

Environmental groups are urging everyone who wants to keep radioactive wastewater out of Cape Cod Bay to let the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection know how they feel.

On July 24, the DEP issued a preliminary determination that a permit to discharge wastes into the bay should be withheld from Holtec International, the company decommissioning the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station.

The DEP's tentative decision will not go into effect immediately. The department will continue to solicit public comment on the matter until August 28 at 5 PM.

The Association to Preserve Cape Cod, which was instrumental in providing the legal basis for the permit denial, says now is the time for citizens to voice their opinions. The organization is also urging towns to send letters of support to the state DEP.

"The Association to Preserve Cape Cod respectfully encourages your town to submit a letter to Mass DEP during the comment period in support of preliminary denial," the association said in a letter to the Sandwich Board of Selectmen.

The selectmen were expected sign a letter of support at a reent meeting. The letter lays out the legal basis for the permit denial and says the selectmen, "strongly support" the DEP's preliminary determination that Pilgrim's wastewater should not be discharged into the environmentally fragile bay.

In April of this year, Holtec requested a permit to discharge 1.1 million gallons of irradiated industrial wastewater into the bay rather than store it on site or transport it to an off site storage facility.

The tentative decision to deny the permit, which was announced by the governor's office late last month, cites the Massachusetts Ocean Sanctuaries Act. The 1971 state law prohibits dumping or discharging industrial wastes into protected Massachusetts waters.

vation association, the environmental watchdog group, had suggested earlier this year that Governor Maura Healey use the Ocean Sanctuaries Act as a legal vehicle to deny Holtec's request.

Patrick O'Brien, Holtec's governmental affairs and communications director, said last month that the company is evaluating its options in light of the commonwealth's permit denial.

We are disappointed by the state's denial of our permit modification for discharge of treated water from Pilgrim Station well within safe limits," Mr. O'Brien said. "We will continue with the EPA modification process and will look to evaluate all options related to ultimate disposition of the water used in plant operations for the last 50 years.

"This process has already delayed the completion of the project for an additional four years, impacted the workforce on site, and further changes when the site can be returned to be an economic driver for the Plymouth Community."

Other environmentalists and members of the Cape Cod legislative delegation who have worked to fight Holtec's plan have expressed gratitude in the wake of the prefim inary decision.

State Senator Susan L. Moran (D-Falmouth) who has been in the forefront of the wastewater discharge battle, expressed gratitude.

"This is a significant victory for our coastal communities and a triumph for environmental advocates who have tirelessly fought against this dangerous plan," Ms. Moran said. "Our precious coastal waters and marine life are too valuable to be compromised by such actions.

I commend DEP and the Healey administration for prioritizing our people and public health."

The fight now is in the hands of the public, Ms. Moran has said.

"We must continue to support responsible decommissioning efforts. As the public comment period begins, I encourage all residents to share their thoughts and feedback to strengthen our stance in support of a sustainable future for our waters."

MassDEP reviewed the Holtec application and in the process determined that the bay is "a protected waterway," according to the DEP's press release.

"The Ocean Sanctuaries Act prohibits the 'dumping or discharge of commercial, municipal, domestic or industrial wastes' into ocean sanctuaries. The processed water that Holtec proposes to discharge qualifies as industrial wastewater, and therefore, the proposed discharge is prohibited," the DEP's statement says.

The Cape Downwinders and Save Our Bay organizations—watchdog groups formed specifically to keep an eye on Pilgrim's decommissioning-are also urging people to send comments to the DEP.

"This is our opportunity to speak up and affirm support to finalize denial of the permit," Diane Turco, founder of Cape Downwinders said in a letter this week. "We need to strongly express our opposition."

Those in support of Holtec's plan, of course, are also welcome to voice their opinion.





To that end, I strongly support the MassDEP's initial determination denying Holtec International's permit application to discharge wastewater from the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station into Cape Cod Bay and a final determination that would deny such permit application to prevent Cape Cod Bay from being a dumping ground for such unsafe wastewater.

Clean water is a necessity and vital. The consequences of contamination of Cape Cod Bay are serious. I am writing to support DEP's tentative decision to deny Holtec's application for a modified Surface Water Discharge Permit that would allow it to discharge radioactive and chemically contaminated wastewater into Cape Cod Bay.

