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1. Please indicate the number of years of experience in care coordination/case management. 20 years of case management experience in Worker's Compensation.

 - Unknown, I have worked with patients who have been prescribed narcotics following surgery and for pain treatment. Most resolved without addiction complications.

4. Please explain your background/experience with addiction or pain management.
 - Very little to no experience working with addiction. Pain management experience in conjunction with a attending/treating provider as director of care and or treatment for patient.

5. Please provide a very brief outline of three cases you have assisted with within last three years (i.e., starting MME, what treatment plan seemed to help and how case ended). Please explain the results of the three cases.
 - a. I have worked (recently – 2017) with a patient who had bilateral leg fractures to the lower extremity, surgically repaired with ORIF from a trauma surgeon. Treated with narcotics that he was able to self transition off over a three-month period of time. The same patient also suffered bilateral knee fractures, also being given narcotics following ORIF, and tapering on his own.

- b. I have worked with a gentleman who suffered a rotator cuff tear and subsequent repair that was not successful leading to ongoing physical therapy, injection therapy and some narcotic use to resolve and manage his pre-and postoperative pain, resulting in the use of no narcotic medication as he self tapered off following about three months after surgery.
 - c. I have worked with many patients who have suffered work injuries resulting in a fracture or back injury will have taken narcotic medication, some with transition to pain clinic for ongoing injection to avoid further narcotic use over the past three years.
6. Do you work with, or are you familiar with, any health care practitioners who specialize or have had success with assisting patients to reduce daily opioid intake?
- Most of the providers that I work with make it clear that utilizing narcotic medication will be short-term per the newer Massachusetts narcotic guidelines, and prescribe for short times with encourage transition to anti-inflammatory medications for the treatment of pain.
