## **Upcoming Amendments to the Federal Atlantic Large Whale Take Reduction Plan**

NOAA Fisheries is currently taking public comment on potential changes to the Atlantic Large Whale Take Reduction Plan (ALWTRP) to further reduce the potential for right whale entanglements in fixed gear along the US East Coast.

In July 2022, a federal court found NOAA Fisheries violated the Endangered Species Act and the Marine Mammal Protection Act by failing to adequately protect right whales from entanglements and inaccurately depicting the risk posed by the lobster trap fishery. Accordingly, the May 2021 Biological Opinion was invalidated. Moreover, the final federal ALWTRP rules—implemented in September 2021—were determined to not sufficiently protect right whales, where a 90% reduction in entanglement risk was required but only a 46% reduction in risk was achieved.

In response, NOAA Fisheries is proceeding to rule-making to amend the ALWTRP rules on an accelerated timeline. Accordingly, the agency is currently conducting a public scoping process to take comments form industry on how to achieve the 90% risk reduction threshold across all fisheries managed by the ALWTRP (lobster and crab pot/trap; mixed species pot/trap; sink gillnet) The proposals provided as part of this scoping process will then be evaluated and discussed at the next Atlantic Large Whale Take Reduction Team meeting in November 2022.