DEP's tentative determination that requested discharge is prohibited by the Massachusetts Ocean Sanctuaries Act is entirely correct. That act prohibits the "dumping or discharge or commercial, municipal, domestic or industrial waste" into an Ocean Sanctuary. Cape Cod, Plymouth, Kingston, and Duxbury Bays are all protected ocean sanctuaries.

DEP should also deny Holtec's requested permit for at least two other reasons.

The first is that the Massachusetts Endangered Species Act prohibits altering the habitat of any endangered or threatened species, including the right whale, roseate tern, least tern, and loggerhead turtle that live in and along the shores of Cape Cod Bay. Massachusetts state regulations are explicit: the discharge of waste, wastewater, toxic or hazardous materials shall always be considered alterations of habitat.

The second is the antidegradation provisions of DEP's own regulations.

One prohibits Holtec's discharge unless the discharge would be insignificant and Holtec demonstrates "that the discharge is necessary to accommodate important economic or social development in the [Cape Cod Bay] area." The discharge of 1.1 million gallons of radioactive and chemically contaminated water that, harms the economy, ecology, recreational/ascetic interests is not "insignificant." Holtec's planned discharge is not necessary – for any reason. Holtec has other options. Increasing Holtec's profit is not an important economic or social development.

The other regulation requires DEP to determine that the discharge is "for the express purpose and intent of maintaining or enhancing" Cape Cod Bay; something Holtec's planned discharge plainly will not do.

DEP's final determination should deny Holtec's application for all of these reasons.

I have lived on cape cod by the bay for 23 years and I eat shellfish from the bay, my dogs swim in the bay daily and I swim in the season. My writing of letter is a very personal issue for me and many of my friends.

Thus I am speaking up at this time to

affirm my support to finalize the DENIAL of the permit.



We write regarding the Watershed Management Division's tentative determination to deny Holtec International's application to modify their surface water discharge permit, dated July 24, 2023. We applaud the Division's sound analysis and strongly urge affirmation of the denial in the final determination.

The Division has correctly interpreted the Massachusetts Ocean Sanctuaries Act in this tentative determination. When the legislature enacted this statute in 1970, their intent was to protect our waters, including the Cape Cod Bay ecosystem, for future generations. We are in agreement with the Division that the Act's provisions specifically prohibit Holtec's plan to discharge 1.1 million gallons of radioactive water into Cape Cod Bay, and we commend the Division on upholding the law.

The potential impacts of Holtec's plan are gravely concerning. Recent split sampling data from the Department of Environmental Protection reveals elevated levels of "forever chemicals" such as per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) and other substances including tritium and boron in the plant's spent fuel pool. Dumping over a million gallons of water containing unknown amounts of dangerous chemicals would seriously damage the habitat and wildlife that the state relies on every year for tourism, seafood production and ecological health.

In flagrant disregard of the Commonwealth's laws and public health, Holtec claims that this discharge process only requires federal approval. It is our constituents, however, who will be directly affected by this proposed discharge, and it is state law that specifically addresses this situation. The state must continue to exercise its regulatory authority and affirm the denial of the permit modification application.

We appreciate the Administration standing firm and upholding the Ocean Sanctuary Act by refusing to issue a permit to Holtec whose request would significantly and permanently harm the environment and economy of Massachusetts. This action is exactly what the Act protects against, and exactly what the state is empowered to enforce.

We again commend the Division's analysis and interpretation of the Ocean Sanctuaries Act and its tentative determination to deny Holtec's permit modification application. We strongly urge the Department to affirm this denial in the final determination.

The Chatham Select Board voted on August 15, 2023 to submit its support of the MassDEP's Tentative Determination to Deny a Surface Water Discharge permit to Holtec International, preventing their plan to discharge one million gallons of radioactive water from the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station's reactor vessel and spent fuel pool into Cape Cod Bay.

As a seaside community with 66 miles of shoreline and a commercial fishing fleet with ex-vessel value exceeding \$18,000,000 and a substantial investment in clean water and maintaining a healthy and sustainable coastal ecosystem for all, we are very concerned about the potential adverse impacts Holtec's proposed action would have on the environment and our local economy.

