## Early Education & Out of School Time Capital Fund (EEOST)



The Early Education and Out of School Time (EEOST) Capital Fund was created by An Act Financing the Production and Preservation of Housing for Low and Moderate Income Residents, St. 2013, §§2 (Budget Line Item 3000-0400) in November, 2013 and reauthorized by St. 2018. c. 99, §§2 (Budget Line Item 3000-0410), 3, and 4 in May, 2018.

- The EEOST Capital Fund provides grants to tax-exempt non-profit corporations or organizations in which a non-profit corporation has a controlling interest, which shall use such grant funds to develop and/or rehabilitate eligible facilities in which at least 50% of the slots in the facility shall serve low-income families who are eligible for public subsidy.
- The Commonwealth of Massachusetts Executive Office of Administration and Finance has allocated \$10.8M in grant funding in FY24 for the EEOST Capital Fund Program.



## **Administration of EEOST Capital Fund**

- EEC designated Community Economic Development Assistance Corporation (CEDAC) to administer the EEOST Program.
- Children's Investment Fund (CIF), which is affiliated with CEDAC, provides technical assistance and financing to ECE & OST facilities across MA.
- CEDAC/CIF has worked with EEC in development of Grant Review Standards and will continue to administer the grants that EEC awards.
- Since the first round in FY14/FY15, the state has invested \$51M in 110 projects throughout the state.
- This year, EEOST will run two rounds one for small grants (\$200K - \$500K) and one for larger grants (up to \$1M)



## **Eligible Facility**

#### As outlined in the guidelines:

Eligible Facilities include sites that:

- Comply with M.G.L. c. 15D and all regulations and policies adopted thereunder;
- Comply with all other applicable Federal, State and Local statutes, regulations, and ordinances, including but not limited to the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the Massachusetts State Building Code (SBC), as may be amended from time to time;
- If a building, structure, or site is leased, then the leased facilities shall have a lease term that is consistent with the scale of the capital investment, but shall not be less than 15 years from the date of completion
- Serve at least 50% low-income families <u>as of the date of the EEOST</u> <u>application</u>



## **Eligible Applicants**

- License in good standing from EEC
- Serve at least 50% low-income families <u>as of the date of the EEOST</u> <u>application</u>
- A non-profit organized under M.G.L. c. 180; and exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or an organization in which a non-profit corporation has a controlling financial or managerial interest. Only Chapter 180 corporations are eligible to apply. Other 501(c)(3) entities are not eligible if they are not incorporated under Chapter 180.
- None of the individuals at the organization can profit, in any way, from EEOST Capital Fund assistance.



As outlined in the guidelines:

 If a building, structure, or site is leased, then the leased facilities shall have a lease term that is consistent with the scale of the capital investment, but shall not be less than 15 years;

 If a building, structure or site is or will be a municipally owned building that dedicates a single purpose space for licensed early education or out of school time programs, then the lease must be for not less than 15 years



### **Partnerships**

- A for-profit may act in a joint venture with a non-profit developer.
- The non-profit partner is required to have at least a 51% controlling interest in the joint venture.
- Organizational documents of the for-profit must be provided along with a description of non-profit's controlling interest and the non-profit's organizational documents.
- None of the members of the partnership, either for-profit or non-profit, can profit or benefit in any way from EEOST funding.



## **Obligation**

The grant agreement will include language regarding a Land Use Obligation that ensures continued use of the property for Large Group and/or School Age Child Care for specific term:

• For all program sites whether leased or owned: 5 years

# The obligation may be released under the following condition(s):

- Upon completion of the grant term
- If a project were to be foreclosed on by a mortgage holder of a bona fide first mortgage
- With EEC's consent
- In the event of a grant recapture



