



This annual report provides information on youth (13 - 17 years of age) admitted to BSAS funded and/or licensed services. In FY 2017, there were 1,424 adolescent admissions. To ensure proper interpretation of this data, please read the footnotes and refer to the appendix at the end of this report.

Characteristics of Admissions

- The average age at admission for youth was 16.2 years.

- The mean age of first alcohol use was 13.4 years

- The mean age of first marijuana use was 13.0 years

- 37.9% of these adolescents received services from the Department of Chidlren and Families (DCF); 7% received services from the Department of Youth Services (DYS).

- 15.0% of adolescents reported having part-time or full-time jobs at the time of enrollment.

Appendix

General Notes

- To protect client confidentiality, the data in cells containing 5 or fewer counts are suppressed.
- Data includes primary clients only; a primary client is defined as a person seeking treatment for their personal substance use problem(s).
- Missing/unknown/not applicable responses are excluded from the data. Therefore, the number of admissions for each category/table may vary from the total number of admissions.
- In 2014, a new system of reporting was adopted by some Methadone treatment providers. Due to this system change, the reported enrollment numbers for FY 2014 may be higher than the actual number of enrollments. This also influences any assessment data captured in the trend tables starting from 2014 onward.
- Homelessness at enrollment is determined based on the client's housing disposition at the time of enrollment.
- Due to data updates and changes to definitions, data included in this fact sheet should not be compared to similar data published in prior years.
- Data and definitions used were as of July 6, 2018.
