MS. MANN: Good evening. My name is Nora Mann. I am the director of the Department of Health Determination of Need Program, and this is a public hearing that has been called pursuant to a determination of need application that was filed on September 7, 2017 in connection with a transaction by which CareGroup, which is the parent of Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, New England Baptist Hospital, Mount Auburn Hospital, Lahey Health System, and Seacoast Regional Health System, which is the parent of Anna Jaques, intend to affiliate to create a comprehensive distributed healthcare delivery system in eastern Massachusetts.

The hearing is being conducted

jointly with the Division of Healthcare

Facility Licensure and Certification, and

that division is conducting a review of the

suitability of the applicant to own and

operate a hospital. And to that end, joining

me this evening is Steve Davis, who is the

licensure unit manager from the department's

Division of Healthcare Quality and Safety.

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By statute, before any license to operate a healthcare facility can be issued, any person intending to acquire that facility must apply to the Department of Public Health for a determination of need. The applicant requests that determination of need pursuant to Regulation 105 CMR 100.735, and in accordance with the regulations, an applicant applying for a transfer of ownership has to offer a clear and convincing showing under each of Factors 1, 3, and 4 of the DON regulation, so a subset of the DON regulation.

The full text of the regulation is available online. In short, the applicant must demonstrate sufficient need for the project by the applicant's existing patient panel, that the project will add measurable public health value in terms of improved health outcomes and quality of life to the applicant's patient panel, and providing reasonable assurances of health equity; that the proposed project will operate efficiently

and effectively by furthering and improving continuity and coordination of care for the patient panel, including evidence that the project will create or ensure appropriate linkages to patients' primary care services; that the applicant has provided evidence of consultation with government agencies that have relevant licensure certification or other regulatory oversight; that the applicant has provided evidence of sound community engagement; and that the project will compete on the basis of price, total medical expense, provider cost, and other recognized measures of healthcare spending.

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In addition, we must find that the applicant is otherwise in compliance with relevant laws and regulations, and we have to make a finding that there are sufficient funds available for the capital and operating costs necessary to support the project without negative impacts or consequences to the applicant's existing patient pool.

This public hearing is an effort to gather information and to hear the opinions

of interested parties about the proposed transfer of ownership. It is not a question and answer session. We will take all relevant information into account in preparing our recommendation to the Massachusetts Public Health Council whose decision on whether to approve this determination of need for the change of ownership will be made at an upcoming monthly public meeting.

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First we will hear from the applicant, and following that, we will open the hearing to public comment. If you wish to speak, please make sure that you have added your name to the sign-up sheet, and we will use that to determine the order of speakers. As a courtesy, we will permit elected officials to speak first.

I will call your name, and then you'll come up to that podium there and identify yourself by stating your name and your affiliation, your town of residence. To speed things up, we're also going to announce the name of the next speaker in advance and

ask that person to just come up, to wait in close proximity to the microphone.

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In addition, because we want to make sure that everybody has an opportunity to speak, we're going to ask that you keep your comments brief, three minutes or less, to the point, and directed to the topic of tonight's hearing. If you have a written copy of your testimony, please leave a copy of that with us. The proceedings are being transcribed. It's helpful to our stenographer to have a written copy, as well as for you to spell your name and speak as clearly as you can.

Each speaker will only have one opportunity to give testimony. Additional comments in any length may be submitted to us in writing. We accept and consider comments equally, whether they're submitted in writing or orally at this hearing. We will accept written comments until 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 17. Our email and regular mailing addresses are available at our website. It's the Determination of Need

Program, 250 Washington Street in Boston.
We'll have that available at the back desk if anybody doesn't have it.

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We have a sign language interpreter. In deference to accommodating anybody who will benefit from that service, they are here. That said, to accommodate their own energy levels, what we're going to do is we're going to continue to provide sign language interpretation. At some point if we don't know that there's somebody who needs it, we may stop. That said, if you or somebody that you're with would benefit from sign language, please let Lynn know at the table, and we will make sure that the ASL interpretation continues.

Our first speakers will be from the applicant, and I'm going to ask you to stand up and speak, stating your name and your affiliation. Thank you.

MR. GOLDSTEIN: Good evening. My name is Mark Goldstein, G-o-l-d-s-t-e-i-n.

I'm the president and CEO of Anna Jaques

Hospital. I'm also a proud resident of

Newburyport and have the honor and privilege of working at this community hospital for 13 years.

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I want to first thank the

Department of Public Health for coming to our
city and holding this hearing tonight. What
a terrific opportunity for our community to
testify and learn more about what we believe
will be a tremendous opportunity to transform
the healthcare landscape in Massachusetts.

As part of tonight's record, I want to respectfully submit the written testimony of several patients, employees, physicians, and community members who couldn't be here tonight. I also want to thank all of the audience for coming.

In a few minutes, after me, you will hear from Dr. Stanley Lewis, chief system development and strategy officer of Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. Dr. Lewis will share a broader perspective about how the new healthcare system will serve as a much-needed catalyst for change by creating high-quality, low-cost network of well-

respected organizations and clinicians that will span across eastern Massachusetts.

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My testimony tonight will focus specifically on Anna Jaques Hospital as one of the five founding members of this new system and the positive effects this system will have on our hospital, our patients, and most importantly, our community.

Through the vision and charity of

Ms. Anna Jaques, our hospital was established

in 1884, one of the oldest hospitals in

Massachusetts. Anna's request was pretty

simple. Give compassionate care to the

residents of our community. Our nurses,

physicians, our volunteers, and all our staff

honor her vision and memory every day.

Anna Jaques Hospital is a 123-bed, full-service community hospital, serving 17 communities, cities, and towns. While currently being the smallest independent community hospital in Massachusetts, we are the largest employer in Newburyport, with 1200 employees, and have 200 active physicians on our medical staff. Today, we

treat over 6000 patients each week.

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Anna Jaques currently has a very successful clinical affiliation with Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. Together, over the last seven years, we've brought more highly specialized services, such as cancer care, maternal fetal medicine for high-risk pregnancies, telestroke services in our emergency department and our inpatient units, and we've created primary care offices in Haverhill and Amesbury.

