Funded by the Office of Grants and Research, a state agency that is part of the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security, the Charles E. Shannon Community Safety Initiative (Shannon) is modeled after the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's Comprehensive Gang Model. Shannon is a multi-sector approach used to address a community's gang and youth violence problem. Each community receiving Shannon funding demonstrates the presence of risk factors for youth and gang violence. Shannon participants must be between the ages of 10-24 years.

Success Highlight

"One of our students had been transferred from an out-of-district high school back into the district. He was a very energetic student who had not consistently attended school in a very long time and had experienced extensive institutional trauma in the school setting. He made a strong connection with our clinician, who advocated for him throughout the year when the school was repeatedly

trying to relocate him to what they deemed would be a more appropriate learning environment. The student was an incredible leader and participant in our youth leadership squad and social-emotional learning classes. Some more senior students took him in, and he responded incredibly well to this

mentorship. By the end of the year, this young man had the best attendance record and was one of the top credit earners at Opportunity Academy for many weeks in a row. Administrators and the probation department repeatedly cast aside this student because of his history of disruptive behavior and lack of engagement at school. Still, his participation in our program undoubtedly impacted the trajectory of his life and high school career."



Gang Activity in Holyoke/Chicopee

Recruitment of youth into gangs increased in 2023. Recruitment takes place in schools, through peer relationships, and via social media. Holyoke Police Department estimates that gangs were responsible for 75% of violent crimes in 2023, including shootings, stabbings, armed robberies, and assaults. Additionally, gangs were responsible for about 90% of the drug trade, specifically cocaine and heroin, leading to inter-gang conflict, turf battles, and violent crime. One of the challenges in the communities is that Holyoke is a nexus of drug trafficking on the I91 corridor. This corridor connects drugs from NYC – via New Haven, Connecticut, to Northern Vermont. The national gangs, specifically, are engaged in trafficking via the I91 corridor, creating challenges to the safety of the community and to our high-risk youth. Both residents and agencies are in agreement that the most serious issues affecting the neighborhoods are gangs.