## **Recapture (Repayment) Provisions**

- if the Event of Default occurs on a date that is on or before the first anniversary of the Completion Deadline, 100% of the Grant proceeds shall be recaptured and repaid to Grantor;
- if the Event of Default occurs on a date that is after the 1<sup>st</sup> anniversary, but on or before the 2<sup>nd</sup> anniversary of the Completion Deadline, 80% of the Grant proceeds shall be recaptured;
- if the Event of Default occurs on or before the 3<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of the Completion Deadline, 60% of the Grant proceeds shall be recaptured;
- if the Event of Default occurs on or before the 4<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Completion Deadline, forty percent 40% of the Grant proceeds shall be recaptured;
- if the Event of Default occurs on or before the 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary, of the Completion Deadline, 20% of the Grant proceeds shall be recaptured;

and/or

 if the Event of Default occurs after the 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Completion Deadline, none of the Grant proceeds shall be subject to recapture and repayment.



#### Compliance will be determined at the sole discretion of EEC.

 If for any reason the Grantee fails to comply with the terms and provisions of the Grant Agreement, CEDAC/CIF or EEC will recapture the grant funds according to the schedule provided in the EEOST Guidelines.



#### FY24 Round – Similarities and Changes

#### Similarities this year include:

- A focus on projects that address health & safety, emergency repairs, and accessibility modifications
- Organizations whose projects are 100% complete at the time of the application cannot apply for EEOST funding for reimbursement

#### Major changes this year include:

- Additional focus area security upgrades
- Organizations that received an EEOST grant in any previous year <u>are eligible</u> to apply for this year's grant. This includes sites that previously received funding.
- Applicants can apply for multiple sites but will still be required to submit an individual application for each site.



## **FY24 Amount of Grant Award**

#### **EEOST Funds are Grants that:**

- Range from \$200,000 and \$500,000 per project
- Can fund the entire cost of a project

If applicants identify funding sources in addition to EEOST grants to pay a portion of the project costs, they must be in place at the time of the application (January 23, 2024).

Organizations whose projects are 100% complete at the time of the application cannot apply for EEOST funding for reimbursement.

If a component of your ongoing project has already been completed, please be sure to attach invoices and details on what has been completed and when.



## **Project Requirements**

- Project Readiness: Ready projects are those that demonstrate they will have the ability to complete a full financial closing and start construction by March 31, 2025
  - Any additional funding needed must be in place at the time of application (January 23)
  - Complex projects (i.e. those involving construction, HVAC replacement) need to have been already working with a real estate development team and be far along in the process in order to be competitive



## **Eligible Grant Uses**

#### **<u>Category One:</u>** Capital Improvements to Outdoor Play Spaces

- Surfacing
- Play Equipment
- Site Engineering, including drainage and other site issues
- Improving Accessibility

# **<u>Category Two:</u>** Improvements to Air Quality Through Investment in Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) equipment and Windows

- HVAC System Improvements or upgrades, including replacement or repair of existing components or installation of a new system.
- Particular items include the addition of air handlers to increase fresh air intake and installation, improvements to increase the Minimum Efficiency Reporting Values (MERV) filtration of existing systems, etc.
- Installation of a Dedicated Outside Air Unit/System
- Windows: repair or replacement to ensure windows are operational

## <u>Category Three:</u> Reconfiguration of indoor spaces including classrooms, gross motor rooms, and bathrooms.

- Conversion of existing space to newly licensed space
- Installation or purchase of sinks (permanently plumbed)
- Replacing surfacing (flooring, countertops) and other hard-to-clean surfaces.
- Creation of new, or improvement to existing restrooms



## **Eligible Grant Uses (continued)**

<u>Category Four:</u> Emergency repairs that impact the health and safety of occupants including roof replacement, upgrading electrical, and life safety systems. IT upgrades will not be considered.

- Roof repair or replacement, or other building envelope improvements
- Upgrades of fire protection system and other life safety systems (alarms, automatic doors, sprinkler installation)
- Upgrades of electrical or other building systems
- Information technology (IT) upgrades or purchases will not be considered, including computers, tablets, software, or other technological upgrades and purchase of IT equipment. Classroom supplies and cleaning materials will also not be eligible for consideration.

