# Resource Management Plans (RMPs) (M.G.L. Chapter 21; Section 2F)

The Commissioner of Conservation and Recreation shall submit management plans to the Stewardship Council with respect to all reservations, parks, and forests under the management of the department.



#### **Required Elements**

#### Said management plans shall:1

- Include guidelines for the operation and land stewardship of the aforementioned reservations, parks, and forests;
- Provide for the protection and stewardship of natural and cultural resources; and
- Ensure consistency between recreation, resource protection, and sustainable forest management.

Contents include unique resources, potential uses, Land Stewardship Zoning analysis, and action recommendations.<sup>2</sup>



#### INTRODUCTION

Douglas State Forest (Douglas or the Forest) is located by the Towns of Douglas, Oxford, and Webster at the intersection of Massechusetts, Rhode Island, and Councettout. It is situated approximately 20 miles south of the City of Worcester, 25 miles north of Providence, Rhode Island, and 45 miles northeast of Hartford, Connecticity. The Southern New England Trunkline Trail (SNETT) begins at, and passes through, the Forest

Douglas State Fotest was established in 1934 with the acquisition of approximately 1.245 acres in the Town of Douglas for the purpose of providing "additional acreage for the economic employment of the Civilian Conservation Corps" (DOC 1934). Soon after, the CCC constructed camps, began forest management, and developed recreation facilities, setting the stage for today's park. The CCC was only the latest in a long line of stewards. The area that is now Douglas State Forest is in heart of Nipmuc country and was occupied by the Tribe for millemia.

Douglas State Forest offers two very different types of visitor experiences. Its recreation area draws people to the cleam, clear waters of Wallum Lake to avium, fish, and boat, and to print along its shore. Stiftness hours a time portion of the forest, the recreation area is its most popular attraction. During the beach season, if attracts hundreds of visitors daily. Away from the lake, a different visitor experience swafts. Trails criscross thousands of cares of rock-atrewn uplands, allowing visitors to get away from crowds, explore the forest, and reconnect with nature. These trails are part of a broad, regional network that connects to trail systems in Zhode Island. Connecticut, and New Hampahire. History times throughout the forest; whitors may observe evidence of the past in the recreation area and along the hiking rails.

Traditionally, the portion of the SNETT that passes through the Forest has been mapped as being a part of Douglas State Forest. This is largely attributable to that portion of the SNETT being the first parcel acquired, and initially viewed as an expansion of Douglas. Beginning with this RMP, this portion of the SNETT has been removed from Douglas State Forest and is solely considered part of the SNETT. This change is reflected in EMPs for both Douglas State Forest and the SNETT.

#### FOREST IDENTITY AND SIGNIFICANCE

Douglas Stats Forest is best known for two features: Wallium Lake Recreation Area, and the Forest's vast trails network it is less well known for its role as a Reserve. The Wallium Lake Recreation Area is the document of the feature and is the area most heavily used by wistors. Wallium Lake provides visitors use opportunity to enjoy water-based recreation activities. Owe 60-miles of official trails counsed visitors with the cubrial and natural resources which the Forest itself, as well as to a broader trail network that extends throughout southern New England. All future activities and improvements should be consistent with Douglas' identity as a regionally important day-use area, as a destination for trail users, as a regional hub for long-distance trails, and its designation as a Reserve.


Douglas State Forest is significant for the following reasons:

- Wallum Lake Recreation Area provides swimming locating, and fishing opportunities to many visitors in audition New England. To many, this day-use area is the public face of the Forest.
- Douglas is contiguous with Buck Hill Wildlife Management Area to the south (Rhode Island) and Mine Brook Wildlife Management Area to the north, creating a block of over 9,100 acres of contiguous protected open space.
- The Forest's large size and interior trails network provide abundant opportunities for hiking, horseback riding, and mountain biling.
- Douglas is located at the crossroads of four southern New England long-distance trails. This concentration of long-distance trails coming together in one location is unique in the DCR system.
- The Forest contains surprisingly intact examples of both pwe- and post-Contact stone features
