


The success of the SADCT program stems from the volunteer efforts of over 200 anglers. This program provides a means for interested

and dedicated anglers to help study the marine species they enjoy. All participating anglers receive a ball cap and an annual study report that includes an individualized summary—including length and age information—on the fish they sampled.

## About SADCT



The Sportfish Angler Data Collection Team (SADCT) program is a group of volunteer anglers collecting biological samples of selected recreational fish species in Massachusetts marine waters. SADCT is part of an


Atlantic coast-wide effort to manage and conserve recreationally targeted species. Information gathered through SADCT is used by the Division of Marine Fisheries and provided to the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) to support conservation and sustainability efforts.

Anglers joining SADCT follow simple protocols for gathering data on striped bass, fluke (summer flounder), scup, and black sea bass. Participants measure fish length, collect scale samples from each fish caught, and note whether it is kept or released. Scales are used to determine the age of the fish by counting growth rings, much like the aging technique for trees.




SADCT originally began in 2002 with anglers taking data from their striped bass catches. In 2013, three more species were added to the program: scup, black sea bass, and fluke.

Below are examples of how to measure each catch, as well as where to remove scales from.




## The Data

57% of legal sized striped bass (28 inches or greater) were kept while 43% were released in 2012 by SADCT anglers