Anna Jaques has enjoyed more than a decade of solid performance by all accounts, from our measured high-quality care to our improved financial position, patient satisfaction, service expansion, and a very strong reputation.

Yet, we've reached a critical point in our 134-year history. Costs continue to rise, while federal and state insurance payments fall short of compensating hospitals like Anna Jaques for the care we provide.

Over the last 13 years, Anna Jaques has averaged about a one percent operating

margin, and it's just not sufficient to reinvest all the needed capital in our facility and keeping up to date with the latest medical technologies.

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The continued viability not only of our community hospital, but all community hospitals in eastern Massachusetts is among the fundamental guiding principles driving the creation of this new healthcare system.

For Anna Jaques, the new system will build upon our successful clinical integration with BIDMC, creating a stronger commitment among hospitals that share the same vision and values and have a stake in each other's success. We'll be expanding to the other hospitals that Nora mentioned also.

When a patient comes to Anna Jaques
Hospital for services, they receive highquality care at a price that is sometimes 30
to 50 percent below other Massachusetts
hospitals. As our state agency, the Health
Policy Commission, has reported,
reimbursement rates do not correlate with
quality of care received. And in fact, Anna

Jaques Hospital's measured quality is on par with some of the finest institutions in the state.

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As a new system, if we can shift to lower cost, high-quality institutions, like community hospitals, in particular Anna Jaques, and keep care in the appropriate community-based setting, we will simultaneously help community hospitals to thrive while lowering total medical care costs in the Commonwealth.

Beth Israel Deaconess Medical

Center and Lahey Health have a proven track

record of strengthening their community

hospital affiliates. Joining the new health

network will increase access to a broader

range of services for patients in our region

closer to where they live and work and ensure

that the right care is provided in the right

setting at an appropriate cost.

The new system is being designed to leverage each individual hospital's strengths and uniqueness, while maximizing the network size and scale to enhance efficiencies,

access to capital, and improved care delivery. Being part of this new system lets Anna Jaques keep our identity at a comfortable level of autonomy, while providing us with increased flexibility and security that we'd be challenged to earn on our own.

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Every hospital in the new system will retain its current name. So Anna Jaques Hospital will remain Anna Jaques Hospital, an affiliate of this new network. We will continue to operate as a not-for-profit, 501(c)(3), separately licensed, full-service hospital. Anna Jaques will retain local boards, management, and independent medical staff with appropriate intersects to the new health system. The hospital will continue to be governed by the community, for the community.

The Anna Jaques Community Health

Foundation, our philanthropy and the support

of our community will be as important as

ever. The foundation will continue to be

responsible for all our fundraising, and past

1 and all future philanthropy will stay local, 2 exclusively for the use of Anna Jaques 3 Hospital and our community. Our hospital is honored to be a 4 founding member of this new health system and 5 6 aligned with high-quality hospitals, like 7 Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Lahey Health, Mount Auburn Hospital, the New 8 9 England Baptist Hospital that all share our 10 commitment to strengthening high value, 11 community-based healthcare. 12 I want to thank you for this 13 opportunity to share my thoughts tonight. I 14 respectfully request the strong consideration 15 of your department for the approval of this 16 application. 17 MR. DAVIS: Thank you. 18 MS. MANN: Thank you. 19 MR. LEWIS: Good evening. My name 20 is Dr. Stan Lewis, L-e-w-i-s. And as Mark 21 said earlier, I'm the chief system 22 development and strategy officer at Beth

Israel Deaconess Medical Center.

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I also want to begin by thanking

the Department of Public Health for hosting this meeting and giving us the opportunity to participate. I want to thank as well all of the community members gathered here this evening who took time from their busy schedules to join us.

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We're here tonight because we've asked the department to approve the application of Anna Jaques Hospital, the Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center system, Lahey Health, New England Baptist Hospital, and Mount Auburn Hospital to create a new, non-profit, integrated healthcare system in Massachusetts.

With the creation of this new system, our vision is to transform the region's healthcare delivery capabilities and create a stronger, more integrated organization designed to provide expert care close to home, especially for our most vulnerable patients, a seamless superior patient experience and unparalleled value in a rapidly changing healthcare environment.

As separate organizations, we have

and can continue to provide great care. But together as one health system, we can do so much more. By joining together, we'll create a health system that has world-class academic medical centers and teaching hospitals, leading community hospitals, and a premier orthopedics hospital. All of this will be complemented by compassionate, best in class physician networks, community health centers, and clinical strengths across the entire continuum of care, from primary care to longterm and post-acute care.

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So what does this mean for our patients, their families, our neighborhoods, and our communities? First, our neighborhoods and communities will have greater access to both primary and specialty care close to where they live and work, and care will be delivered in the most clinically appropriate and cost-effective setting.

You will also have enhanced access to an even broader range of subspecialty, tertiary, and quaternary services, with the benefit of cutting edge research and a

commitment to training the next generation of physicians, nurses, and allied health professionals. And as patients, you'll have access to all of this in one network, and your services will be better coordinated across all the different aspects of your healthcare experience.

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Coming together also means we'll have the scale necessary to create new and innovative health insurance products that will be extremely attractive to both employers and consumers.

Now, we know that our goals are ambitious, but we are driven by our fundamental desire to dramatically improve the care we provide to all of our patients, and we are confident we can do it, because on a smaller scale, we have done it already.

Evidence of this includes at our affiliated community hospitals and community health centers, as Mark alluded to. Our organizations have been able to attract new patients, add primary care physicians, and bring more specialty services to the local

community. At the same time, we've been able to create seamless access to high acuity tertiary care when our patients need it.

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We are proud of what we've accomplished within the BIDMC system, but there are limits to what can be done alone. By coming together to create a new healthcare system, we can combine the resources and expertise of each organization with a shared goal to ensure that our community affiliates will have the resources and clinical infrastructure they need to grow, maintain their competitiveness, provide care in the community whenever possible, and adjust to meet the changing healthcare needs of the community at large.

In a time of tremendous uncertainty about the future of healthcare delivery in our country, we are convinced that the creation of our new system is an essential step forth in achieving the goal of creating a market-based solution to healthcare cost challenges in Massachusetts, and most importantly, to do more for our patients,

their families, and the communities we serve.

