




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
Property Overview

The Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) manages one of the largest Historic Curatorship programs in the country. DCR is currently soliciting expressions of interest for the Union St. Houses' reuse.

The Union St. Houses are three Colonial Revival-style buildings located on a private road at the edge of Wompatuck State Park in Hingham.

Built in the early 1900s, the houses were used as naval personnel residences when the area was bought by the US Navy in 1941 as an annex to the Hingham Naval Ammunitions Depot.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts later took possession of the Annex in 1966 and converted it into current day Wompatuck State Park. The park's naval history can be observed throughout in its bunkers and railways.

201 Union St.

201 Union St. is the oldest of the three buildings. The house is a two-story 4 bd/2 ba built in 1920 and used as an officer's quarters during World War II. The building has been vacant for a decade and features hardwood floors throughout.



203 Union St. is the middle of the three houses and was built in 1931 and later used as naval personnel housing. The 3 bd/2 ba building has been vacant since 2020 and is in good condition.



Historic Curatorship Program Overview



Bradley Palmer Mansion Restored

Within the Commonwealth's 450,000 acres of State and Urban Parks are a number of unused, historically significant buildings. The Historic Curatorship Program, established in 1994, is a national model that has helped DCR preserve many of its underutilized but historically significant properties by partnering with outside parties who exchange rehabilitation, management and maintenance services for credit towards a long-term lease. As a result, DCR secures the long-term preservation of historic sites threatened by vandalism and the elements, and Curators live or work in a uniquely pastoral setting.

Curatorship properties are preserved through a wide range of reuses — residential, non-profit, for profit, hospitality and museums. Curators are selected through an open and competitive process and proposed reuses must be compatible with the historic and natural character of the park or forest. Proposals are evaluated according to the experience of the applicant, the quality of the reuse plan, proof of sufficient resources to undertake the project, and level of public benefit beyond providing biannual public access. Average lease terms range from 20 to 30 <u>years</u> .
