

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
- Up to \$17,995,628 available

Differences from Annual NOFO



- CoC Plan for Serving Individuals and Families with Severe Service Needs
- PWLE (Persons/Partners With Lived Experience of Homelessness) Working Group who will sign off on the CoC Plan
- Significant demonstration of coordination, engagement with, and leveraging of healthcare resources, housing resources, and landlord recruitment

CoC Plan for Serving Individuals and Families Experiencing Homelessness with Severe Service Needs

- This is a 15-page written response attached to the submission
- It accounts for **70 of the 100** points available in the
 Consolidated Application
- To accurately reflect the CoC, it must include qualitative data from community partners as well as quantitative data from reports, HMIS, and the RDC

CoC Plan Content

Leveraging Housing Resources

Demonstrate efforts to increase the number of permanent housing units including the extent to which the amount of assistance provided will be supplemented with other non-CoC and non-ESG funded housing resources

PHA commitment to work with the CoC to pair vouchers with CoC-funded supportive services and develop a prioritization plan

CoC Strategy and experience over the past three years



CoC Plan Content

Leveraging Healthcare Resources

Demonstrate through written commitments that permanent housing projects developed will utilize health care resources to help individuals and families experiencing homelessness including those with HIV/AIDS



CoC Plan Content



- Updating the CoC's Strategy to Identify, Shelter, and House Individuals Experiencing Unsheltered Homelessness <u>with Data and Performance</u>
- Identify and Prioritize Households Experiencing or with Histories of Unsheltered Homelessness – We must demonstrate a comprehensive method to identify and provide street outreach services
- Involving Individuals with Lived Experience of Homelessness in Decision Making – This includes development of the PWLE Working Group, inclusion in other committees, and the Advisory Group
- Supporting Underserved Communities and Supporting Equitable Community Development

Eligible Project Types

Permanent Housing (both PSH and RRH) Joint TH and PH-RRH Supportive Service Only • Coordinated Entry

- Street Outreach
- Standalone

HMIS

• CoC Planning (this is ranked)



Eligibility

• Activities - In general, all the activities eligible in the CoC Program will be eligible for projects awarded under this competition and to carry them out except acquisition, new construction, and rehabilitation.

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Participants - Program participants must meet the
criteria of paragraph (1) of the definition of
homelessness, (literally homeless) except that persons
coming from TH must have originally come from places
not meant for human habitation, emergency shelters,
safe havens, or institutions where they resided for 90
days or less and originally came from places not meant
for human habitation, safe havens, or emergency
shelters; OR meet the criteria of paragraph (4) of the
definition of homelessness (fleeing or attempting to
flee DV)

Other Project Requirements

- All projects must follow a Housing First Approach.
- All projects must pass eligibility and quality thresholds.
- All projects must demonstrate consistency with the CoC Plan for Serving Individuals and Families Experiencing Homelessness and Severe Service Needs.