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I respectfully ask that the

Department of Public Health approve this

affiliation as presented, and thank you for

the opportunity to be here tonight.

MS. MANN: Thank you. Mayor Holaday.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MAYOR HOLADAY: Good evening. My name is Donna Holaday, H-o-l-a-d-a-y, and I am the mayor of the City of Newburyport. In addition to being the mayor for the past eight years, I also am a resident of almost 39 years in the City of Newburyport, and as a resident, having Anna Jaques Hospital here in our community has been a tremendous and important resource for families, patients, for our community. And it started in 1884 and has continued to evolve over the years.

The hospital was in trouble. I think that that's no secret in terms of where it was going, and we were very fortunate to bring in an executive director and now followed on the heels by Mark Goldstein who

worked diligently with new teams and new resources and really took this hospital from a hospital that was in trouble, when lots of these community hospitals were being gobbled up all over the Commonwealth and in other states, and saw this hospital really rise to a new level.

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Part of that was the relationship with I think Beth Israel Deaconess, but also because of the commitment of so many talented people in our community -- professional staff, doctors, physicians, surgeons -- who really I think came together and felt that this hospital was really vital to our community.

We've seen an expansion in capital plans, increased services, increased technology, a cancer center. But there's only so much that a small community hospital can do, despite the fact that it is the largest employer in Newburyport. And it's important for the challenges in the healthcare profession, for challenges that we see coming down the road in terms of

insurance, the unknowns, that we provide the greatest level of care and access and specialty care to residents in the greater Newburyport community that is possible.

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One of the things that I am so impressed with this new system is that every resident will be within five miles of a healthcare provider. That is wonderful news. Technology also brings in much greater patient support and care as we move forward.

I'm going to just tell you a quick story. A couple of weeks ago, walking down the streets of Newburyport, a woman stopped me, and she had a stroke and didn't know she was having a stroke, and she was brought to Anna Jaques Hospital. And through the network with BI, they were able to bring up their stroke specialist. And here it is, seven days later, she's walking down the street, and you would never know anything had happened. And she gives credit to this partnership.

These are the kinds of services and supports that we need to see happen

throughout the greater Newburyport area. I fully support this merger. I think it makes sense. We need more competition in the healthcare industry. We need to have lower prices. I'm encouraged that that is one of the goals of this merger, is to lower insurance and the cost of medical care, and I fully support this merger.

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And I thank you for the opportunity to speak with you tonight and for DPH coming out to Newburyport. And thank you to all of the people who came here. This gives me a lot of happiness to see all these people here who are here for this hearing to talk about this little hospital that now has emerged into something wonderful for our community. So thank you for the opportunity to testify today.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you, Mayor.

SENATOR O'CONNOR IVES: Hello. I'm

Kathleen O'Connor Ives, state senator for the

1st Essex District, which includes the

communities of Amesbury, Merrimac,

Newburyport, Haverhill, Methuen, North Andover, and the town of Salisbury.

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I'm here to testify in support of the proposed merger, because it is my understanding that such a merger will result in, among other things, expanded employment opportunities for residents in our area, new opportunities for Anna Jaques to provide not only new access for patients, but also themselves get new access to capital, to develop initiatives and facilities at the hospital, to provide a new level of coordinated care, where residents won't have to fight traffic -- like I do -- in and out of Boston to access quality healthcare.

And I submit that greater

convenience and expanded options for patients

locally will translate directly into people

being more inclined to utilize quality

healthcare that's in their own backyard. And

I also believe this merger will result in one

of the most important changes of all, which

is the prospect of new, more affordable

health insurance products becoming available

to people, products which will be focused on patients receiving care in their own community without compromise in quality.

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It's important for Anna Jaques

Hospital to not only survive, but to thrive.

And this merger is a path forward, which I

can only support if our community is in fact

better for it. And the facts as presented to

me make a very convincing case. Thank you.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you, Senator.

MS. MANN: Thank you, Senator. Rep Kelcourse.

REP KELCOURSE: Good evening,
everyone. My name is James Kelcourse. I'm a
state representative for the 1st Essex
District. I just want to start by thanking
everybody for coming out tonight on this cold
night to be here. I want to thank those
responsible for organizing this, and I want
to thank you for being here, too.

I'm testifying in support of this merger. I think it's very important. When I think about this merger, I think about what Tom Jones, a former work force city

councillor here in Newburyport once said to me. He traveled all over the country as a construction contractor, and he said, Jim, when you go to places throughout the country, especially in the middle part of the country, we're really blessed to have Anna Jaques Hospital here in this area, providing the level of care that it provides to the people of greater Newburyport.

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A place like Anna Jaques Hospital sometimes we often take for granted. You know, they're so close down the road. Babies are born there. One of my favorite things on New Year's Day, the day after New Year's Day is to see on the front page of the Newburyport Daily News the first baby that was born at Anna Jaques Hospital. I think this year, we welcomed at around 3:30 in the morning a baby in Anna Jaques Hospital. It was really terrific.

You know, so many mothers depend on the care that they receive at Anna Jaques
Hospital, just right down the street. And when I think about what would happen if we

didn't have Anna Jaques, I think about what

Tom Jones, the city councillor here in

Newburyport once said to me. And we cannot

take that for granted. What we have here is

really important to the health of the

citizens, and what this merger will do is

provide quality of care to those citizens who

greatly depend on it. It's going to help

Anna Jaques survive.

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One of my roles in the State House is to be able to put constituents together with leadership, those people who are making the important decisions, that affect the citizens, not only of Newburyport, Salisbury, and Amesbury, but throughout the other 348 cities and towns throughout the Commonwealth.

And I had the pleasure of having

Mark Goldstein who was a part of the price

variation commission this year talk with

leadership in the House. And in that one

hour conversation that he had with

leadership, I learned so much about how

important it is to have Anna Jaques Hospital

here.

And when I sit and I speak with somebody who's devoted their life to healthcare and who's a professional in the area of healthcare, Mark Goldstein, I know that when he tells me that this merger is important and necessary for Anna Jaques to survive and thrive here in Newburyport, I know that he means business.

