# H.1 - FY 24 Budget Highlights

#### H.1 proposes a \$1.5 billion budget for EEC in FY24, including:

- \$475 million for Commonwealth Cares for Children (C3) Operational grants
- \$798 million to support access to subsidized care for low-income families, including families receiving services or supports from the Department of Children and Families (DCF) or the Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA)
  - An additional \$25 million to expand access to families currently on the waitlist
- \$30 million for the Commonwealth Preschool Partnerships Initiative (CPPI)
  - A \$15 million increase over FY23 funding
- \$20 million for a rate increase for both center-based and family child care providers
  - Annualizes the \$80 million provider rate increases implemented earlier this year
- \$5 million for a comprehensive strategic analysis to build on the work completed through the Special Legislative Early Education and Care Economic Review Commission
- \$5 million for early childhood mental health supports and services for children and early education professionals

### Background and Context: Child Care Financial Assistance

- The Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) is a federal and state partnership program authorized under the Child Care and Development Block Grant Act (CCDBG).
- States use CCDF to provide financial assistance to low-income families to access child care so they can work or attend a job training or educational program.
- States also use CCDF to invest in quality initiatives including building the skills and qualifications of the workforce, supporting programs to achieve higher standards, and providing consumer education to parents.
- EEC's child care financial assistance programs are primarily funded by CCDF.

#### Federal policies establish the basic requirements for eligibility for CCDF-funded child care subsidies

- Children must be under 13 years of age (unless the child has special needs)
- Family's income cannot exceed 85% of state median income, and countable assets cannot exceed \$1M.
- Parents or guardians must be working or attending a job training or educational program, with some options for states to grant exceptions.

EEC must follow these policies in order to use CCDF monies for its child care financial assistance programs, and EEC develops its regulations and policies accordingly.



### **Child Care Financial Assistance System - Constructs**

The child care financial assistance system is governed by federal and state statute and regulations


Purpose		Role of EEC
Federal Statute (CCDBG)	The Child Care Development and Block Grant (CCDBG) establishes the baseline eligibility requirements for subsidized child care	Determine policies & processes, define terms, decide on methods for eligibility and care
Appropriations	State Appropriations dictate how we can use funds earmarked for the subsidy	Ensure spending is in accordance with the law
State Statute (MGL)	Massachusetts General Law (MGL),Chapter 15D, § 2, articulates responsibilities for administering subsidies	Administer federal funds, subsidy waiting list, and rate structures



# **Child Care Financial Assistance Programs**

three child care financial assistance programs accessible to families in the form of vouchers or contracted slots.

Families access these programs through the EEC centralized waitlist or by referral from an authorized state entity.





### Forms of Assistance

#### Voucher

- Subsidy available to families through CCRR that can be used to pay tuition at participating early education programs
- Administered by CCRRs only
- Enrollment managed by CCRRs
- May be used at any program that accepts subsidies

#### **Contracted Slot**

- An entity with a specific number of children to enroll
- Receive additional funds to provide added supports to children who meet certain criteria (homeless, DCF, young parent)
- Direct care contract at a center-based site or FCC system
- Each contracted provider manages their own contracted slots
- May only be used at contracted provider

Contracts and vouchers are paid the same EEC daily Reimbursement rate. Contacted providers receive an additional add on rate for supported services for DCF related and homeless child care services.



### Parent Journey Map: Income Eligible Program



Parent determines need for childcare.



Parent joins waitlist by calling CCRR, Mass 211, or contracted provider. Parent self-identifies any status, like homelessness or special needs, that may allow for prioritization of care.



Parent receives Funding Availability Letter (FAL) from CCRR or contracted provider and list of documents they need to verify eligibility in verification meeting.



After identifying child care placement, parent participates in eligibility verification meeting with CCRR or contracted provider.




If deemed eligible, parent receives voucher or slot at contracted provider and can enroll child. Parent fee is determined (7% of income or less).



Parents must reauthorize eligibility every 12 months and repeat verification process.


# Parent Journey Map: DCF & DTA-Related

Providers Accepting Subsidy




More than 52,000 children receive financial assistance and 57% of all MA providers accept subsidies.

FY22 Financial Assistance Spending By Program



EEC spends about \$13,625 annually per child and about half of the FY22 budget or \$619M was dedicated to financial assistance.



# **Early Childhood Educator Pilot: Overview**

#### Background

In January 2023, EEC launched the pilot through the existing child care financial assistance program to provide priority access to vouchers and contracted slots to income eligible staff working in programs licensed or funded by EEC.

#### Goals

- To support access to affordable child care
- 2 Assist with cost associated with personal child care
- Assist with recruitment and retention workforce challenges

#### Who is Eligible?


(Learn more about eligibility)

- Current or newly employed staff at a licensed or funded early education or school age program and Massachusetts including out of school time program, family child care providers and assistants
- Massachusetts residents
- Household income at or below 85% State Median Income (SMI)
  - 85% of SMI for a family of 3 is \$97,058/year




# **ECE Pilot: Preliminary Data (Staff Access)**

1325 Children reached with the ECE priority so far!



**Enrollment by Age Group** 




77 Early Childhood Educators receiving supports through the pilot who are between 50 and 85% SMI

### Child Care Financial Assistance Reforms: Key Metrics



#### Increase...

- The number of children in families receiving child care financial assistance, including:
  - Low-income families (incomeeligible)
  - Infants and toddlers
  - Families receiving SNAP and/or TAFDC through DTA
  - Supportive Child Care through DCF
  - Families facing housing insecurity/homelessness
- The number of providers participating in the child care financial assistance system

#### Decrease...

- The number of families on the Income Eligible Waitlist
- The timeline between a family's application for assistance to placement in a program.
- The timeline for appeals decisions
