

 Somerset, Dighton, and Taunton
- Proposed 22-mile continuous network of onand off-road trails to intersect with the South Coast Bikeway
- Opportunities to access Taunton River, parks, and open spaces, in addition to community connections




Project Goals

Concept Design Schedule










Footpaths exist along most of the railroad right-ofway. Width varies along corridor.

















Steel superstructure is in good condition and can be reused for a bridge over the Segreganset River.



Site Analysis – Views









Key Design Objectives

- Create accessible connections and paths that are inviting to people of all ages, abilities, and interests
- Maximize opportunities for users to view and be close to the Taunton and Segreganset Rivers
- Use nature-based solutions, including green stormwater infrastructure and restoration techniques, to protect and enhance existing resources
- Highlight cultural resources and provide educational signage
- Address the concerns of abutters while minimizing encroachment

Trail Materials







Pros:

- ADA accessible
- Resilient to flooding, rain events
- Reduced long-term maintenance

Cons:

- Not pervious (requires additional stormwater management)
- Urban appearance

Pros:

- Natural looking
- Pervious (can infiltrate runoff)
- Soft on joints

Cons:


- Soil binder and/or compaction needed to provide accessibility
- Vegetation encroachment at edges
- More frequent maintenance

Pros:

- Consistent with DCR shared use paths
- Change in material to slow traffic
- Easier to manage rain/snow/debris

Cons:

- 'Lip' transitions at bridge edges
- Build up of organic material at deck edge can create rot/
- Slippery surface when wet





Taunton River Trail Concept Map
























Taunton River Trail Area 3: Concept