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So this is going to allow Anna

Jaques to continue for a long, long time, for generations to come. It's going to allow

Anna Jaques to continue to provide the great jobs that it provides to the people of the greater Newburyport area, and for those mothers who are dependent upon good quality care, a good quality hospital in which to deliver their child on New Year's Day, they can count on Anna Jaques.

So I thank you for being here this evening. I'm looking forward to having Anna Jaques survive and thrive for generations to come. And I know that this is going to be a really good thing for the area. So thank you very much, and Happy New Year.

Anna Jaques in Newburyport 17 serves a majority of our residents and our 18 healthcare needs. We view this proposed 19 merger as an opportunity to strengthen our 20 community-based hospital, expand our choices, 21 and provide more access to top notch 22 specialists and resources within the new 23 group. 2.4 The economies of scale created by

as a result of the merger will strengthen 1 2 Anna Jaques Hospital, its offerings, and a 3 level of excellent care to not only Newburyport, but all of the surrounding 4 cities and towns. In conclusion, the City of 5 6 Amesbury wholeheartedly supports the proposed 7 merger, and we look forward to all the benefits that it will provide to the citizens 8 9 of the City of Amesbury and the many local 10 communities served by Anna Jaques Hospital. 11 Thank you for your time. 12 MR. DAVIS: Thank you. MS. MANN: Thank you. Charles 13 14 Tontar. 15 MR. TONTAR: My name is Charles 16 Tontar, T-o-n-t-a-r, and I represent Ward 4 17 in the Newburyport City Council. Anna Jaques 18 Hospital is located in my ward, and they are 19 good neighbors. 20 So I stand here in support of the 21 reorganization and the new role for the 22 hospital. I also happen to be an economist,

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especially the economic development aspect of

and I participated in the master plan,

that master plan. And yes, the hospital is the number one employer in the city, but there is also a strong economic cluster of healthcare providers in the city that is surrounded by the hospital. So there's a multiplier effect to having the hospital located here in the city, and it is one of the more dynamic aspects of the local economy and is critical for the city's well-being. Anything that can take place that helps Anna Jaques to continue to play that role is critical for us. Secondly, I am happy to hear that a lot of the local aspects of the structure will still be in place, because it's important as a neighbor to the hospital to have individuals who are responsive to neighborhood concerns. So thank you very much for this opportunity. MR. DAVIS: Thank you, Councillor. MS. MANN: Thank you. David LaFlamme, followed by Charlie Cullen. MR. LaFLAMME: Good evening. My

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name is David LaFlamme, L-a-F-l-a-m-m-e.

wife Virginia and I have been residents of this community for well over 25 years, along with our three amazing kids, who have chosen to become homeowners here, along with three grandsons, and my wife is taking care of one of them tonight. So I fully appreciate the importance of this decision.

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I have served as chairman of Anna
Jaques Hospital's board of trustees since
2013. Prior to that, I served as chair of
the finance committee, and I've been a board
member for over 15 years. I'm honored to be
here today to share my support of and
confidence in this application. It is my
belief that this health system will secure
healthcare in this community for generations
to come.

There is so much to be proud of that has brought Anna Jaques to where we are today. For 134 years, Anna Jaques employees, medical staff, boards, committees, and volunteers have made it a truly special place to work and receive care. More people are choosing our hospital for their care, and

that is a true testament of the hospital's progress in providing great care and superior patient experience. I know from firsthand experience with my mom. Thanks, Mark.

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In the last decade alone, our community supported a 15-million-dollar master facility plan that enabled the hospital to upgrade to nearly all private patient rooms and modernize our facility. We have opened satellite medical destinations in Newburyport, Amesbury, and Haverhill, made investments in cutting technology like 3D mammography, and the Mako robot arm-assisted technology for partial knee and total hip procedures. We've renovated our birth center and neonatal care center.

And the culture and work
environment at Anna Jaques has also been
recognized with awards like Becker's hospital
review's top 50 places to work in healthcare
-- and that's in the United States, by the
way -- and Boston Business Journal's best
places to work. Significant accomplishments.

The board of trustees has seen

firsthand the highs and lows that community hospitals face. And Anna Jaques faces a unique set of challenges as an independent hospital that has one of the lowest reimbursement rates in the entire state of Massachusetts, a frustration for our board, I can assure you.

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The board of trustees and the hospital's senior management team spent much time discussing and evaluating the decision to join this system. We reviewed the impact of joining this system through all accounts and perspectives: the hospital perspective, the patient perspective, employee perspective, financial implications, what would be best fit for our hospital culture.

And by all accounts, we are convinced this is the right decision to secure our long-term viability. With the added support of a robust health system, it will enable our hospital, Anna Jaques, to continue to do what we do best, caring for our community, in our community, well into the future, and expanding services to our

community.

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Since 1884, Anna Jaques has operated independently, forming the reputation we have today, and becoming the hospital we know and truly love. We will proudly continue to be called Anna Jaques Hospital, maintain our identity and culture and local control from a board perspective and keep our true connection to the patients and communities that we serve.

So in closing, I thank you for your time and respectfully urge the Department of Public Health's approval of this application. Thank you very much.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you. Following Mr. Cullen, Anne Lagasse.

MR. CULLEN: Hi, my name is Charlie Cullen, C-u-l-l-e-n. I am the past president of the Provident Bank and served as a longtime board member of Anna Jaques. I now live at 495 Main Street in Amesbury. pleased to be here today to share my support of Anna Jaques Hospital and the powerful role

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that having a strong and vibrant hospital in our community plays for the people who live and work here.

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As someone who receives their own healthcare services locally, I have full confidence in the care that is provided. I am thrilled about Anna Jaques partnering with other like-minded, high-quality systems such as Beth Israel, Lahey, Mount Auburn, New England Baptist, as it will only strengthen and expand what is available right here in Newburyport.

I was heavily involved in the hospital's capital campaign that with the support of local business, community leaders, Anna Jaques employees, patients, and friends, we raised millions of dollars to modernize the power plant and upgrade the facility. It was particularly satisfying to me to see our city as well as neighboring cities and towns embrace this effort and validate the importance of Anna Jaques.

