. And then if you follow straight ahead to the left, you'll see a storage area. This to the left is the court officer area. And then straight to the back before you look out the sallyport area, you can see there's

- still a third holding cell. So they have capacity for three.
 - So why don't I stop there before we go anything with the sallyport area.
 - MS. FABRICANT: Okay. And it may be worth just noting what's right behind you there, which I think -- and we may have testimony indicates this is a place for law enforcement officers to check their firearms.
 - MR. MCINERNEY: Okay. Go ahead.
 - MS. FABRICANT: So what I would like to do is just look out this door, just have the door open so that we can look out it. We'll look at it from the outside later on. So I'm not suggesting we go out right now, but just --
 - MR. HOOPES: If you don't mind, if we could just stick our head out -- yeah, yeah.
 - MS. FABRICANT: If there's enough of us that maybe we need to actually step out.
- MR. HOOPES: Yeah. (indiscernible).

 21 After we step out.
 - And then when we are here, I would ask that you note the gate to get into the sallyport, the distance from the wall to the outer edge of the sallyport on the other side, and the length

- of the sallyport as to what it would look like and feel like if a van was actually parked in here or where two vans or a van and a car could ever fit in.
- MS. FABRICANT: What you heard earlier about new fencing, I believe the evidence will be that this is not the new fencing, that this fencing was here at the time of the event in issue. We will hear evidence about the position that this gate is usually in. I expect the evidence we will hear is that it is usually not locked, that it is usually not locked because -
 MR. MCINERNEY: This is not.

MS. FABRICANT: This gate. Because of the size of the vans that tend to come in here, that it is usually not kept locked.

We will see later on the new fencing. But I am told that this is not it.

MS. FABRICANT: (indiscernible) here for just a moment and let's just notice -- let's just notice from here the stairway that we will take later on. So we'll just notice that this is the stairway that goes off of this public hallway and goes up. Public stairway.

And this door if I am not mistaken is a

- 3 outside, yes.
- 4 MS. FABRICANT: So that this door
- 5 requires a key card --
- 6 COURT OFFICER: To get in.

- MR. HOOPES: So I would ask you to come
- over just where that gentleman where the tie is
- 17 | is the entrance back into the lockup area that we
- 18 just came out of. Without a roadmap or a
- 19 schematic, it's a little hard. But you can see
- 20 them come out and then you can come up this way.
- 21 Or with card you can come back down.
- 22 MR. MCINERNEY: With card meaning
- 23 through back door.
- MR. HOOPES: Yeah. And through this
- 25 door.

1 MR. MCINERNEY: And this door too, you 2 need a card to get in? Authorized personnel. 3 MS. FABRICANT: MR. MCINERNEY: Okay. 4 MS. FABRICANT: 5 Okay. MR. MCINERNEY: Back this way? 6 7 MS. FABRICANT: Oh, before we go 8 further, this elevator, I believe our evidence 9 will be that this is a secure elevator that can be used to take a person in custody up to the 10 11 second floor. So this also requires a keycard. MR. MCINERNEY: 12 A manual key --13 MR. HOOPES: A key, a manual key. 14 MS. FABRICANT: Yes. 15 Got it. MR. MCINERNEY: 16 MR. HOOPES: So we are walking away from the lockup area and taking a right. So you 17 18 can get into this hallway from the lockup area.

MR. HOOPES: This is probation.

MR. MCINERNEY:

MS. FABRICANT: So is the chief court
officer's office -- so this is the non-public
area of probation if I understand correctly.

It's another way to get into the lockup area.

this is where --

Right. Right. And so

- These are -- probation personnel work here, but this is a non-public area. We are now going out to a public area.
 - MR. MCINERNEY: You come out through the lockup (indiscernible) probation and out or through the other area (indiscernible).
 - MR. HOOPES: Yes. Or around the back. So if you hear testimony about walking through probation from the lockup, it's (indiscernible).
 - MS. FABRICANT: So chief court officer's office in the public area. So this area is now open and accessible to the public.
 - MR. HOOPES: Assistant District Attorney's Office right next to the (indiscernible).
 - MS. FABRICANT: And then we are now -now coming to the probation -- public probation
 counter. And that's this. Public probation
 (indiscernible).
- And then public stairway. That
 elevator right there, is that the same secure
 elevator?
- 23 COURT OFFICER: No.
- MS. FABRICANT: That's a different secure elevator.

 - MR. HOOPES: Yes. ADA and the victim's advocate both use it.
- MR. MCINERNEY: Understood.
 - MS. FABRICANT: there's another office for the assistant district attorney over at the police station, and you'll hear that.
 - My suggestion is that we not go out

there not but we go upstairs so that we see the second floor and then (indiscernible).

MR. MCINERNEY: Sure.

MS. FABRICANT: So this we saw an elevator downstairs where a person in custody might be brought upstairs. That's the elevator. And we have here somewhere a jury pool room and a jury deliberation room.

COURT OFFICER: Correct.

MS. FABRICANT: The evidence will be that nothing relevant to this case happened here but that this is where a visiting judge usually sits if the first justice is present sitting downstairs. So that's really why we're seeing it.

MR. MCINERNEY: Understood.

MS. FABRICANT: I would ask you to note that there's no dock in this courtroom. So that a person who is released from custody from this courtroom, a person who is in custody in this courtroom is not in the dock, a person who is released from custody in this courtroom is not in a dock.

MR. MCINERNEY: Understood.

MS. FABRICANT: Okay.

MS. MR. HOOPES: So maybe before you do that, so if you might think of it as a cross, which is you get the courtroom, first when looking out the door. And you have the clerk's office across from the stairs. And then you have the benches right here, which you can note are not visible from the outside. And then we have that public conference room.

MS. FABRICANT: So I think we're ready to go outside. I think we're going to be

1 escorted. Since it's now now, but not then,

But from these stairs here and then down here,
you can look up and -- not to see the courthouse,
but you're going to see areas in front of the
courthouse above the steps where people might

walk over from the courthouse straight to the
Newton PD and then around the back.

MR. HOOPES: (indiscernible) come in here, park the vehicle, the door opens. Prisoner comes in (indiscernible).

MS. FABRICANT: And then you showed us

- 1 another secure door, that one over there.
- COURT OFFICER: That's the one in the
- 3 hallway right in front of the steps.
- MR. HOOPES: Court personnel come in through when they park --
- 6 COURT OFFICER: Sure.
- MR. HOOPES: When court personnel park
 in the back as they used to, which door did they
 come in?
- COURT OFFICER: Back in the day I can't confirm. I wasn't here then, sir. So I don't want to give you any bad information.
- MR. HOOPES: Okay. No problem.
- MS. FABRICANT: But that door over
 there that we can see over here I take it is also
 a secure door (indiscernible).
 - So Newton Police Department. And I think you'll hear evidence that this is the district attorney's (indiscernible).
- MR. HOOPES: And you can escort people in custody (indiscernible).
- MS. FABRICANT: More of this (indiscernible).
- MR. HOOPES: (indiscernible) end it however you want, whenever you want.
