**1. Recommendation Potluck – In-person Gallery Review Exercise**

After the previous commission meeting, commission members were asked to submit potential recommendations. Fifty-four of these recommendations were presented to commission members, who were then polled on their priorities.

**2. Vehicle Classification Presentation**

Niren Sirohi, Chief Operating Officer of the RMV, presented the proposed micromobility vehicle classification framework to the commission. He presented a four-tier system for legally classifying motorized and non-motorized micromobility devices based on speed, the proposed operational requirements, travel allowances, and device equipment requirements. The commission members discussed speed limits, mopeds, helmet requirements, and appropriate use of bicycle lanes and sidewalks.

Niren also presented the concept of a MicroID decal to identify certain tiers of devices. The commission discussed who should sit on a task force to begin a MicroID pilot. They noted that they thought MicroIDs might already be in use in other countries. They also discussed if device MicroID registration should be a one-time event or require annual renewal, and whether the MicroID should be tied to personal identities.

**3. Recommendation Polling Results Reflection**

Nineteen recommendations received generally positive consensus from the exercise at the beginning of the meeting and were presented to the commission for further discussion. Commission members spoke about each recommendation and discussed potential clarifications and further refinements to each recommendation that would bring the group into further agreement. Discussion topics included law enforcement, vulnerable users, automated enforcement, street improvements, geofencing, traffic, and the food delivery industry.

**4. Next Steps and Assignments**

Kris Carter presented the remaining timeline and asked the commission members to review the priority recommendations in preparation for the November 6<sup>th</sup> commission meeting. The meeting was adjourned by Carter at 12:06pm.