As a side note, my dad had participated in the capital campaign 30 years

before, and he too was an active and enthusiastic trustee of Anna Jaques. And for businesses like Provident Bank, who have given major gifts to the hospital, as well as individuals who continue to choose Anna Jaques to support, it gives me great peace of mind that all donations, past and future, will remain solely at Anna Jaques, which for donors like me means so much.

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My roots in this community are deep. I've been here for almost 67 years, and I realized that when I was born, Anna Jaques Hospital was 67 years old. I don't know what that means. Numbers. And Anna Jaques has always been a part of my family's story, like so many others. I was born at Anna Jaques. So was my brother and sister. So were my two children. I graduated from Newburyport High. And I was proud to spend the most important part of my business career here. I can't imagine living in another community.

So it is of vital interest to me that we all support this next chapter for

Anna Jaques. I am confident it will perpetuate high-quality local healthcare, while protecting and securing our beloved hospital to stay where its been since 1884. So thank you for your consideration, and my support for this application. Thank you.

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MS. MANN: Thank you.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: After Ms. Lagasse, George Ellison.

MS. LAGASSE: Good evening. Thank you for being here. I wrote a letter in support of Anna Jaques becoming part of this proposed BIDMC, Lahey, New England Baptist, and Mount Auburn Hospital new regional network system.

As a former board member of Anna
Jaques and the former chairwoman of the Anna
Jaques Foundation Board, I know firsthand the
challenge of a small, independent community
hospital to remain profitable. Anna Jaques
has always been a high-quality and low-cost
facility, and as a resident of Newburyport, I
want the assurances that our local hospital

not only survives, but continues to grow and attract talent so that my family's healthcare and our community's healthcare can remain local.

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The uncertainty in the healthcare reimbursements makes the future of remaining independent an impossible choice for us.

Example, fiscal 2017, Anna Jaques federal

Medicare reimbursement was reduced by \$2.7

million. This drastic reduction in revenue was a hit that the hospital struggled to absorb.

Anna Jaques must remain competitive by continually investing in its people and its facilities. And to do so, we need to be part of this larger, secure healthcare network. Thank you for hosting this meeting.

MS. MANN: Thank you. Following Mr. Ellison, Mary Ann Abbott.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MR. ELLISON: George Ellison, live at 24 Moody Lane in West Newbury. Ellison is E-1-1-i-s-o-n. I am a current member of the board of Anna Jaques, recently went back on

the board. Prior to that, I was chairman of the board for seven years. And with all the time that I've spent on the board, as I reflect back on it, the one thing I come away with is healthcare is really hard.

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And to have Anna Jaques where they are today relative to where they were 15 years ago is actually a pretty amazing feat. To have the medical staff, the employees, the board, the hundreds of volunteers pour their heart and soul into turning this hospital around was really an amazing feat.

And today, I'd really like to speak to the people in the Newburyport community more than to actually the Department of Public Health because everybody should really know that Anna Jaques was asked to join this new organization that they're trying to form. We didn't seek them out. They seeked out Anna Jaques. And I think that speaks volumes about what is taking place in this little community hospital.

You know, for years, I felt like I had my finger on the pulse of what was going

on, and every time I turned around, some 1 2 other little bomb would drop. And there's 3 never been enough money. What has gone on from capital has been raised in the city, the 4 citizens have been great. We always viewed 5 6 Anna Jaques as neighbors taking care of 7 neighbors. And we have a strong commitment 8 from the new organization that that's going 9 to continue. So I support this. I want to let 10 11 the people of Newburyport, Amesbury, West 12 Newbury, Groveland, all the surrounding 13 neighbors that this is the right thing to do. 14 We kind of always knew at some point in time 15 we would lose our independence. And I think 16 with all the work that's gone on, what has 17 truly happened is Anna Jaques has been 18 positioned to be a highly-paid free agent. 19 We get in with the best. 20 So I want to support this, and 21 please help us accept this application. 22 Thank you.

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MS. MANN: Thank you, Mr. Ellison.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

After Ms. Abbott, Donna Sylvester.

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MS. ABBOTT: Hi. My name is Mary Ann Abbott, A-b-b-o-t-t. I am here in support of the application and creation of the new health system.

I served as the president of the Anna Jaques Hospital Aid Association for three years from 2015 to 2017. The mission of the Aid Association is to support the Seacoast Regional Health Systems and Anna Jaques Hospital in furtherance of the hospital's mission to provide the highest quality medical care.

And we do this with donations to the hospital from all the fundraisers we have. For the past three years, we have raised and donated over \$150,000 each year. That's a lot of money. The Aid Association has been in existence for 130 years this year, and we have been one of Anna Jaques biggest donors every year.

Our aid members and people who have donated their time and money and support of the livelihood of the hospital, they get a

great feeling of comfort that a robust system will back our hospital and be as invested in its future as we are. What is even more comforting to all of us is that all the money we raise will stay in this community.

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The Aid Association is a board of about 25 women. We had the opportunity a few years ago, when Mark first brought up the 3D mammography equipment to us, we had the opportunity to donate money towards that, and we have. We have donated \$100,000 each year towards that equipment purchase. And we did this because we have friends, neighbors, sisters, all of who have breast cancer. And this technology was critical to this community. This was tangible results which we could see with the purchase of this equipment.

So it's programs such as these on the cutting edge of medicine which keeps Anna Jaques Hospital relevant in our community. A few years ago, when the Anna Jaques Cancer Center affiliated with Beth Israel Deaconess opened up here, again, our board knew many

friends, neighbors in our community who are not having to travel to Boston and sit on the bridge after chemotherapy, sometimes not feeling too hot. So now, they can get their treatment in Newburyport. That is key. That is very, very important.

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So I would just like to say on a more personal note that when we bought our house 20 years ago, we were moving from Newburyport to another community, and I had a checklist. And on my checklist, besides a garage, which nobody in Newburyport has, and central air, I wanted a paid fire department and a hospital. And that was it.

I've had three kids at that
hospital. They've all been there. It's
important that we were close to the hospital
in case -- you know, like one of them ate dog
food once -- you know, things that new
parents don't really get. And being close to
a hospital, they had a daycare. Our kids
went to a daycare. It's very, very
important.

But even more important is the

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quality of medical care we get there. And I so totally support this, and I hope it goes through, because that would be such a boost for our community. Thank you.

