## Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

## **Youth Program**

The Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development's MassHire Department of Career Services provides oversight of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Youth Program. WIOA supersedes the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 and amends the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act, the Wagner-Peyser Act, and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. WIOA increases access to opportunities for employment, education, training, and support services to individuals, particularly those with barriers to succeed in the labor force.

The WIOA Youth Program is a federally funded. The MassHire Department of Career Services allocates WIOA Title I Youth funds to Massachusetts' 16 workforce areas based on procedures defined by the Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act. Workforce Boards in each of the 16 workforce areas procure services designed to help in school and out-of-school youth complete their secondary education, enter into post-secondary education/training, or enter into employment. Eligible youth receive comprehensive assessments, career planning, support services, alternative education, work-based learning experiences, and occupational skills training. Youth access these services through MassHire Career Centers or WIOA Youth Service Providers.