Designated as a State Ocean Sanctuary in 1970, Cape Cod Bay is recognized for its ecological diversity and significance. Its marine and coastal habitats support many commercially important fish and shellfish species, as well as state and federally listed birds and marine mammal species. In late winter and spring, the bay serves as a rich feeding ground for the critically endangered North Atlantic right whale. Yet Cape Cod Bay's ecological bounty also underscores its environmental fragility. Cape Cod Bay is unique in that it is a semi-enclosed embayment that is not conducive to dilution and disbursement of pollutants. There are too many unknown risks due to the cumulative effects of radiation and the enclosed nature of the bay to make the proposed discharge acceptable.

From a human health perspective, the potential for bioaccumulation of radiation in shellfish and finfish that are used as food sources is of great concern to us. These health concerns also translate into potential threats to our coastal economy, with ramifications for our commercial fisheries as well as the many businesses that rely on tourism dollars.

Discharging the contaminated water into Cape Cod Bay is not the only option available to Holtec. Instead of releasing the water into the bay, the company has other alternative actions to take that include storing the water at the site, employing evaporation, or trucking the water to another location. There is too much at stake to gamble with the health of the region's environment and its residents by permitting Holtec to use Cape Cod Bay as its dumping ground simply because it is cheaper for the company to do so. We therefore state our strong opposition to any plans by Holtec International to discharge water containing radiation or other contaminants into Cape Cod Bay and support the denial of the Surface Water Discharge permit.

We are also in support of HD 4754 filed by Reps Cutler, LaNatra, Peake and Diggs and Sens. Cyr and O'Connor. This crucial legislation would ban the disposal of radioactive waste into our Commonwealth's wasters, and thus prevent Holtec from dumping in Cape Cod Bay.

On behalf of the Town of Plymouth, Massachusetts ("Plymouth" or the "Town"), thank you for the time and effort you and the Department have put into reviewing Holtec's application to modify Surface Water Discharge Permit No. MA0003557. The Town appreciates your careful consideration of the Ocean Sanctuaries Act, G.L. c. 132A §§ 12A-18 (the "OSA"). We wholeheartedly agree that Holtec's proposed new discharge of 1.1 million gallons of industrial wastewater from Pilgrim's spent fuel pool, torus, dryer separator, and reactor cavity cannot be released into the Cape Cod Bay Ocean Sanctuary.

The Town is particularly grateful for your well-reasoned analysis supporting the tentative determination. DEP's draft decision upholds the intent and letter of the OSA. As stated in your Draft Permit Modification Denial ("Tentative Determination"), the OSA establishes a blanket prohibition on all new discharges into Cape Cod Bay, with certain narrow exceptions that are inapplicable to the proposed discharge from Pilgrim. See G.L. c. 132A §§ 15-16.

Plymouth agrees with and supports your determination that Holtec's proposed discharge is plainly not an "existing" discharge, and water utilized in the process of decommissioning Pilgrim does not fit within the limited exception allowing discharges from facilities actively generating, transmitting, or distributing electricity. *See id.* There is no dispute that this exception is inapplicable. Pilgrim shut down permanently in 2019.

As the entity with care, oversight, and control of ocean sanctuaries, see G.L. c. 132A § 14, the Office of Coastal Zone Management rightly concluded that the proposed discharge would be "contrary to the" OSA based on its interpretation of the OSA and its application to Holtec's proposed discharge. That determination is properly incorporated into the Tentative Determination. See Tentative Determination, par. 14. Accordingly, DEP's issuance of a surface water discharge permit modification—or any authorization by any agency of the Commonwealth—authorizing the proposed discharge into the Cape Cod Bay Ocean Sanctuary is flatly prohibited. See G.L. c. 132A § 18.

DEP rightly recognizes that the OSA was designed to protect Cape Cod Bay and other ocean sanctuaries from low-cost, high risk industrial wastewater discharges like the one proposed here by Holtec. DEP's draft decision cleanly and unambiguously applies the OSA. Plymouth's history, economy, and culture are intricately tied to Cape Cod Bay, so we appreciate DEP's proper application of the law. We applaud DEP's determination as it will ensure that this vitally important resource remains protected. We urge DEP to maintain this position in its final determination.¹

Dear Ms. Coniaris.

I am forwarding to you a recent letter I sent to New York State Senator Harckham about tritium releases and public health because much of this letter also applies to the Pilgrim situation. For your information, I have no connection to Holtec and I hold a Master's Degree from MIT in nuclear engineering. I spent many years as a federal nuclear energy regulator and am familiar with many of the challenges this critical task entails.