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MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you. After Ms. Sylvester, Mary Ann Clancy.

MS. SYLVESTER: Good evening.

Donna Sylvester, S-y-l-v-e-s-t-er. I'm

definitely in support of this. I do have a

local primary care physician, but I have

specialists at both Beth Israel and at Mass

General. I go for most of my healthcare to

Boston, always have. I've been here 31

years. Prior to that, I spent 18 years as a

manager in radiology at Beth Israel, and now

I'm a volunteer at Anna Jaques.

And even though I'm really in favor of this, because I do use oncology at Anna Jaques, it's great that we have somebody -- I'm kind of a snob -- it made me feel really good when he gave me his card, and it said Beth Israel on it. So I am kind of a healthcare snob.

1 But I think it's important to have 2 the hospital here, and I think that this is a 3 great thing. There's only a couple of things that I worry about. There are many people 4 here, older people especially, that do 5 6 everything at Anna Jaques. And earlier, when 7 I was listening, I heard words like leverage, more integrated, one network. 8 And those 9 words worry me that people in Newburyport 10 might some day be asked to go to Haverhill or 11 someplace else for certain tests or certain 12 -- because that used to happen to us years 13 ago when managed care first came in. You 14 know, well, this hospital doesn't do this 15 particular test, you have to go over there. 16 And that's a concern to me, for 17 especially older people in the community, and 18 I would worry that that would happen in the long run. And that's my only concern. For 19 20 me, I think it's a great thing. Thanks. 21 MR. DAVIS: Thank you. 22 MS. MANN: Thank you very much. After Ms. Clancy, Chris Johnston. 23 2.4 MS. CLANCY: Good evening. My name

is Mary Ann Clancy. I am a native of
Newburyport, an almost lifelong resident
here. I live here currently. I have lots of
connections to Anna Jaques Hospital. My two
parents were born at Anna Jaques Hospital, I
was born at Anna Jaques Hospital, as well as
my five siblings. My three children were
born at Anna Jaques Hospital, my grandson was
born last year at Anna Jaques Hospital, and
his mom currently works at the maternity ward
at Anna Jaques Hospital. My former motherin-law worked in the ER at Anna Jaques
Hospital. So I'm not kidding when I say I
have a lot of connections.

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I am also employed as vice president of communications at the Institution for Savings, which is one of the hospital's longest, largest benefactors over the years, and I am a former mayor of the City of Newburyport. And in all of those instances, I've had intimate connections with the hospital.

As a mom of three kids, two boys and a girl, very active, like many of you, I

spent many a day and night at Anna Jaques

Hospital in that ER. We actually thought one
of the ER rooms was going to be named after

my son for a while, we spent so much time

there. But it was a relief for us and an
ultimate joy for us to be able to take our

kids locally whenever we needed to have some

local care, and we continue to do that.

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As a mayor of Newburyport, about 13 years ago, I spent a number of hours working on some neighborhood connections to Anna Jaques Hospital. You might remember the access road issue way back when, where the hospital was trying to create an access road to make it easier to get to the hospital. We worked closely with the hospital and the neighborhood, and that worked out just fine.

I happened to be on a focus group when the new team came into the hospital,

Mark Goldstein and the former CEO, Delia

O'Connor. We were very, very impressed at the time, and that has made a huge difference, as any of you know who have been to the hospital in the last ten or twelve

years, in the operation of that hospital.

The care that we give there every day, it is unmatched anyplace else.

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Finally, as vice president of communications at the Institution for Savings, our goal at the bank is to put our money into the hands of people who need it the most. But more importantly, to put it back into our community. We worked with Anna Jaques on the single-room unit, we worked with Anna Jaques on the 3D mammography that Mary Ann Abbott mentioned. We worked with Anna Jaques to bring so much good to the hospital. And we would only do that if we knew that it was a community that we were giving back into.

So for all of these reasons, I
think when you talk about all of them, the
bottom line is this. I have an aging mom
that lives here. I live here. I hope to die
here -- not here, but here. And to me, the
most important thing is affordable, local,
excellent healthcare. And I think this
partnership will give it to all of us, and so

I am in support of the application. Thank you very much.

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MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you. Chris Johnston, and then Grace Connolly.

MR. JOHNSTON: Good evening. Chris Johnston, J-o-h-n-s-t-o-n. I live at 287 High Street here in Newburyport. I'm the director of membership development for the Greater Newburyport Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and I'm honored to be on the board of directors for the Anna Jaques Foundation.

My wife and I moved here about eight years ago, and we knew Newburyport was a very special place, but we didn't really know how special it was until 2014, and that's when my wife was pregnant with our first daughter. And I was playing racquetball against a member of the board of directors at the time, and I said we're a little bit worried, my wife's traveling and can't get to one of the birth center visitation hours to tour and everything prior to the birth.

So he said, well, hold on a second, 1 2 let me change that for you. So he emailed 3 Alison Sekelsky, who's here tonight, and within minutes, she got back to us and said 4 when can you come in. And we said, well, the 5 6 only time we can get in is on a Sunday. She 7 said I'll see you this Sunday. And I'll never forget after the two 8 9 hours that she spent with us and bought us

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And I'll never forget after the two hours that she spent with us and bought us lunch, she said, well, I have to go, I have to go take my sons to the new Batman movie.

And I'll never forget that. And it's that level of care that we are very fortunate to have here in Newburyport, and that level of care that the network is going to be very fortunate to have.

So I'm definitely in approval of this merger, and I think the leadership will have a big impact not only on our hospital, but also for the rest of the network as well. So thank you for having me.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you. Grace Connolly followed by Alison Sekelsky.

MS. CONNOLLY: Good evening. I want to thank Senator O'Connor Ives and the Department of Public Health for organizing this meeting tonight to take input from the community. My name is Grace Connolly, C-o-n-n-o-l-l-y, and I reside at 47 Green Street, Newburyport.

I am a mother of three children, all of whom were born at Anna Jaques
Hospital, my husband was born at Anna Jaques
Hospital, and I can say that I too have had
many visits to the emergency room. My
daughter Caroline, my most active daughter,
once said, mom, do you think they have a
picture of every one of my bones at Anna
Jaques Hospital? I said, well, that's a
possibility.

