

**As of July 2023,** all eligible Massachusetts residents can apply for a standard driver's license, regardless of immigration status, under the Work and Family Mobility Act.

### What You Need To Know To Get A Driver's License



#### 1. Get Informed

Learn about your requirements at Mass.Gov/WFMA. Only use websites under the Mass.Gov domain.



# 5. Visit the Service Center, Take Your Exam, and Get Your Learner's Permit

Go to the RMV Service Center on the day of your appointment. Bring all required documents and be ready to take your learner's permit exam.



#### 2. Apply for a Learner's Permit

Beginning July 1, you can pre-register to make an appointment and complete an application online at Mass.Gov/MyRMV. You will be notified via text and email when an appointment to visit a Service Center is available. Making an appointment is required. Paying fees online is recommended - the learner's permit fee is \$30, road test fee is \$35, and license fee is \$50. Do not pay anyone else for RMV services.



#### 6. Practice Driving

Practice driving with a licensed driver. Study for the road test exam at Mass.Gov/RoadTest.



#### 7. Schedule Your Road Test

Appointments can be made at Mass.Gov/MyRMV after you receive your learner's permit. You will need to bring a licensed driver and a vehicle. Review the requirements at Mass.Gov/RoadTest.



### 3. Study for the Learner's Permit Exam

Study for the learner's permit exam and take a practice exam at Mass.Gov/RMV.



## 8. Take Your Road Test and Get Your Driver's License

Once you pass the road test, you will receive a temporary license. Your official driver's license will arrive to your mailing address on file with the RMV within 14 days.



#### 4. Prepare Your Documents

Visit Mass.Gov/WFMA to review the requirements. If any document is not in English, you must bring a certified translation.

#### **Beware of Scams!**

Beware of fraudulent websites and scams and do not pay anyone else, except the RMV, for service.
