

Jessie (Little Doe) Baird, Mashpee

If there was one word to describe **Little Doe**, it would be 'tenacious.' After all, bringing back a language with no living speakers is no easy feat. In fact, most would consider it impossible. But with tenacity as her guide, Little Doe has, since 1993 — the year in which the Wôpanâak Language Reclamation Project (WLRP) was founded — remained undaunted in ensuring that Wôpanâak, the Wampanoag Language, could once again become the principal means of expression within her tribal community. Today, what she imagined over two decades ago has blossomed into something truly extraordinary, supported not only by a 9-person staff at WLRP but by the entire Wampanoag community.

Barbara is the epitome of strength. She is an Easton school psychologist, and has spent her career helping students. She is a loving wife and mother of two daughters. Barbara also has terminal stage IV metastatic breast cancer. Despite her diagnosis, she has an insatiable drive to help others. Barbara writes the blog "The Cancer Chronicles," and shares her struggles with readers. Her observations, dry wit, and keen understanding of the human spirit have reached and impacted people all over the world. Her blog shines a light on the need for research and funding for metastatic breast cancer. As a result of her efforts, significant funds have been raised for metavivor.org, an organization devoted to funding research for stage IV metastatic breast cancer. Her honesty, perseverance, and the love and appreciation she feels for her family, friends, and the beauty of nature is inspirational.

Marie is the creator of Driven Women TV a vehicle that interviews business women and people of interest. She also serves as an appointed Commissioner with the Commission on the Status of Women on Cape Cod and the Islands, A Board Member for the Cape Cod YMCA, and a member of the YMCA's Youth Achievers Advisory Board. Marie is also the former Chair of the Mashpee Housing Authority

and Mashpee Human Services, and a former member of the Falmouth Affordable Housing Task Force.

Shavelle is the volunteer creative genius of the Varsity Cheerleading Squad at Pittsfield High School. She inspires those she coaches through her high expectations of her students both as cheerleaders and in their academics. As a result, they learn hard work, professionalism, teamwork and determination. Shavelle doesn't allow those she coaches to give up, but instead pushes them to do their best in all aspects of their lives. Her relationship with those she coaches goes far beyond the time she spends with them coaching. Shavelle keeps in contact with the students as they maneuver through college, encouraging them to excel academically and offering a listening ear. She has represented the DBAR MRC at National Leadership conferences, is a lifelong volunteer with Massachusetts Special Olympics, and is active in her church community.

In addition to her volunteer work, Susan has worked intimately with the Marshfield Emergency Management Agency for the past 5 years.

Alison has been a well-respected math teacher, as well as a selfless and dedicated volunteer. She led a committee to raise \$40k for a 9/11 First Responders Memorial, as well as efforts to raise \$185k to improve the Greene's Field playground. She is president of the Needham Historical Society, director of the Needham Library Foundation, member of the Newton-Needham Chamber of Commerce Scholarship Committee, a member of Needham Town Meeting for Precinct F, Fundraiser for the Friends of the Elderly, volunteer for the Needham Community Council, and Co-President of Parent Talk Inc. Coaching youth basketball and serving on the boards of both the Foxborough Soccer Association and Baseball Association, Lisa has been attributed with the gift of inspiring a lifelong love of sports in so many children in her community. Lisa is also president and treasurer of the Foxborough Discretionary Fund and has served on the Foxborough Council on Aging for three years. Professionally, Lisa has taught at the New England Center for Autism, Foxborough High School, and she presently

Helen grew up on Dunlap Farm in Dracut where she lives today and uses her biological education to help the environment. She continues her mother's legacy of protecting local farms and open space from development. Several farms, as well as open space, in the community have been protected and a recreational complex developed under her leadership.

When families, especially low-income families are meaningfully involved, their children's academic achievement improves. Through the Raising a Reader program and Tasha's leadership, children and families are provided with award-winning books each week that build families book sharing routines. Through Tasha's relentless work she has helped countless families in the Merrimack Valley build and maintain reading routines in their homes, with special

attention to those at highest-risk for educational failure. Her efforts help address the achievement gap, and are an invaluable contribution to her region.