Many people are quite fearful of radiation and often these fears are inflamed by people opposed to nuclear energy. It is everyone's Constitutional right to speak out against anything they wish, independent of whether or not that their comments are scientifically correct or even biased. It would be an act of citizen responsibility if they could provide verifiable evidence to support their claims, but they are not required to.

The fears about radiation from tritium releases are real, even if they are not supported by years of experience that show that the public has been well protected. While it is very difficult to convince a public that their fears are unfounded, government decision-makers must rely on scientific evidence and recognized experts. Regulatory decisions are much more defensible when based on science and not on popular preferences. There are very practical reasons to do this as well. First, unless there is otherwise proof, regulators must support their own regulations and the body of experts who drafted these regulations or there could be chaos. To do otherwise would invite all kinds of lawsuits against the State of Massachusetts. For example, someone who has the misfortune of having cancer, could sue Massachusetts, claiming that his cancer was caused by some ingestion of tritium and that Massachusetts had failed to protect him. To support such an argument this person might refer to the State's refusal to issue a permit to Holtec to release tritium within allowable limits. The non-issuance of such a permit could be claimed to verify the health risks of tritium were known to the State, yet Massachusetts allowed this to happen for decades. There could be thousands of such cases against Massachusetts.

Like other citizens in the area you serve, I am interested in the health effects of releasing tritium into the Hudson River. Having read the excellent reports generated by David Lochbaum on this subject, I am aware that tritium has been released into the Hudson River from the Indian Point site for decades at concentration levels far below federal limits. I am also aware that these tritium releases have been monitored by Federal and State authorities and the results of such monitoring are available to all.

It is my understanding that the tritium concentrations at the point of release at the Indian Point site were far below regulatory limits and that monitoring locations in the Hudson River, one to the south of Indian Point and the other north of Indian Point and closer to the municipalities that draw water from the Hudson River for eventual use as drinking water, have not detected any meaningful concentrations of tritium in the river water.

Normally, these multi-decade measurements might be enough to conclude that further releases of tritium into the Hudson River within regulatory limits are acceptable. However, people in this area have been exposed to years of fearmongering about radiation. Many are fearful of miniscule levels of radiation, even though they are well below normal background levels of radiation. At various public meetings about Indian Point, I have witnessed people who have suffered stress from unhealthy and unfounded fear of low level radiation. People are fearful of the short term tritium releases and questions have been raised about long term cumulative effects of tritium releases.

I think that even with all these benign tritium measurements, we are still missing an important part of the picture. What I have not heard at these public meetings is any discussion of the cumulative tritium health effects of the public that has been drinking treated Hudson River water for extended periods of time. Have there been any verifiable reported injuries or fatalities among this group from such water consumption? I believe that Riverkeeper, so instrumental in raising fears about radiation issues emanating from Indian Point, owes you some answers. Can Riverkeeper provide any evidence of any tritium-related health effects among the people who consumed the treated Hudon River water over multiple decades? If so, should the water departments in these municipalities be taken to court for allowing a tritium-related health hazard to exist? If not, did Riverkeeper directly or indirectly defame these municipality water departments? Equally important, were innocent people needlessly stressed by selfish fear mongering? So, let Riverkeeper provide you with verifiable evidence that tritium releases into the Hudson River over decades, which would therefore demonstrate accumulation effects, if any, has been harmful.

As it turns out, more information is available. Thanks to research that Mr. Lochbaum conducted, we are now aware of a Canadian study that addresses this very issue. "Health Effects, Dosimetry and Radiological Protection of Tritium", Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission, INFO-0799, April 2010. A portion of the Executive Summary reads: "Tritium exposures are highly unlikely to cause adverse health effects in members of the public or in workers, given that the doses to which these groups are exposed are far below those doses where effects have been shown." Such population studies supplement tritium concentration measurements and provide an even higher level of confidence that the public is well protected. I also note that tritium release levels in the USA are nearly ten times stricter that Canadian tritium release levels.

It would be a great service to your voting community to decrease their fear-based stress level with an announcement that both measurements of very low, or zero, tritium concentrations in the Hudson River plus a lack of any verifiable evidence that shows that multi-decade low level tritium releases has adversely affected the surrounding public's health status, except for the stresses created by misinformation.