I'm also here this evening because

I am a member of the board of trustees of

Anna Jaques Hospital, currently serving as

vice-chair. But as a resident since 1984 and

a mom, I always wear my community hat when I

serve as trustee, and I realize that I

represent my community in terms of being a

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good steward of this incredible community asset, because that's what I see it as. This was built by charitable dollars.

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And so I can tell you that I did my best in terms of attending health policy commission meetings, price variation commission meetings, and reading probably the two-ton tome called Community Hospitals at a Crossroad, which really educated me in addition to serving as a trustee about the incredible challenges we face as a community hospital, keeping up with the latest technology and being the lowest reimbursed hospital in the Commonwealth.

And my goal as a trustee has always been in making decisions, what is the best decision to ensure that this community continues to receive the benefits of high-quality, affordable care. We're blessed with an incredible physician staff. I get my care locally. Actually, my physician is in the front row. She's wonderful, Dr. Naseer.

So as we came to this decision as to whether or not this was in the best

interest of Anna Jaques Hospital -- you know,
Mark Goldstein once said, you know, it's not
all about independence. We are one of the 11
remaining independent community hospitals,
but it's all about how do we continue to
provide this community with the highest
quality care.

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And I think Dr. Stan Lewis said,
you know, we can't do it alone. If Beth
Israel Deaconess can't do it alone, Anna
Jaques Community Hospital needs to form
strategic alliances as well. And I think the
poet, John Dunn, said it very poetically.
"No man is an island entire of itself. Every
man is a piece of the continent, a part of
the main."

And not quite so poetically, but it's the same for Anna Jaques. We have to be part of a strategically formed alliance of healthcare organizations that share our core values, which I think we're in very good company with Beth Israel Deaconess, Mount Auburn, New England Baptist, the Lahey. And my goal certainly as a community member

wearing a trustee hat is to ensure that this community continues to receive the best possible care. Thank you for your time.

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MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you. Alison Sekelsky followed by Frank Cousins.

name is Alison Sekelsky, S-e-k-e-l-s-k-y.

I'm the director of the maternal child health
unit at Anna Jaques Hospital, and I've worked
at Anna Jaques Hospital since 1999. I'm also
a resident of the City of Amesbury, and I am
here tonight in support of this partnership.

MS. SEKELSKY: Good evening. My

The importance of keeping not just care, but high-quality and specialized care in our community is reaffirmed every day in the birth center, as our mothers, babies, and families benefit from having advanced maternity and neonatal care available close to home.

Through our clinical affiliation with Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, we are able to have a maternal fetal medicine specialist and neonatologist on the Anna

Jaques campus for high-risk pregnancies, which enables our babies to stay closer to home, or when needed, transferred to BIDMC's level 3 neonatal intensive care unit.

Together, Anna Jaques and BIDMC provide the necessary level of care in the most appropriate setting.

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Because of this specialized level of care in our community, expecting moms no longer feel that they have to travel to Boston for high-risk pregnancy care. For parents, having their premature newborns stay closer to home once their babies are strong enough to move to the Anna Jaques neonatal care nursery, makes a world of difference.

This relationship between Anna

Jaques and Beth Israel has directly

benefitted our patients in the birth center,

and in this new systems model would enable

the same seamless transition of care to the

most appropriate setting when needed to other

clinical areas of need.

We also care for a very vulnerable population in the neonatal care center,

including infants born addicted to opioids.

Recently, Anna Jaques obtained a grant that enabled us to introduce a dedicated social worker for patients of women's healthcare and the birth center. Together with community partners, we work with mothers identified as high-risk prenatally through their baby's first year of life to support and empower them to sustain freedom from substances and offer their child the best start to life. We also introduced a mother-baby support group for pregnant and parenting mothers in recovery from substance abuse.

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No matter what the need is, offering high-quality care locally allows our parents to stay with their babies as much as possible, which is truly the best medicine for them. With the support and bandwidth of a system backing our efforts, we will be able to identify and enhance new ways to support our youngest patients and their parents.

I ask the Department of Public

Health's approval of this application both as

an employee of Anna Jaques Hospital and a

member of our community. Thank you for your consideration.

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MS. MANN: Thank you. Mr. Cousins followed by Ginny Eramo.

MR. COUSINS: My name is Frank G.

Cousins, Jr., C-o-u-s-i-n-s. I'm the

president of the Greater Newburyport Chamber

of Commerce and a lifelong Newburyporter. I

have spent my career proudly serving the

State of Massachusetts through elected office

positions and as the former Essex County

sheriff for over two decades.

Through these roles, I have witnessed firsthand the impact that access to high-quality, lower cost healthcare has to the health and well-being of our population.

I am here today to express my support of the application, as it will increase access to expanded key services that our community is in need of, such as mental and behavioral health.

This week marked the start of my

new role as the president of the Newburyport

Chamber of Commerce. I cannot express enough

the vital role that Anna Jaques Hospital plays in the greater Newburyport community, both for the health and well-being and also the economy, as well as Newburyport's largest employer. For the people who live, work, and play here, having a thriving hospital like Anna Jaques is a major asset for business owners, homeowners, and tourism.

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I have served as a longtime member of the Anna Jaques board of trustees and have heard firsthand the struggles that small independent community-like hospitals like Anna Jaques go through. For more than seven years, Anna Jaques' clinical affiliations with Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center has played an integral role in strengthening and sustaining Anna Jaques and has brought specialized services, like our cancer programs.

Both Beth Israel Deaconess Medical
Center and Lahey have a proven track record
of strengthening their community hospital
affiliates, and I have great faith in the
strength and value that this new integrated

system will bring to our communities.

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I am also a Newburyporter who cares deeply about the community and Anna Jaques Hospital. The creation of this new healthcare system is essential, ensuring the important role that community hospitals like Anna Jaques will continue to play a serious role for the next generation.

I respectfully urge the department to approve this application, and thank you for your time and consideration this evening.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you. After Ms. Eramo, Dixie Patterson.

MS. ERAMO: My name is Ginny Eramo, E-r-a-m-o. I live at 28 R Toppans Lane in Newburyport. I've been a resident here for 33 years. I'm also a 30-year local business owner with 48 employees, all of whom, or most of whom use Anna Jaques Hospital.

