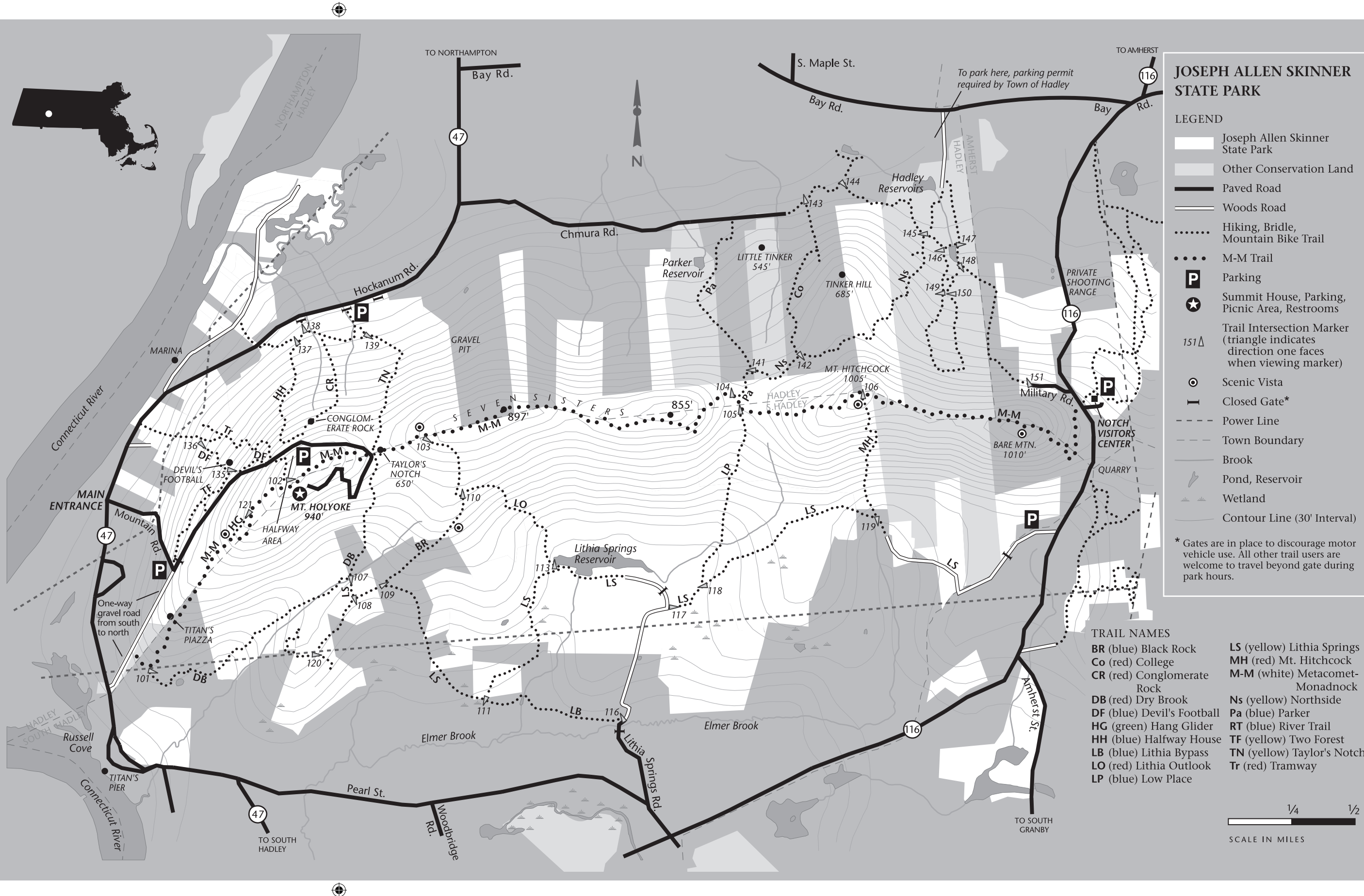

Welcome to DCR's Mt. Holyoke Range State Park

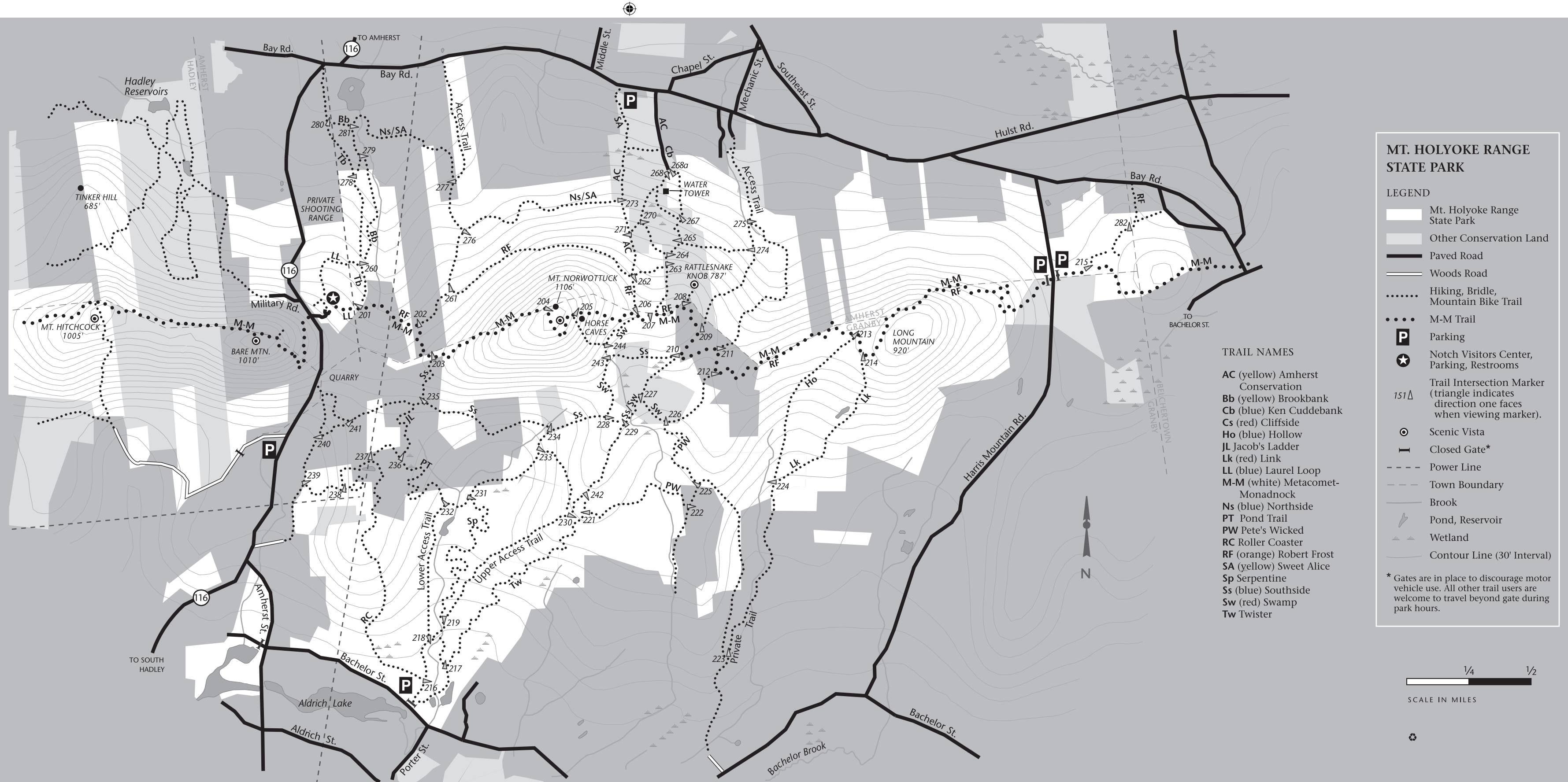
Mount Holyoke Range State Park is contiguous to J. A. Skinner State Park and together offers over 3,000 acres of park land. The park's mountain range has an east-west orientation that is primarily used for hiking and mountain biking.
