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Technical Assistance Update for December 2005

**GAO publishes report about Youth Opportunity Grants.** The Youth Opportunity Grant program (YO) sought to improve education and employment opportunities for at-risk youth by targeting resources in high poverty areas and incorporating strategies that experts have identified as effective for serving this population. The Department of Labor awarded 36 grants in 2000, and the program continued for 5 years. The 2005 Skills Gap Report is based on responses from more than 800 manufacturers of all sizes nationwide and is the first new comprehensive survey about the American manufacturing workforce in five years.