Over the past three decades, I have become intimately familiar with Anna Jaques. I gave birth to my two children there, my two grandchildren were recently born there, and

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my family, my extended family and my employees have utilized the services in most areas of the hospital.

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For the past 12 years, I have volunteered at Anna Jaques as a board member and a fundraiser, and I am privy to the great challenges facing any community hospital and the trend of independent hospitals shuttering one by one in the face of competition.

Our hospital is a prize possession of this community, a highly valued institution of which thousands of residents have supported through their philanthropy and their volunteerism. I witnessed this support firsthand when I served as chair of the Anna Jaques Community Health Foundation from 2013 to 2015, a role that's dedicated to raising funds that directly support our community hospital.

During this time, I saw just how vital philanthropy is to community hospitals like Anna Jaques, with donations directly benefitting patient care in our community and enabling the hospital to make investments and

provide services that they may otherwise have not been able to do.

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I also got to know many of our donors and hear special stories behind their gifts to Anna Jaques that make such a difference, from neighbors, local businesses, grateful patients, employees of the hospital, and so many others who choose to support their hospital because they know how much Anna Jaques means to the community, and because we all want our hospital to not only survive, but to thrive.

And while this new system will bring about new partnerships and modes of collaboration across the partner hospitals, every dollar that's given to Anna Jaques -- past, present, and in the future -- will stay at Anna Jaques.

I support strengthening our community hospital and keeping high quality and affordable healthcare directly within our community. And for that reason, I fully support Anna Jaques Hospital's intention to become part of a new health system with Beth

Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Lahey
Health, New England Baptist, and Mount Auburn
Hospital. Thank you.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

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MS. PATTERSON: Good evening. My name is Dixie Patterson, P-a-t-t-e-r-s-o-n.

I'm a proud resident of Newburyport, and I'm actually a physician assistant in cardiac surgery at Lahey Clinic in Burlington. We've taken care of many patients from this area down there.

We've heard a lot tonight from
everyone here what great care they have
received at Anna Jaques, and I too personally
have been taken care of at Anna Jaques. I've
spent some time in the ER and have friends
that work there and have just really been
taken care of there in a small community
hospital, where sort of everyone knows
everyone, and that's the kind of care that I
think we all appreciate.

I could go to Lahey in Burlington

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to get my care. I go there to work. But it's really nice to know that we have such wonderful, excellent care so close to home.

Now, no one really wants to need some supersubspecialty medical care or supersubspecialty surgical care, but this merger would give all of us the opportunity to have access to the best of the best in those things.

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So I come here tonight in support of this merger. You know, all of these hospitals that we're talking about tonight, they all are separate but fantastic institutions in their own right. We can count them on our hand. But like a hand that comes together to form a fist, it makes one strong organization for us all. So I do come in support of this merger, and thank you so much for your consideration.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you.

MS. MANN: Thank you.

DR. NASEER: My name is Dr. Saira

Naseer-Ghiasuddin, and I'll spell it slowly.

N-a-s-e-e-r hyphenated G-h-i-a-s-u-d-d-i-n.

I came to Newburyport in 1996, almost 22 years ago, to practice medicine and to be a part of this community. Today, my husband and I are both committed physicians with practices in Newburyport as well as member of Anna Jaques medical staff.

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My primary care practice, North
Shore Internal Medicine and Anna Jaques
Hospital have become the community I was
looking for. I served as the president of
the medical staff, vice president prior to
that, and today chair of the credentials
committee. But first and foremost, I pride
myself on being a true patient advocate, and
I think there are some patients of mine in
this audience. And the foundation of
healthcare starts here in this community for
my patients.

As a primary care physician in a close-knit community, I care for patients a time at least throughout their lifetime.

Creating this new system will strengthen Anna Jaques and expand and enhance the clinical services locally while collaborating with

high-quality hospitals within the network.

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Something that has already proven to enhance care at Anna Jaques through its clinical affiliation with Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Anna Jaques' relationship with Beth Israel has brought direct benefits and lifesaving services to my patients without having to travel to Boston. My patients have received care from specialists at Gerrish Breast Care Center, their oncology team, and they bring them to go through treatment and surgery and close to their home. We also have a telestroke service in the emergency room which have helped my patients, when every minute counts, and can make a difference in getting timely treatment to have the best possible outcome and quality of life.

Through the clinical affiliations, my patients have experienced a seamless transition of care from Anna Jaques to Beth Israel when needed, and when ready, enable them to continue their care close to home, where I can then monitor and care for them.

As a physician, these are just a few examples of the meaningful benefits my patients will see as the new system expands, the breadth of services available to them across a more comprehensive network.

I am proud of the quality of care that is available to my patients at Anna

Jaques Hospital and know that this will only continue to improve with the backing of a high-quality system. For that and on behalf of my patients, I ask the Department of Public Health's approval of this application. Thank you for your consideration.

MR. DAVIS: Thank you, Doctor.

MS. MANN: Thank you, Doctor.

Jeanette Isabella.

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MS. ISABELLA: I'm Jeanette

Isabella, I-s-a-b-e-l-l-a. So I wasn't born
at Anna Jaques Hospital, but had it not been
for Anna Jaques and Dr. Naseer, I would have
died there in April 2011. The fact that I
had a medical emergency that could be taken
care of in that emergency room so quickly,
thoroughly, lovingly means I'm here today.

It means everything to have that hospital up the street. And the care is always superb. The people may not be your neighbor, but they act like they're your friend. The staff is fabulous.

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Because of a medical condition, I have to have weekly and sometimes two or three times a week blood draws. Anna Jaques provides several laboratories in the area where we can get those blood drawers very conveniently. Mine happens to be in Dr.

Naseer's office, and it's a blessing to have that right there. Honestly, the phlebotomist makes what would be arduous almost pleasant. Six years of that many blood draws. And then when the people call up and say, you know, this is what you have to do -- it's Coumadin. I mean, it's not horrible. But it needs attention, and I get that attention. And it just means so much.

And I'm not alone when I say that.

We love that hospital. We just love it. And
I also do many things at Lahey, so I love
Lahey. So for me, this is a great marriage.