Following in the footsteps of her philanthropic family, **Sue** makes contributing to Shrewsbury her mission. Sue enjoyed a long career as an elementary school teacher, and her volunteer work spans decades and includes involvement with her church, the Shrewsbury Child Development Council, Shrewsbury Girl Scouts, Shrewsbury Historical Society and the Donahue Rowing Center. Sue is best known as one of the founding members of the Spirit of Shrewsbury, the annual town festival that grew out of an idea for a Shrewsbury High School Alumni Association Homecoming event, and is now in its 21st year. Though originally events were held the last weekend of September, the festival has evolved into a month long celebration including a boat parade on Lake Quinsigamond, a talent show and a Town Expo. Sue's contributions are too numerous and she makes Shrewsbury a

Betty began working for Hingham in 1991 and retired last year from her role as Hingham's first Assistant Town Administrator. Betty kept Town Hall running – literally. She was in charge not only of the building itself, but making the office of the selectmen run smoothly, making sure citizens got their questions answered and issues dealt with, and most importantly, ensuring that Hingham's open Town Meeting came off without a hitch every year. Betty relished her role making it possible for every citizen to participate in their local government. She helped citizens get things done at Town Hall, and within the community. Betty possesses a dedication to the community, compassion, and her public service.

Pastor Janice is trained as a master's level clinical nurse specialist and is instrumental in the Reconciliation house in Webster. Her work with incarcerated men in recovery providing emotional support as well as spiritual support. She is a graduate of Andover Newton Theological School and was well known in her Diocese prior to her ordination through her work as Missioner for Health Ministries from 2000-2006. She has over twenty years of experience as a nurse educator, professional development leader, clinical nurse specialist, and health minister. She also served as a nurse in the U. S. Army Reserve for ten years. The provision of pastoral care and spiritual coaching to individuals dealing with addictions is of central importance to Pastor Janice's ministry. She meets twice a month with addicts incarcerated at the Worcester County House of Corrections in West Boylston, and is spearheading an effort to connect clergy and parishes with individuals being paroled in an effort to reduce the rate of recidivism.

Furthermore, Pam served on the Weston300 Committee in 2013 and played an integral part in celebrating the town's 300th Anniversary. Pam has remained committed over the years to worthwhile causes.

Marilyn started her career as a Kindergarten school teacher in 1970 until her retirement in 1999. She is Vice Chairperson of the Democratic Town Committee and is often the Campaign Manager for local elected officials, (15 to be exact). Marilyn has sat on the Conservation Commission for 17 years and is the Vice Chairperson of the Community Preservation Committee for 15 years. Smadar came to the US in her early teens from Israel as an immigrant, along with her family. She was hired as the Adult Literacy Coordinator at the Stoughton Public Library in 2006, originally as a part-time employee, and has been responsible for growing the program to meet the needs of the immigrant community. Her position became full-time last year, but she has always worked more than the hours on the schedule, helping to expanding the program in Stoughton and Sharon. This program succeeds because of the overwhelming kindness that Smadar shows every person that comes to the program. Her office provides 18 hours of training and constant support for the volunteer tutors, and tries to meet the wide variety of needs for the adult students. This program has helped to settle thousands of newcomers to Stoughton and the surrounding area over the past 19 years, with very little financial support or fanfare, and Smadar has played a key role in the many successes and accomplishments by adult students over the past 11 years.

Her goal was always to serve and protect, but **Carole** also broke down barriers throughout 28 years with the Danvers Police Department. Beginning as a reserve officer in 1985, she was the second woman on the force, rising through the ranks as a full-time officer, a detective, and retiring as a lieutenant/shift commander in 2007. As one of very few with special FBI training, Carole did most of the composite drawings at Logan Airport on September 11, 2001 which were key in identifying the terrorists. Her work with the Essex County DA's office also assisted in the conviction of a serial child molester. She served four years active duty as a Medic in the Army and six additional years in the Army Reserve. Carole's contributions have made the community, state ,and country safer for all.

Serving the most vulnerable residents, Beverly has led projects to better the lives of at-risk youth, individuals with disabilities, and the blind, all without fanfare. During her professional career, she worked as a social worker, rehabilitation counselor, and later served as Human Resources Director for the MA Commission for the Blind and Road to Responsibility. In 1978, she was a founding Board member of Marshfield's Talking Information Center, an award winning radio reading service that communicates local, state and national news to blind and low vision individuals. The Meaning of the Yellow Rose

The yellow rose is a symbol of the women who struggled for 72 years to be included in the United States Constitution. They achieved their goal through a peaceful revolution without firing a single shot.

Courageous suffragists faced jail, hunger strikes, years of organizing, ridicule, and great disappointment before achieving full suffrage when the 19th Amendment was finally adopted in 1920.

They came from rural and urban backgrounds, different economic classes, different races and generations. They worked together. Diversity became their strength as they united under a symbol: the yellow rose. The yellow rose stood for unity, friendship, and determination.

Today, the yellow rose reminds us that our own work to improve the status of women in the Commonwealth continues... requiring diversity, unity, and determination. We must strive for victory in our own peaceful revolutions.