## <u>Category Five:</u> Physical environment modifications including accessibility or other improvements to support inclusion of children and adults with special needs

- Mobility ramps
- Automatic Door Openers
- Elevator improvements
- Sensory and/or inclusionary classroom or outdoor play improvements



## **Eligible Grant Uses (continued)**

<u>Category Six:</u> Security enhancements to prevent and respond to potential threats, such as active shooters, including but not limited to the installation of security cameras and access control systems

- Secure exterior doors integrated into a building-wide security system
- Dedicated entry for child care program with greeters
- Visual communication/intercom systems with external visitors
- Key fobs/keypads and other access controls for families and staff entry



## **Grant Timetable and Disbursement**

- EEOST funds will be disbursed after the grantee closes on the grant. The EEOST funds will be disbursed on a reimbursement basis for expenses relating to the project incurred as of January 1, 2023.
- Grantees are fully responsible for legal costs incurred to close on EEOST grant, typically \$5,000 for the EEOST attorney <u>in addition</u> <u>to</u> the expense for the applicant's counsel.
- All projects must complete a full financial closing and start construction by March 31, 2025.
- The EEOST program will cover the expense of a construction manager to monitor construction; this expense should be included in your project budget if applicable



# All projects entailing any kind of construction must assemble an experienced and competent team to ensure the project can be successfully completed.

Depending on the project's complexity, the development team may include an architect, mechanical engineer, project attorney, and/or construction manager, who must be already engaged at the time of the application.

For example, projects that are moving walls, replacing an HVAC system, or doing major site work must have a project team that includes a construction project manager, engineer, architect, etc. to oversee the development, renovation or construction of the project and ensure the project is built to the plans.

## **The Application**

Please review the Procurement Information document posted on COMMBUYS to determine whether your proposed project meets all the criteria.

Please complete the Application Checklist and submit with the Application. If the application is missing any of the attachments at the time it is filed with EEC, the application will be ineligible for EEOST consideration.

EEC shall receive all grant applications by **January 23, 2024 at 11:59PM**. EEC will conduct a preliminary review to determine whether each Eligible Facility has a license in good standing with the Department and is in financial good standing with the Department.

Copies of all eligible applications will then be transmitted by EEC to CEDAC/CIF for review and evaluation.



## The Application (cont'd)

- Grant Application Due Date: January 23, 2024 11:59 PM
  - Answer all questions as completely as possible and ensure that all items on the checklist are submitted with the application, since incomplete applications will not be considered.
  - 2. Review the EEOST Application Checklist.

  - 4. EEC expects to post responses to written questions, and to the questions raised at the Information Sessions, on COMMBUYS or around December 21, 2023.

    - » EEC will send an automated confirmation for all emails that are received. This does not indicate that the application is complete; just that it was received.
  - 6. This year, we are not requiring the mailed submission of the Cover Page. Please sign it, scan it, and email it with the rest of your application on January 23.
  - 7. Applications received after the deadline will not be considered.
  - 8. For those applications that are deemed eligible, CIF will reach out to schedule a virtual meeting to review the specifics of the application.

## Preferences



#### Preference will be given to Eligible Projects that reflect:

- A balanced geographic plan that includes projects in different parts of the state, with emphasis given to the Central Massachusetts Region and Cape Cod and the Islands
- 2. Facilities where at least 80% of the site's enrollment (as of 1/23/24) is for lowincome families receiving public subsidy.
- 3. Programs serving one or more of EEC's Priority Populations (homeless children, families in supportive child care (children with open DCF cases), or young parents)
- 4. Organizations that are a "small agency," as defined by the U.S. Small Business Administration for child and youth services with a total organizational budget of less than \$15.5M.
- 5. Project addresses accessibility for individuals with special needs.
- 6. Location within a Gateway City.

## Preferences



#### Preference will be given to Eligible Projects that reflect:

- Solicitation and/or participation of businesses certified by state Supplier Diversity Office (SDO) and participants in the Supplier Diversity Program (SDP), including construction companies or development team members, as part of the project team.
- 8. Organizations that have not been previously awarded an EEOST grant.
- 9. Applications will also be scored according to the project site's Social Vulnerability Index score.
