



RMP Mandate




M.G.L. c. 21 § 2F

"The Commissioner of Conservation and Recreation shall submit management plans to the Stewardship Council with respect to all reservations, parks, and forests under the management of the department..."

Required Elements

Said management plans shall:

- Include guidelines for operation and land stewardship;
- Provide for the protection and stewardship of natural and cultural resources; and
- Ensure consistency among recreation, resource protection, and sustainable forest management.




304 CMR 7.02 (Management Plans & Massachusetts Wildlands):


Management planning process shall produce:

- Action Recommendations


Central Highlands District



Wachusett Complex




Wachusett Complex RMPs - Project Timeline




- Public meeting (for entire Central Highlands District) - June 2022

Dunn State Park: Key Findings



- Emphasis on universally accessible recreation.
- Water quality issues; 6 exceedances (2018–2021).
- High visitation levels resulting in compacted soils in picnic areas, and degradation of trails and infrastructure.
- Entire Park is within an Environmental Justice Tract opportunity exists to increase environmental justice and equity.
- ▶ 13 Priority Recommendations, including:
 - Prioritize and implement recommendations from 2016 accessibility assessment.
 - Develop a Master Plan with emphasis on maximizing accessible recreation facilities and activities such that Dunn may serve as a model of universal access throughout the DCR system.

Hubbardston State Forest: Key Findings




- Trails impacted by high visitor usage, unauthorized OHV use, and insufficient maintenance resources.
- ▶ 14 Priority Recommendations, including:
 - Provide basic visitor amenities (web page, small parking area, Identification Sign, welcome wayside, kiosk, trail map, and interpretive panel).
 - Multiple recommendations associated with trails and aquatic resources.
 - Conduct an archaeological reconnaissance survey for the Forest in cooperation with Tribal, municipal, and regional partners.


Johnny Appleseed State Park: Key Findings




- Strongly associated with the North Nashua River.
- ▶ 94% of park is within 1.0%-chance flood zone.
- Provides river access and limited recreation.
- Park is largely landlocked, impeding public access.
- ▶ Boundaries not marked; potential encroachment.
- Invasive plants abundant and diverse.
- Unauthorized OHV and snowmobile use.
- 12 Priority Recommendations, including:
 - Pursue establishing trailheads;
 - Assess potential for connecting existing trails; and
 - Resolve potential encroachments;

Lancaster State Forest: Key Findings



- Small property, near the North Nashua River, accessible only through municipal land (Cook Conservation Area) or over private land.
- ▶ 10 Priority Recommendations, including:
 - Establish agreements to allow DCR and public access to the two Forest tracts.
 - Continue monitoring proposed development of adjacent parcels and their potential impacts to the Forest
 - Design and implement forest management project to address dying red pine plantation.
 - Work with Town to add DCR information, including Welcome Wayside, at Town's trailhead.


Leominster State Forest: Key Findings



- Multiple unauthorized trails (4 miles).
- Water quality issues; 11 exceedances (2018–2021).
- 15 Priority Recommendations, including:
 - Work with Indigenous partners to inventory, document, conserve, and interpret Indigenous resources and Indigenous history within the Forest.
 - Resolve trail-related threats and opportunities identified in this RMP, in accordance with Trails Guidelines and Best Practices.
 - Develop a site plan to address issues within the Day Use Area, including the beach, accessibility, infrastructure improvements, and modifying the parking area to comply with well-head protection.

Wachusett Mountain State Reservation: Key Findings



- Reservation provides diverse and easily accessed four-season alpine recreation opportunities to visitors from across New England and beyond.
- Complicated regulatory history associated with 1990s ski area expansion continues to influence park operations.
- 8 invasive plant species that pose a threat to 6 MESA-listed plants.
- 5 MESA-listed plants whose habitat is intersected by trails and may be sensitive to trampling and trail maintenance work.
- Mount Wachusett has been recognized as a Traditional Cultural Place of significance to local Indigenous tribes, particularly the Hassanamisco Nipmuc Band.

Wachusett Mountain State Reservation: Key Findings (continued)



- Diverse user types, all-season recreation activities, and geographic dispersion of visitors presents challenges to DCR staff for day-to-day operations, such as tracking visitation, managing visitor safety, and identifying and mitigating user impacts on natural and cultural resources.
- 41 Priority Management Recommendations, including:
 - Consult with MEPA office regarding the status of the Certificate of Special Review Procedure (EOEA #11974)
 - ➤ Conduct review of long-term mitigation efforts required under DEM Section 61 findings for the ski area improvements.
 - In accordance with DCR Old Growth Policy, update Site-Specific Management Plan for Wachusett's Old Growth Forest.


Wachusett Mountain State Reservation: Key Findings (conclusion)




- ► Following appropriate review and permitting, implement the Invasive Plant Management Plan.
- Work with NHESP to develop and implement Habitat Management Plans for Reservation areas.
- Prepare a cultural resources management plan.
- Nipmuc community stakeholders to build a reciprocal relationship that provides opportunities for the tribe to connect with traditional cultural resources, places, and practices, while also supporting DCR's mission through culturally responsive stewardship.
- Conductive a statewide Agency review of passive roller sports.

Westminster State Forest: Key Findings



- Limited information available to the public about Westminster State Forest.
- Two Priority Natural Communities (Northern Atlantic White Cedar Swamp and Red Spruce Swamp) present in Forest.
- 11 Priority Management Recommendations, including:
 - Establish web page, Forest gateway, and sign plan for Forest.
 - Identify opportunities to harden or reroute trails in areas where trail use has resulted in erosion.
